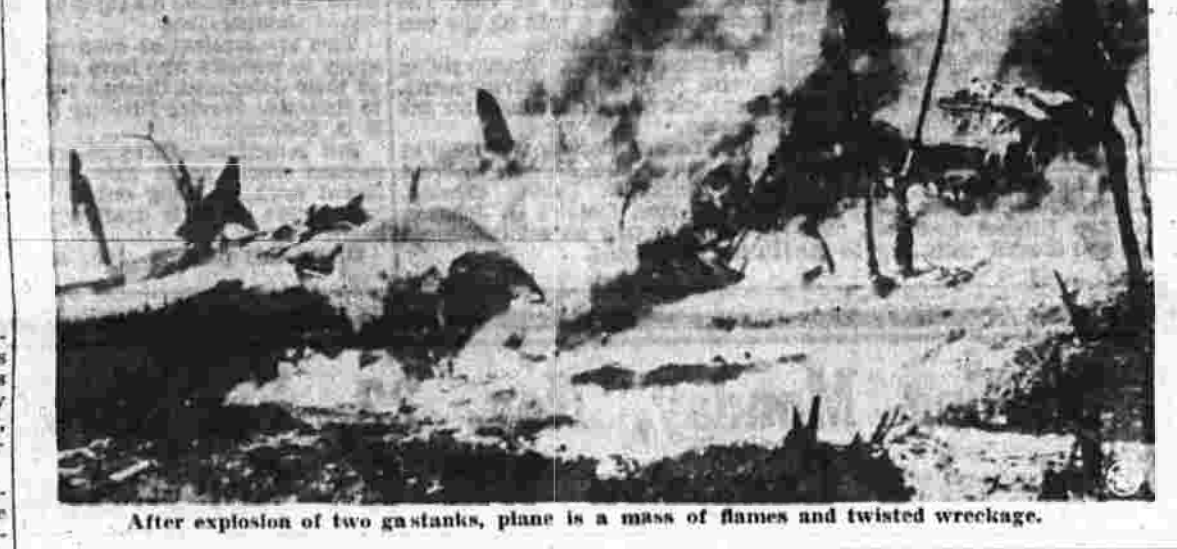
Fellow Airmen Save Pilot as Plane Crashes and Bursts Into Flames

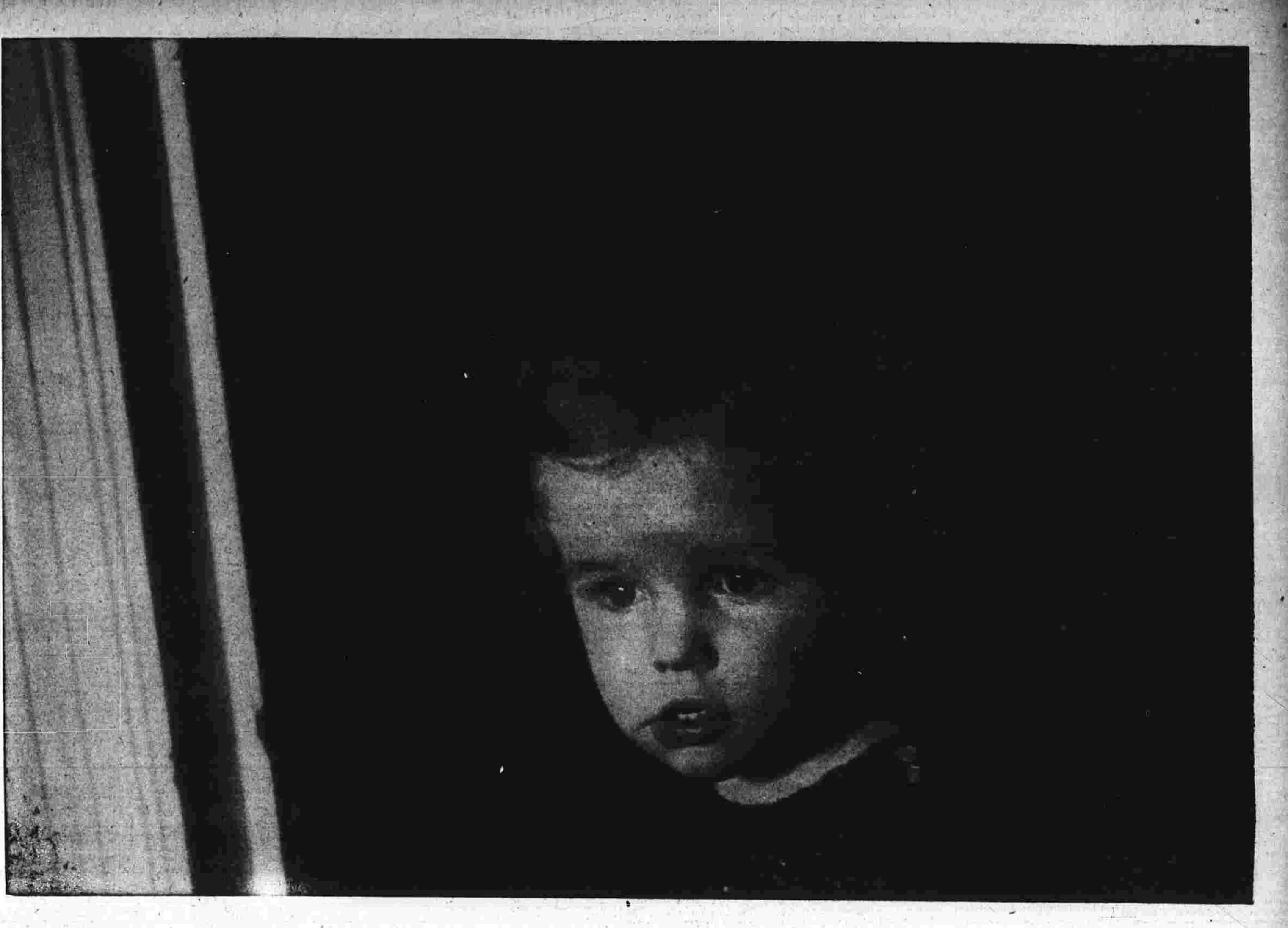

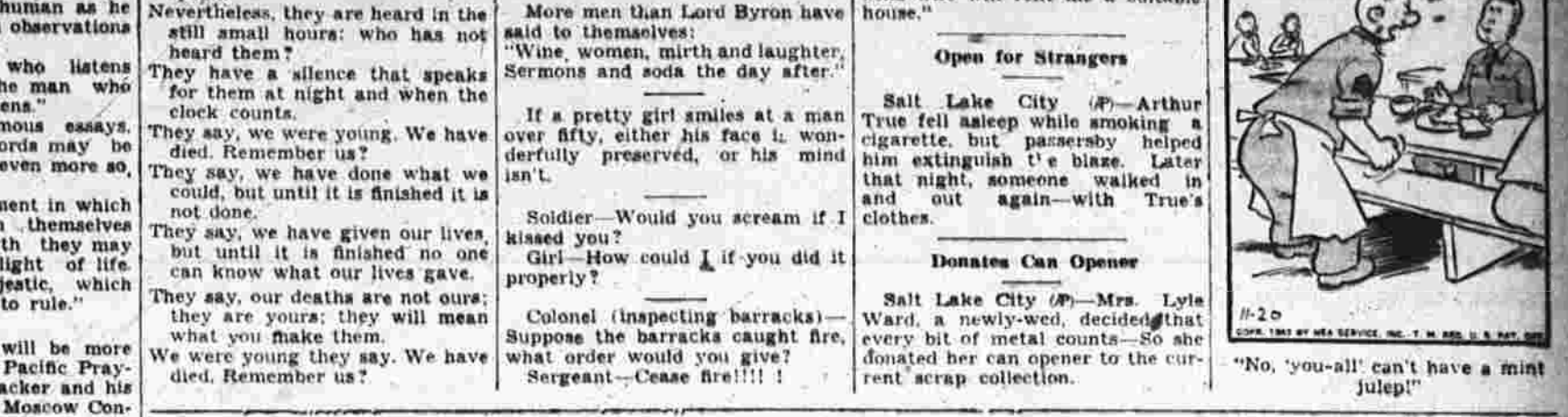
