Navy Makes Carrier Capital Ship

WASHINGTON-One a day-that is the record Allied bombers hung up against Jap warships during the northern Solomous offensive. The aerial drive began October twelfth when three Nipponese destroyers were sent to the bottom. By the middle of November, Allied fliers had sunk or damaged more than 40 surface vessels. The devastating air blows against the enemy's fleet are but one indication of mounting Allied air power in the South Pacific.

A Navy Department spokesman said that the Navy was almost embarrassed over the lantastic" victory ratios which "challenge credulity," adding that the reports were really on the conservative side.

The enemy fleet has been so badly mauled at Rabaul by carrier task forces, the spokesman continued, that Japan should give "serious consideration" to complete abandonmen of the base as "too hot to handle." Almost simultaneously the Navy took a momentous step, announcing a tactical reorganization in the Pacific to group all ships except submarines around the aircraft carrier as the new capital ship. The carrier thus succeeds to the battleship's traditional posi-


