Allied Headquarters in North

Africa, Dec. 3.-(A) - The American Red Cross announced today that more than 1,000,000 articles of clothing made by Red Cross chapters in the United States will be distributed to the needy in Italy within the next month.
William Giblin, field director for the Red Cross war relief which is working with the AMG, said the clothing would be distributed mainly among refugees left destitute by the Germans in their retreat. The American Red Cross, in conjunction with the British Red Cross, also is setting up a welfare organization to direct relief for Jews, Yugoslavs and Greeks who had been interned but who are now free under Allied occupation.

First off, there's the new fats salvaging program worked out by the OPA in conjunction with the War Production Board. After December 13, you will not be paid only money for every pound of fats you deliver to your neighborhood grocery store. You also will be paid two brown ration stamps. By salvaging all the kitchen fats and greases that aren't of any further use in cooking, you will be helping yourself as well as your country.

The new fuel oil rationing period began November 30. That means your Period 2 coupons are now valid and good for the same amount of oil as were Period 1 coupons.

Remember how difficult it was to find hard candy on the market last Christmas? Well, things are going to be a little better this year.

Manufacturers of hard candy have recently been given an increased sugar allotment. Furthermore, OPA has set ceiling prices on hard candy that will protect every shopper's pocketbook. Though the regulation has not yet become effective, all indications are that the top legal price for these candies sold in bulk will be 25 cents a pound, and 35 cents a pound if sold in boxes.

Recapping of tires for commercial vehicles with truck-type camelback has come off the rationing list. Henceforth, anyone whose truck tires are showing signs of wear doesn't need to apply for a recapping certificate at his Local War Price and Rationing Board. All he needs to do is to drive to the nearest recapper and order the job done.
