

British Hit Berlin In Night Attack; Great Air Battle

Fifth Assault in Period of Two Weeks on German Capital; Fliers Slug It Out With Scores of Fighters Massed Over Arena.

London, Dec. 3.—(AP)—Britain's blockbusting armada flew against Berlin last night for the fifth time in two weeks and fought their greatest battle yet in the relentless campaign to erase the Nazi capital. Shooting toward a city already a third demolished, where fires still flared from the previous attacks, the squadrons of four-engined bombers drove through flare paths lighting the approach to the city from as far away as 50 miles, pierced exploding walls of heavy anti-aircraft fire and slugged it out with scores of night fighters which the Germans had massed over the area.

41 Aircraft Lost

The British announced the loss of 41 aircraft in this and other operations, but at the end they said they were confident that the world's fourth largest, and biggest, city would be leveled to the ground. The force attacked last night for the first time in at least 36 hours. The steady aircraft employment during the summer had threatened production and led to a major revision in the volume of shipyard activity.

Aircraft Workers Increase

Partly because employment ceilings were imposed, employment in shipyards actually has dropped, the report said, while the number of workers in the aircraft industry increased nearly 3,000 from Oct. 1 to Nov. 1.

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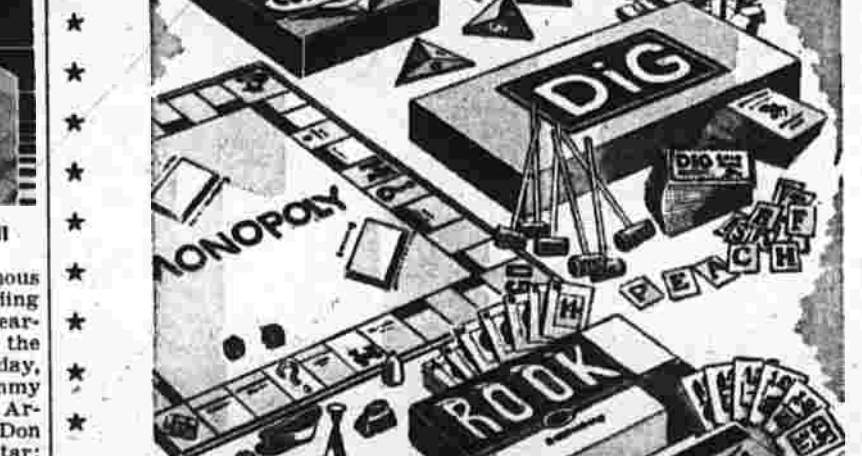

Rationing News

During the past week, I have received a number of items of general interest to the majority of Connecticut people. Some of these items will answer questions that you've been asking recently and others will give you information that will be valuable to you when you go shopping.

First of all, there's the new fats salvaging program worked out by the OPA in conjunction with the War Production Board. After December 15, you will not be paid only money for every pound of fats you deliver to your neighborhood grocery store... you also will be paid two brown ration stamps.

By salvaging all the kitchen fats and greases that aren't of any further use in cooking, you will be helping yourself as well as your country. The new fuel oil rationing period began November 30. That means your Period 2 coupons are now valid and good for the same amount of oil as were Period 1 coupons.

Remember how difficult it was to find hard candy on the market last Christmas? Well, things are going to be a little better this year. Manufacturers of hard candy have recently been given an increased sugar allotment. Furthermore, OPA has set selling prices on hard candy that will protect every shopper's pocketbook.

Recycling tires for commercial vehicles with truck-type camelback has come off the rationing list. Henceforth, anyone whose tires are showing signs of wear doesn't need to apply for a recycling certificate at his Local War Price and Rationing Board. All he needs to do is drive to the nearest recapper and order the job done.

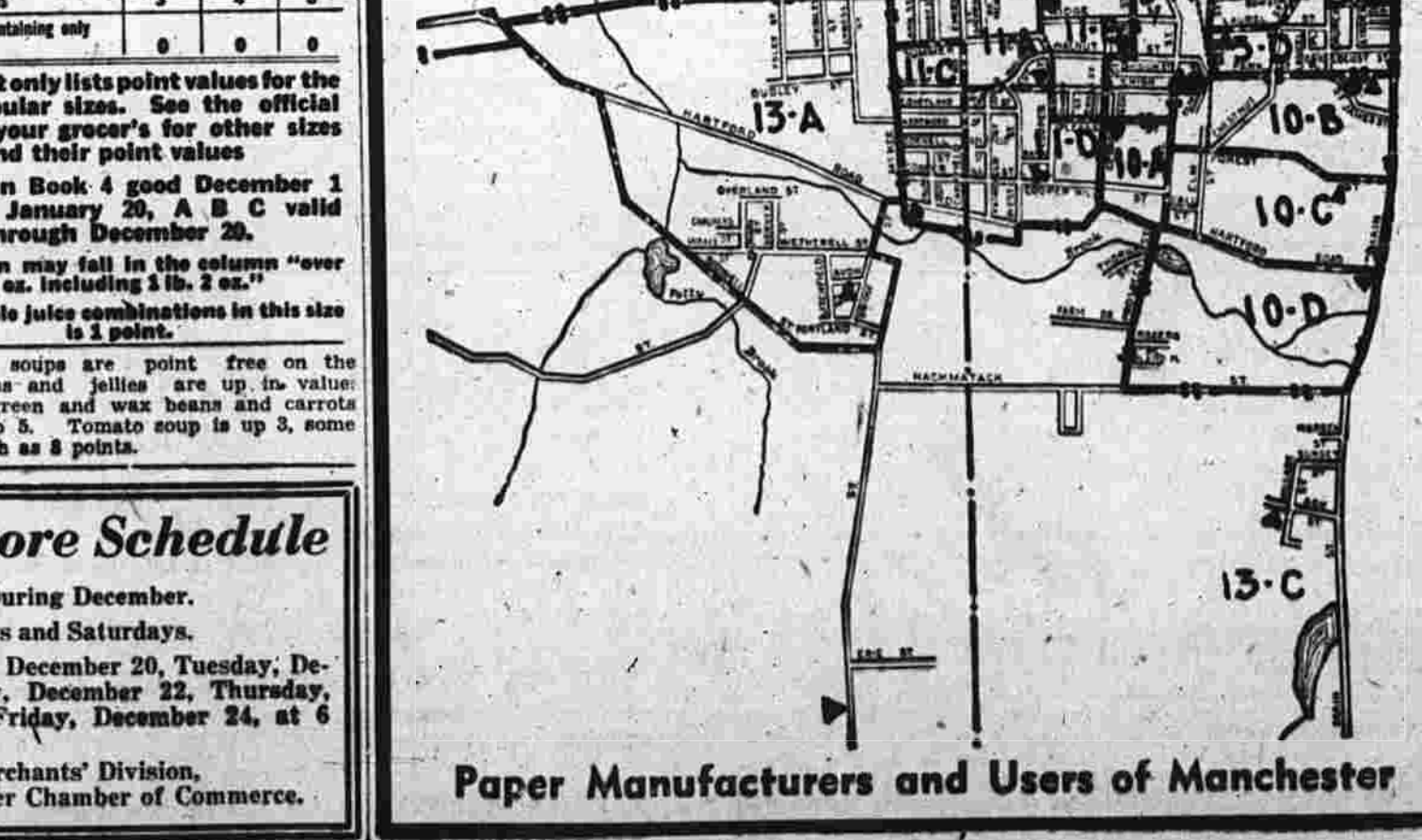

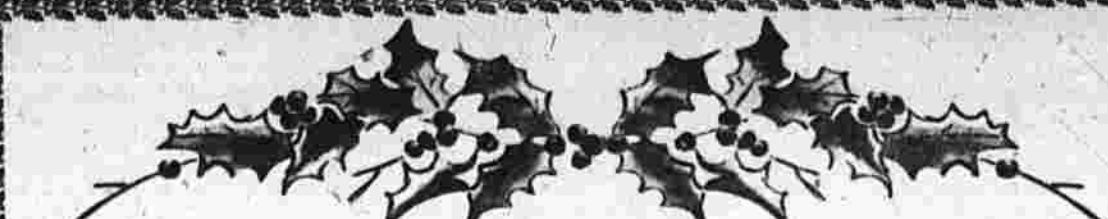
