Fifth Army Gains Hills in Assault; 8th Across River

Captures Most Dominating Positions in 25-Square Mile Area Overlooking Highway to Rome; British Tanks Ram Across Moro.

Allied Headquarters, Algiers, Dec. 7.—(AP)—Fifth Army infantry has crashed through Nazi defenses in bitter assaults to capture the most dominating positions in a 25-mile-square area overlooking the road to Rome.

Headquarters officer, describing the battle in the vital Monte Cassino and Monte Maggiore area on the western sector, declared "we now hold the most important features in that area roughly five miles long and one mile wide."

On the Adriatic side of the German Tenth Army, Montgomery's tanks and infantry drove across the Moro river, into the town of San Leonardo, in a tank battle fought in a fog. Four German Mark IV tanks were destroyed.

The new U. S. 5th Air Force struck heavily in the German-held area of Athens, with flying Fortresses and Mustangs attacking the city and the area around it.

U. S. troops captured a mountain peak six miles west of Mignano overlooking the swollen Garigliano river, and farther west captured a mountain peak on which were 1,000 prisoners in a localized assault.

The fighting on the Adriatic flank now runs from the mouth of the Moro river to the mouth of the Volturno river, east of Salerno, and north to Cassini.

The German and the Allies are having difficulty bringing up supplies all along the front across Italy.

The Garigliano river on the western side is swollen more than a mile wide in places. Swamps and flooded creeks hampered both sides.

Low-lying clouds cloaked some mountain peaks. The German army, from the mouth of the Moro river to the mouth of the Volturno river, east of Salerno, and north to Cassini.

Due to weather, aerial activity over Italy was slight, but American bombers were active.

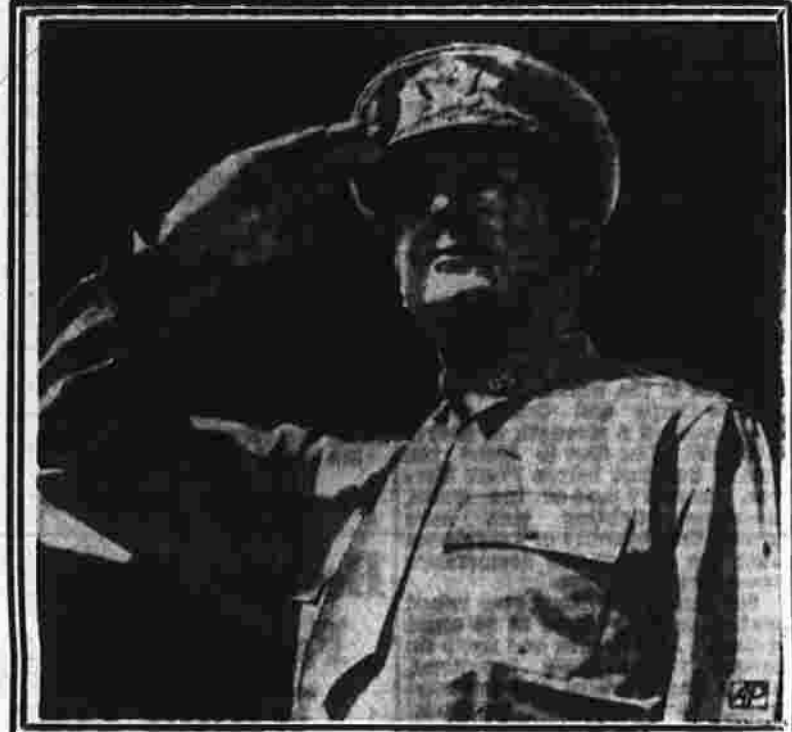

Paper Salvage To Be Kept Up

After the Operating Table, Other Local Projects Supported.

Melvin Hathaway, chairman of the Waste Paper Salvage committee, said this morning that he had called a meeting of the committee for this evening at the Chamber of Commerce rooms at 8 o'clock. Despite contrary reports, the salvage collections will continue all over the city and householders are asked to make a bigger effort throughout December than in previous months.

The reason for this was advanced by Mr. Hathaway when he said that the committee has other projects in mind after the purchase of the operating table for the Memorial hospital. He pointed out that the committee will endeavor to aid worthy local projects and thus keep the money they have collected from the waste paper in town.

The Cardboard Boxes
It has been suggested that cardboard boxes could be used to pack the waste paper in. Care should be exercised in putting the paper into an attack which had by-passed the system papers are collected and make the work of the collector a lot easier. Under the present system papers are collected in boxes which are then taken to the curb or on the veranda.

Town Is Fortunate

The latter might come in either southern France or the Balkans. Most observers here incline to the belief that it would be the Balkans which would be the attack across the channel in order to bring maximum pressure on Nazi Europe at all vulnerable points.

Long and Costly Way to Go
While victory over Japan is considered equally certain by authorities here, they say that no such confidence with respect to time is possible. Allied forces admittedly have a long and costly way to go before they can be sure of victory in relation to Japan positions for mass assault which they now possess in relation to Germany.

Almost a year ago the United States launched its offensive against Guadalcanal island in the Southwest Pacific, hard-fighting American troops are still struggling for possession of the last of the Solomons, and the key Japanese base of Rabaul, at least a perimeter defense position, remains to be taken.

Jump Several Months in Future
Events moved more rapidly in the North Pacific where conquest of Attu island early this year forced the Japanese to evacuate Japan forces and gave American forces a springboard for jumping on Japan's northern front.

The most immediate prospects for new action against Japan lie in the Southeastern Asia theater where Admiral Lord Louis Mountbatten has been accumulating ships, planes and men for a campaign against enemy-held Burma, Malaya and eventually Singapore.

All these actions, present and future, are believed to have several purposes in common: (1) To force Japan to disperse her strength and if possible to engage and destroy her seapower; (2) To regain control of such strategic positions as Singapore and the Island of Luzon in the Philippines; (3) To cut off the southern and richest half of Japan's empire by air and sea action based on the Philippines; (4) To open a China coastal port for the development of a sustained, China-based aerial offensive against Japan.

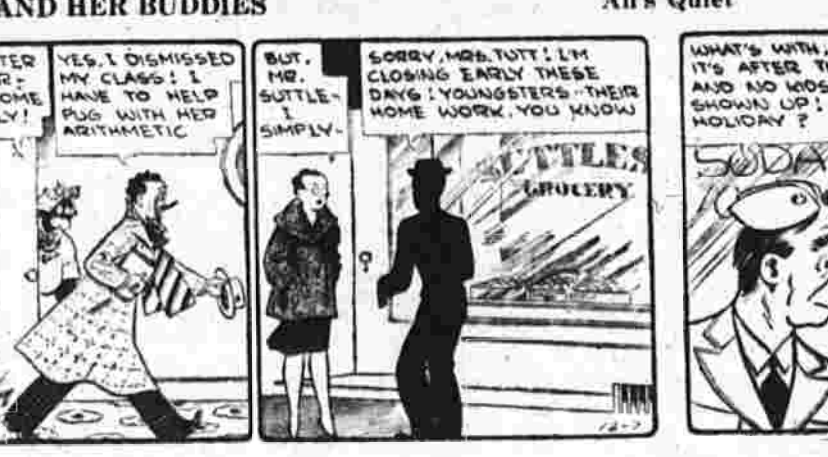
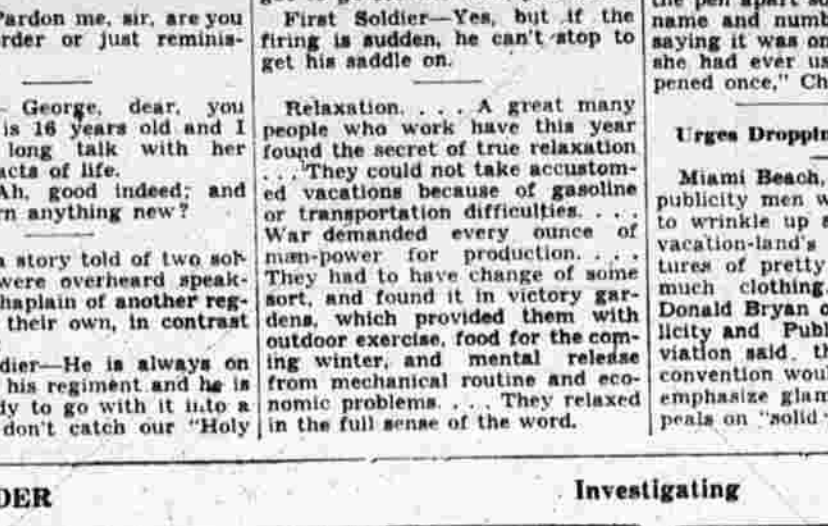
