

50 to 76 Persons Die in Rail Crash; Scores Are Hurt

Two Streamlined Atlantic Coast Line Passenger Trains Pile Up in Double Wreck at Buie, N. C.; Broken Rail Believed Cause.

Lumberton, N. C., Dec. 16.—(AP)—Between 50 and 100 persons were killed and more than 100 injured in the wrecks of two crowded streamlined passenger trains along an exposed stretch of the Atlantic coast line in southeastern North Carolina early today. Rescuers battled through the winter's coldest night over snow and ice-coated highways to bring survivors of the double smashup to hospitals at Lumberton and Fayetteville.

Lumberton, N. C., Dec. 16.—(AP)—Two streamlined passenger trains on the New York-Florida run were wrecked near here early today and estimates of the dead ranged from at least 50 to 76. Many scores were taken to hospitals with injuries. The two fast Atlantic Coast Line trains loaded with pre-holiday travelers, many from the Washington service men, piled up in a double wreck at Buie, a village in southeastern North Carolina shortly after 1 a. m. (e.w.t.). The Coast line office at Rocky Mount said it was informed 75 passengers aboard one train were killed and one person aboard the other fatally injured.

"At least 50 killed," Dr. W. S. Fleming of a Fayetteville hospital, who arrived at the scene at 3 a. m., and administered first aid for more than five hours, said at least 50 persons were killed.

C. G. Sibley of Wilmington, a vice president of the line, said he believed the wreck was caused by a broken rail.

A mortuary at nearby Rocky Mount reported it had received 50 bodies by noon but no identification had been made. Other bodies were expected, an attorney said.

One of the trains left New York at 11:45 a. m. yesterday, and the other left Miami at 8:45 a. m. yesterday.

The streamliner "Miami West Coast Champion," No. 91, routed from New York to Tampa, Fla., was partially derailed at about 1 a. m. (e.w.t.) on the parallel double track line.

Meager reports were made to the Lumberton office by the Robesonian, by witnesses who talked to survivors.

Believe Rail Walkout Will Be Averted

Railway and Government Officials Hopeful Scheduled Strike Will Fail to Materialize.

Cleveland, Dec. 16.—(AP)—Railway and government officials expressed belief today a nationwide railroad strike scheduled to start today would fail to materialize, while a spokesman for one of the five operating unions involved said "we know of no reason why a settlement cannot be worked out" at a mediation meeting next Monday.

The meeting was called by the National Mediation Board after the operating brotherhoods set Dec. 20 and the three succeeding days for a "progressive strike" of 350,000 unionists seeking to enforce demands for wage increases. The session was held in Chicago and will be attended by railroad officials and brotherhood leaders.

Coal Delivery Now Problem in Hartford

New Emergency, Attributed to Manpower Shortage, Developing Because of Cold Wave.

Hartford, Dec. 16.—(AP)—A new coal emergency, attributed by Gen. Douglas MacArthur, was developing today because of the prolonged cold wave.

While scores of calls kept the phones ringing, the dealers said trucks were standing idle in their garages because of inadequate help to load and operate the vehicles.

One of the most serious emergencies occurred at the Charter Oak Terrace housing project, populated by war workers.

Forty families here were reported to be without fuel. Emergency arrangements were made to obtain three tons at the manager's headquarters, and this was being doled out in single bags to the families in greatest need.

One of the larger coal dealers said today: "There's no abundance of coal, but there's enough. The war has neutralized in October we have seven or eight trucks standing idle in the garage this morning because of the manpower shortage."

Another large-dealer reported "four or five" trucks in the garage, and a medium sized dealer said: "We're short of coal."

British Miners Seek Increases Up to \$8 Weekly Immediately.

London, Dec. 16.—(AP)—A demand by the Mine Workers' union for immediate wage increases ranging up to about \$8 weekly for Britain's 680,000 coal miners produced the threat of a fuel crisis today.

The government, warning of the prospect of a shortage, cut coal rations for homes as much as 20 per cent some time ago, and a shutdown of the mines now might result in further reductions.

17 Allied Merchant Ships Lost at Bari; Blast Rail Facilities

American Heavy Bombers Hit Telling Blows At Communications on Both Sides of Brenner Pass; Innsbruck in Austria and Bolzano and Trento Regions Are Targets.

Washington, Dec. 16.—(AP)—American heavy bombers, striking with as great force as on Tuesday when 300 Flying Fortresses and Liberators blasted airfields in the Athens area, hit telling blows at enemy communications on both sides of the Brenner pass yesterday. The new abrogation of the Brenner pass yesterday, blows were directed at rail facilities at Innsbruck in Austria and at Bolzano and the Trento region in northern Italy and, although the fleet of bombers and escorting fighters approximately matched the armada which raided the Aegean area, Allied headquarters said every one of the planes returned safely.

Attacks on Main Supply Lines. "These attacks described the highly concentrated and successful, were made on the main supply line from Germany into Italy via the Brenner pass, which was the British Eighth Army pushed ahead slowly in an advance toward Innsbruck from April through Pescara and the Fifth Army captured an important hill in the Castel San Vincenzo area, six miles south of Alfordo, on the Eighth Army cut the road between Ortova and Ortona in three places and captured the village of Berrati, three miles from Ortova.

New Britain Landing Seen Imminent Now

Invasion Expected Following Devastating Raid by Allied Bombers on Arave Harbor.

Southwest Pacific Allied Headquarters, Dec. 16.—(AP)—An American invasion of New Britain island, key to Japan's hold on the entire South Pacific area, appeared imminent today following a devastating raid by Allied bombers that dumped 356 tons of explosives on Arave, one of the good harbors on the southern coast of the island.

Reports Damage Heavy. This record raid, announced by Gen. Douglas MacArthur, followed crushing attacks Sunday that blasted New Britain on all sides.

A pre-invasion softening-up pattern. Effectiveness of these raids was pronounced. MacArthur said the damage was heavy.

All indications in headquarters communications the last two days have pointed to a quickening tempo in the northern Solomon Islands.

Potential invasion areas on New Britain have been pointed up by the sustained pounding of Allied warplanes in recent weeks. The area was devastated from the air and the western end of the island, Cape Gasmata, on the southeast coast, has been pounded almost daily for more than a fortnight, and Cape Gloucester, on the western tip, has been hammered almost daily along with Gasmata.

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Service Vote Likely Issue

Supporters of Administration Threaten Action Unless Law Passed

Washington, Dec. 16.—(AP)—Administration supporters declared today they will take the service men's vote issue to the people in next year's political campaigns unless Congress passes some kind of law to facilitate the balloting.

Senator Lucas (D., Ill.), declaring that he is drafting compromise legislation designed to let the states determine finally whether to count absentee ballots marked by uniformed personnel, said his rejection by Congress would be an appeal for an appeal direct to the voters.

"It is going to be one of the biggest issues of the 1944 campaign," Lucas told a reporter. "If the soldiers don't get the right to vote under a system that will be used for an appeal direct to the people of Illinois that will be their sons and brothers have been denied that right."

Express Same Intention. Other administration supporters, he said, have expressed the same intention.

Lucas charged in the Senate yesterday that Republicans who joined southern Democrats in forcing passage of a substitute "water" rights bill did not want service men to vote.

He made this charge after Senator Moore (Mich.) had delivered a scathing attack on the New Deal and had declared that a service men's vote bill sponsored by Moore (Mich.) had been introduced in the House.

Larger Use of Carrier Units Seen

Indicated by Compilation of Battle Actions of Force Neutralizing Jap Defenses.

Washington, Dec. 16.—(AP)—Greater use of powerful aircraft carrier task forces to spearhead invasions or knock out enemy bases appears to be indicated in the Pacific.

This became apparent today in a compilation of battle actions of a single carrier force which neutralized four Japanese airfields, sank or damaged 14 warships and destroyed more than 100 enemy planes in a 30-day period.

"We provided a good indication of the employment of carrier task forces in the Pacific, particularly as we are heading westward," said Capt. John H. Cassady, skipper of the Saratoga around which the force was built.

He emphasized that "we were comparatively weak task force at Pearl Harbor and in some respects showed the potentialities of what can be expected and what will be seen done by carrier task forces in the future."

Fascist Division Ordered Depart

Barcelona, Dec. 16—(AP)—Reports from northern Italy today said that the Fascist Littorio division, which had been stationed at Verona for several weeks under German officers, had suddenly been ordered to depart for an undisclosed destination.

There were rumors that the troops were being sent to Germany where they would be disarmed and used as laborers in pursuance of German plans to strip northern Italy of its available manpower.

The Berlin correspondent of a Barcelona newspaper, meanwhile, reported from the German capital that arrangements were being completed for the early trial of Count Galeazzo Ciano, Benito Mussolini's son-in-law, for the part he played in the ousting of the former duke.

At the same time the French press carried an announcement from Germany that Mussolini's son, Vittorio, had been named chief of the Fascist party in Germany.

Would Prohibit Raises in Rank

Washington, Dec. 16—(AP)—Senator Wallgren (D., Wash.) disclosed today that he may introduce legislation to prohibit further promotions in permanent Army rank of general officers in order to slow down "a large number of promotions in permanent rank."

Although such a measure would affect Lieut. Gen. George S. Patton, Jr., commander of the Seventh Army who has been criticized for his "berating of enlisted men," Wallgren said it was not directed at Patton.

A Military subcommittee meanwhile again delayed action on President Roosevelt's nomination of Patton for promotion to the permanent rank of major general. His present permanent rank is colonel.

School Damages To Be Repaired

Edward F. Beall, engineering vice president of Boeing Aircraft company, upon his return from England, reports that Eaker received the message following a raid by American bombers on Regensburg. The Luftwaffe congratulated the Americans on their avoidance of a hospital.

The Luftwaffe, said Beall, also expressed its inability to understand how such accuracy was achieved.

Industry Training Need Emphasized

Hartford, Dec. 16—(AP)—Need for industrial training in reconstruction of factories to peacetime production and the return of war veterans to jobs in industry was emphasized today by L. J. Ackerman, adviser on management for the Connecticut War council training program in Hartford.

Industrial training coordinators appointed by various firms will meet in New Haven and Hartford tomorrow to hear detailed plans for a complete training program adaptable to any industry.

Ration Volunteers To Be Recognized

Washington, Dec. 16—(AP)—Recognition for nearly 100,000 volunteers who have contributed 100 hours or more of service to the nation's War Price and Rationing boards was announced today by the Office of Price Administration.

To mark the second anniversary Jan. 3 of organization of the boards, OPA plans to present war service award certificates to the 100-hour volunteers. Later a special certificate will be awarded to board members.

On the certificates for volunteers who have served 200 hours there will be a red stripe diagonally across the corner, with an additional stripe for each 100 hours. A distinguished service pin will be presented later to volunteers who have served 500 hours or more.

Notes to Advance Recess

Washington, Dec. 16—(AP)—Upon the recommendation of Dr. Thomas B. Murphy, school physician, the Board of Education voted last night to advance the schools' Christmas recess from Dec. 22 to Dec. 17. About 600 pupils, 25 per cent of the enrollment, are suffering with grip or mild influenza, Dr. Murphy said he blamed the flu on the change in food rationing for the spread of the epidemic.
