### Be Careful in Removing Christmas Decorations

Hartford, Dec. 31.—The State fire commission today warned Connecticut residents against the danger of accidental fires, particularly those that might be caused by carelessness in removing Christmas decorations.

Defective electrical equipment was named as one of the principal causes of such fires, particularly in homes, since sparks from short circuits could ignite trees and wreaths that have become dry during the holiday season. Some of these defects may become evident only when the decorations are being taken down, as in the case of bare wires on Christmas lights, and great care should be exercised to make certain that the connection plug is pulled out before the lights are removed, the safety commission urged.

### Bars Esquire From Mails

Walker Prohibits Use of Second Class Privileges Effective on Feb. 28.

Washington, Dec. 31.—The United States Post Office today prohibited Esquire magazine, with its curvaceous "Varga Girl" and sundry breezy cartoons and articles, in neither the first-class mail, nor in the second-class mail, should be barred from the second class mail.

It apparently was Walker's own personal decision which was announced yesterday. The magazine is a three-man post office trial board, after a two-to-one vote, had held that proceeding against the slick magazine should be discontinued.

The magazine publisher, David Smart, at first said the decision left him "speechless," but he maintained so only shortly, asserting: "The postmaster general has gone against his own board's decision and that is unbelievable."

To Take Court Action

"I will not be committed immediately in the appropriate court in the District of Columbia, as I threatened revocation on the ground that his procedure is completely arbitrary and capricious and against the weight of the evidence introduced before the hearing board as well as the recommendation of his own duty commission."

Walker said that a magazine or publication that is not eligible for second class mailing privileges "must be originated and published by a public utility, a newspaper, a magazine, a book, a scientific, artistic, or to some special industry."

His chief objection to the proposed regulation was that it would cost the magazine \$500,000 a year to use the higher, fourth-class rate.

Walker, who made his office effective Feb. 28, 1944, gave the time to enter an appeal in what he termed "a matter in which the publication, the Post Office department and the general public have a direct and substantial interest," stressed that only one issue was involved—the use of the second class matter in the "Consequently," he observed, "there is no general question of non-mailability, as first, third or fourth-class mail matter nor the right of free carriage and freedom of the press. Nor are we being concerned with whether a criminal prosecution against the publishers might or might not be sustained by the same or similar evidence."

Among the principal subjects of the earlier hearings on the magazine's right to use the second class mail were "Varga Girl" illustrations, so-called for the artist, "Keep Sea Before Reader."

"The response that I would have, I believe," said Gov.
