No Political Commitments?

One paragraph of President Roosevelt's annual message to Congress—the third from the last—was probably inserted after Soviet Russia had announced its intention to join the war.

The foreign policy that we have been following—the policy that guided us at Moscow, Cairo and Teheran—is based on the common sense principle which was best expressed by Benjamin Franklin on July 6, 1776: "We must all hang together, or assuredly we shall all hang separately."

That paragraph represents an effort to divert American thinking from the extreme violation of United Nations principle involved in the Polish territorial grab, and keep it concentrated on the continued military need of the United States.

It would not be surprising if the President's message had been written by a man who was not a member of the Roosevelt family.

It is in his hands yesterday, a national service act was more a threat than a program. He was, in actuality, warning American labor that any continuation of its recent policy of strikes was a threat to the national service act.

These measures, added together, do represent good, perhaps ideal national policy at the present moment.

While Russian power bloc policy casts the shadow of new breeding conditions for future years, the Red Army is obviously doing its major share in the winning of this present war.

Not since the days of original German blitzkrieg has there been powered advance to match that now being made by the Russian armies.

Italians Hoping To Change Kings

Naples, Jan. 12.—Hopes were kindled in some Italian political circles today that a change of kings to remove "the taint of Fascism" and a reorganization of the Badoglio government along broad "democratic" lines could be effected before the Allies capture Rome.
