Joan Berry To Testify

Inquiry Being Made On Violation of Civil Rights After Arrest. Los Angeles, Jan. 14.—(AP)—Joan Berry, who asserts that she is the father of her infant child, will be called next Wednesday to testify before a Federal grand jury investigating whether her civil rights were violated following her arrest on charges in Beverly Hills a year ago.

The grand jury summoned special witnesses yesterday, on adjourning, a spokesman said. There is no possibility of development before Thursday. The inquiry will be resumed Wednesday afternoon, he said, with the appearance of Mrs. Berry, 24-year-old film agent.

There is one key explanation for all this. Poland now, like Czechoslovakia in 1938, is a small nation surrounded by great and powerful nations.

For a vivid demonstration of what is considered good politics in an election year, we have only to take the attitude of Congress on these same four subjects.

But what seems politically expedient to members of Congress is not the nation's need.

By the ordinary standards of election year conduct, which Congress seems intent upon following, it is political suicide to support such programs.

It could be that, in 1944, the people of this country are capable of approving that course of conduct which they may judge to be most honestly faithful to the nation's real needs and interests.

There is an outside chance that the President may be more politically sound in his advocacy of a "tough" war, than those who think that a soft, profitable war should be the formula for now on.

We would recommend the possibility to the attention of Congress before it makes any rash conclusions that it will be politically safe in postponing the presidential program.

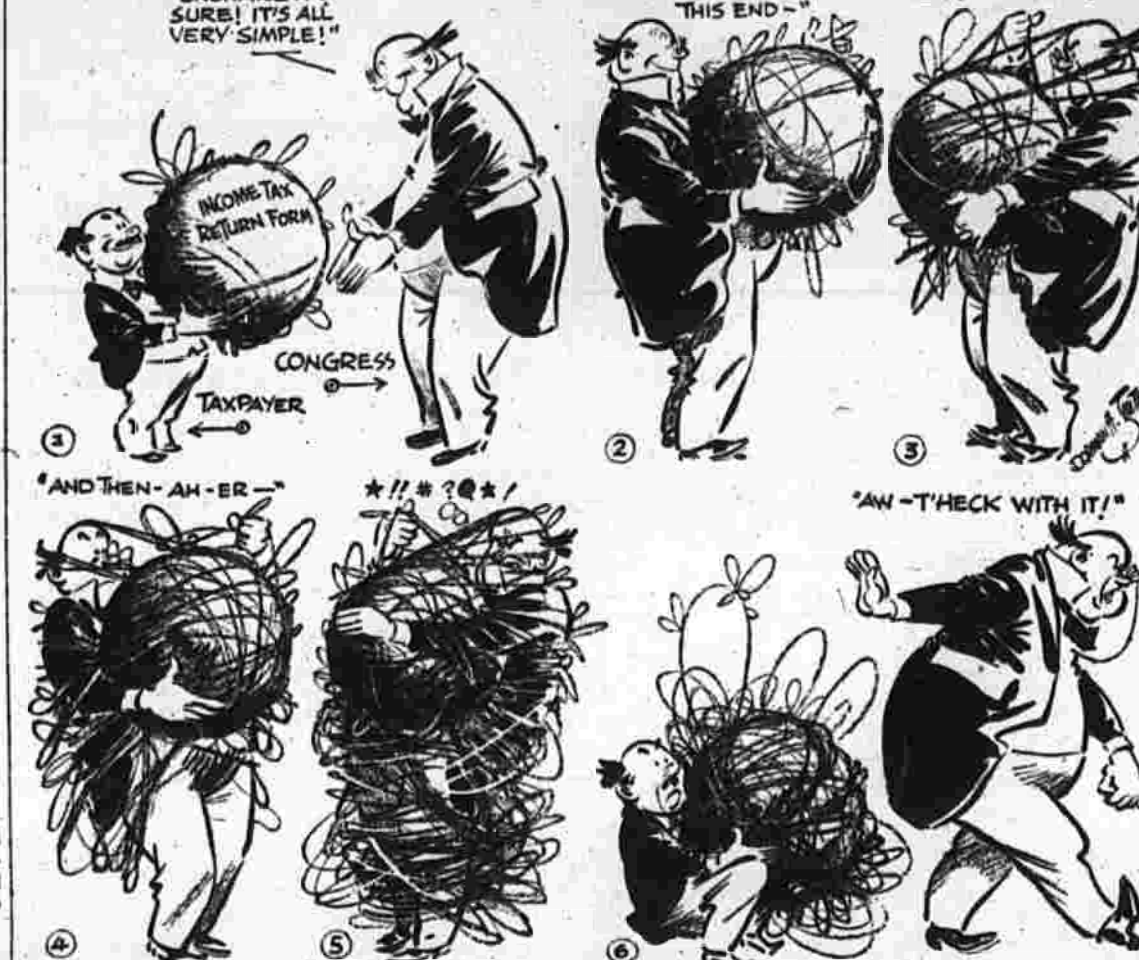

There is an outside chance that the President may be more politically sound in his advocacy of a "tough" war, than those who think that a soft, profitable war should be the formula for now on.

We would recommend the possibility to the attention of Congress before it makes any rash conclusions that it will be politically safe in postponing the presidential program.
