### Lieut. Keish Reported Safe

Local Flyer Missing Over China Is Alive, His Parents Hear.

First Lieut. Fred C. Keish, son of Mr. and Mrs. Fred E. Keish, of 40 Clinton street, reported by the War Department on January 29 as missing in action, is reported safe.

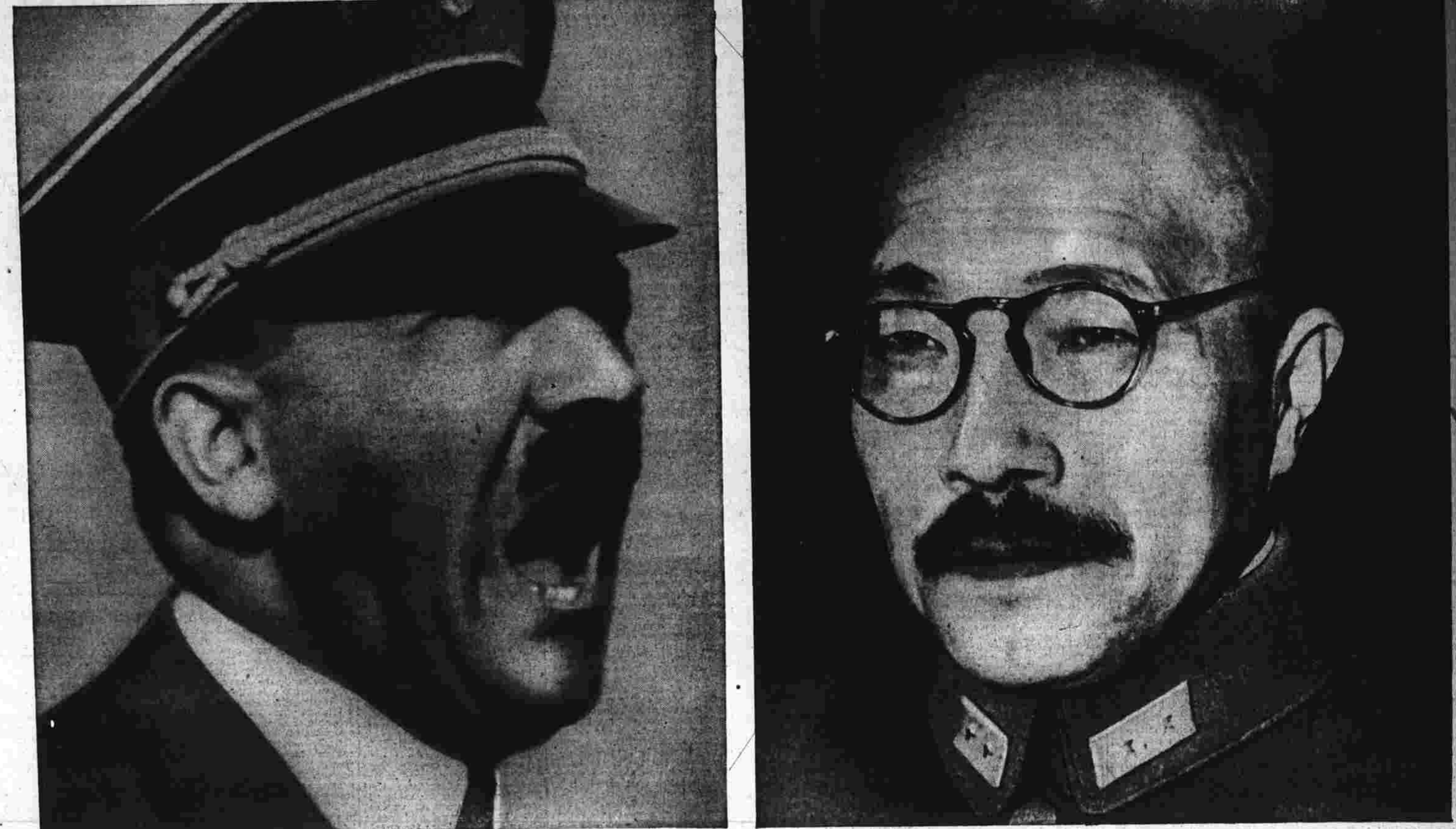
