They want to become known? That's foolish too. Pretty soon they learn that for every by-line you read in your newspaper there are 20 men in that same newspaper office who never get their name in

office who never get their name in print.

But maybe this is truer than any of the things mentioned above: The men who go into the newspaper business are looking for experience close up and they want to taste it, as somebody told Clapper to taste it in the South Pacific.

They go to hangings. That's part of their experience. They want to see how men act when they die and how men act when they die and how men act when they see men die. They talk their way into hospitals to see a baby born, or into a jail to see how a man confesses under strain.

Must Communicate to Others.

All living, or much of it, becomes part of their experience and thus part of themselves, enriching them. Then they begin to learn that being enriched is selfish and lonely unless they can communicate some of it to others.

The war was something new and greater than any of the newspapermen who went to it had ever known or would know again.
