Hartford, March 1. - (P) - A request for 2,395 out of state farm workers to help Connecticut farmers plant, raise and harvest their crops in the coming season has been transmitted to Washington by Paul L. Putnam, state farm

In a letter to Meredith C. Wilson, deputy director of the U. S. Farm Labor program, outlining Connecticut needs, Mr. Putnam said the farmers have expressed a preference for Jamaican workers. The number requested this year is more than double the supply of Jamaicans imported to Con-The 2,395 workers will be needed on a schedule of 1,296 by April
