London, March 2.—(AP)—U. S. Flying Fortresses and Liberators smashed at southwest Germany today hard on the heels of a 600-bomber assault by the R.A.F. last night upon the important war center of Stuttgart. The American target was not announced immediately, but the direction of the attack suggested a U. S.-R.A.F. double-strike night raid on the one of the most important cities in the Reich. Yanks Repulse Jap Admiral's Islands Units

Nearly 100 Dead After Nipponese Attack Before Daylight; Positions Are Consolidated.

Allied Headquarters, Southwest Pacific, March 2.—(AP)—Japanese troops were bloodily repulsed in a pre-dawn counter-attack yesterday against entrenched Americans in the Admiralty Islands, Gen. Douglas MacArthur said today. The enemy, recovering from the surprise of the invasion and the capture of the island of Buna, hit the American line around 4 a. m. but before daylight came they had been hurled back leaving nearly 100 dead. MacArthur's communique said that the Japanese were in a state of confusion and that the American forces were consolidating their positions.

French Rule In Occupied Areas Lags

Only Washington Approval of Proposal by De Gaulle Lacking in London Framework.

London, March 2.—(AP)—Only Washington approval of a proposal submitted by Gen. Charles de Gaulle for governing occupied parts of France was lacking today in the framework of political organization for the invasion of France, Allied officials said today. The plan was approved by the British, the Americans, the French, the Dutch, the Belgians, the Norwegians, and the Greeks. The only approval still lacking was that of the United States.

Aid to Turkey Comes to End

Reports Shipments Have Been Halted Seen as End of War Efforts.

London, March 2.—(AP)—Reports that lend-lease arms shipments to Turkey had been stopped were interpreted today as meaning Allied efforts to obtain Turkish military action against Germany had come to an unsuccessfull end. The reports were said to be the result of a decision by the British government to discontinue aid to Turkey.

House Control Cut by Deaths

Special Elections May Prevent Democrats Gaining Majority.

Washington, March 2.—(AP)—Deaths and special elections may prevent Democrats from regaining an absolute majority in the House of Representatives this session and reduce their membership to the lowest in more than 40 years.

Today's division stood at 216 Democrats and 209 Republicans, with five Democratic vacancies and one Republican vacancy.

Not since the 73rd Congress when it stood at 214, has the Democratic representation been so low. It started in the present Congress at 222, four more than an actual majority of the 435 members when all seats are filled.

1. The insertion of a new section outlawing consumer food substitutes.

3. A "spelling out" of the provisions of the act, including the authority to correct "gross inequities," so as to permit less latitude for liberal interpretations of the law by those who administer it.
