

All members of the crew except the fireman were among the dead.
Officials said no Allied personnel pass aboard the train.

London, March 7.—(A)—The Admiralty announced today the loss of the famed cruiser Penglope, which became known as "HMS Pepperpot" after she was scarred by 2,006 shell fragment holes in the Battle of Malta.

The Penglope was lost with the cruiser Spartan and the destroyers Janus and Inglefield in the establishment and maintenance of the Nettuno bridgehead in Italy, Commons was informed by A. V. Alexander, first lord of the Admiralty. Loss of the other vessels was announced previously. Five major assault vessels also were bridgehead casualties, Alexander said.

The Penglope survived 14 days of hombing in Malita's grand harbor during the height of the Axia campaign against the Mediterranean island bastion.
