### Closing of Border in Ireland Looms: Seen Inevitable

leaving the initiative largely to the United States because of the ancient feud with the Irish, and also for these other practical considerations: 1. Southern Irish volunteers made up a considerable part of the British armed forces; 2. Great numbers of southern Irishmen—they have been estimated as high as a quarter million—work in British war plants; 3. The ending of all trade with Eire would in some respects operate to the disadvantage of the British as well as the Irish.

Public Comment Temperate On both sides public comment was temperate. The biggest paper in Britain, Lord Beaverbrook's Express, subordinated its own editorial comment to that of the New York Times.

The British News Letter centered its editorial on the points that even with the new travel restrictions "the border remains a channel of leakage," and declared "it is difficult to envisage communications and traffic between the two great remaining sections of the De Valera's paper, the Irish Free, declared it still was not clear why the American attitude asking the ouster of Axis diplomats over the border "could have been only one answer, that which has been given."

The Daily Mail, Daily Express and other London newspapers all strongly emphasized the likelihood of restrictions on such Eire imports despite statements from both London and Washington officials that economic action would not be proposed.

Shaw Sees Refusal Of Irish Justified London, March 13.—(AP)—George Bernard Shaw, an Irishman himself, said today that he had instituted a drastic comb-out among the 50,000 Eire workers who have obtained resident permits in Northern Ireland since the war began.

**YOUR VICTORY GARDEN**

By Robert Geiger

Contour turning was a major remedy that helped cure the old dust bowl, and it is a farming idea that may add pounds of harvest to your Victory Garden. Here's how:

If your garden plot isn't level, don't attempt to run the irrigation ditches up and down the hill. Instead, extend them across the hill almost level but with just enough slope to permit water to run slowly.

This method prevents the water from washing away valuable topsoil and causes more of it to seep into each inch of the vegetable row.

When you irrigate your garden, allow the water to run down the slope as slowly as possible and never so fast that it causes erosion. With each watering, the soil should be soaked thoroughly, as it is washed by a steady rain. If such a method is used, irrigation does not have to be as frequent as when only the top soil is sprinkled. Frequent and light sprinkling can do serious harm to the extent as the top soil dries quickly and moisture fails to penetrate the deep roots. Light sprinkling on the other hand, keeps the shallow roots of weeds well watered and makes them flourish.

The texture of soil determines how much water it needs. Sandy soil dries quickly. Heavy soils much slower. In the United States, the Bureau of Agriculture experts estimate a garden needs a heavy soaking about once a week. If it stays dried lawn clippings or leaves are used to cover the ground between rows and around plants. It will conserve moisture and keep down weeds. It is usually resorted to that garden be irrigated by trench, but avoid by sprinkling, because sprinkling washes away chemicals that are sprayed upon plants to kill insects and diseases.
