 A formal statement of the company said operations in the first six months of 1943 were at a low level, although some improvement had occurred in the first two months of 1944.
 The specific details not given in the statement did not go into specific details concerning the reasons encountered, but the nature of the company's business, an outstanding producer of automatic firearms, including machine guns, rifles, pistols and revolvers, and the cancellation of government orders lay behind the dividend interruption.
 The company's statement said it would be on the winning side of this war, and thus obligated to put its principles into practice. It is true that, then, the actual problems of the peace must have seemed far in the distance.
 It is also true that, today, when the shaping of the peace has already begun, it is obviously more difficult to reconcile action and policy with these principles. It was a document relatively easy to sign when it demanded no immediate performance. It is a document which might be expedient to escape now that the time has come for actions which must either win or lose in the marketplace.
 But the essential truth and wisdom of these principles have not changed. They are still the principles upon which and future peace must be built. It is no easy task for statesmen to honor them, and they are inevitable in their midst for the past two years. In 1943, for instance, Manchester stood sixth among the 160 communities of the state in the number of warrants deeds recorded. In 1942 it was fifth in the state. In both 1943 and 1942 Manchester stood fifth in the state in the value of mortgage deeds recorded.
 In 1943, Manchester was seventh in the number of building permits issued, and fourth in the state in their value.
 Manchester has been, then, for two years, among the first six cities and towns of the state in statistics measuring real estate activity.
 We consider these statistics not significant because we wish to "boost" Manchester among the other cities and towns of the state. They are significant, we believe, because they give us here in Manchester a true impression of the scope and importance of what has been going on in Manchester, as well as a forecast of conditions as they may continue to be in the future.
 As a matter of fact, Manchester cannot conscientiously view all this activity with unmitigated pride. Some of this growth and development has taken place in the wrong way, in the wrong places, with injury to existing values and with unpleasant effect on future values.
 If Manchester had kept a proper eye on its own future, it would have seen fit to regulate some of this growth more wisely. But this is a fortunate thing for Manchester, not the end of the trail. There is a future as well as a past. The real estate activity of the future can be planned and controlled by the city government, by all states, great and small, on equal terms, and with some public office, to see that the number of heads into the future on which some decent idea of how it is going to come out, and with some guarantee that the result will be pleasing and value-increasing.
 It is for such reasons that it is to be hoped that the Board of Selectmen, in their meeting on the decision to let the inauguration of a town planning system wait until next October, will realize that Manchester has already waited too long for such planning, and make a well appreciated effort to bring the proposed planning program into reality as a much earlier date. It would be well worth a special town meeting.

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It Won't Die Easily
 When it was first drawn and signed back in August, 1941, there were skeptics who said that the Atlantic Charter was likely to prove nothing more than a scrap of paper. "Fine ideals," they said, with that particular brand of scorn which intimates that it would never be honored by its signers, never become really a guidepost to the world which would follow this war.
 Yet, very curiously, the Atlantic Charter has continued to hold the guardians and its protectors, who seem determined to keep it alive against the possible attacks of its own signers. This "improbable, idealistic" document continues to hold life and power. We need no better example of this than to consider what happens when Prime Minister Churchill, one of its original signers, undertakes a relatively mild redefinition of its significance. Public opinion in both Britain and the United States is immediately aroused, and aroused to a point where American diplomacy considers it necessary to reaffirm its allegiance to the document, to a point where even Mr. Churchill finds himself in a defensive position in the House of Commons. People, in other words, do care something about the Atlantic Charter. They are not willing that it should be carelessly dismissed or rewritten in terms of successive expedients. The idealistic piece of paper the skeptics said and would honor his impromptu, spontaneous defenders, who are not willing to let it die.
 Why is this so? Why has this piece of paper survived to date and retained strength? Why does it refuse to die easily?
 The answer, it seems to me, must lie in what the document itself contains. Its wording and principles must be such as to generate a strength of their own. And it occurs to us, at this moment, that it might be a good idea to reprint the document, for the refreshment of those who are interested in the issue, and who may not have seen the document in type for some years.
 The eight points of the Atlantic Charter, as signed by Churchill and Roosevelt and later also signed by other United Nations leaders, were described, by the document itself, as "certain common principles in the national policies of their respective countries or which they have their hopes for a better future for the world."
 The eight points are as follows:
 "First, their countries seek no aggrandizement, territorial or other."
 "Second, they desire to see no territorial changes that do not accord with the freely expressed wishes of the peoples concerned."
 "Third, they respect the right of all peoples to choose the form of government under which they will live, and they wish to see sovereign rights and self-government restored to those who have been forcibly deprived of them."
 "Fourth, they will endeavor, with due respect for their existing obligations, to further the enjoyment by all states, great and small, of equal rights, and to the same economic prosperity."
 "Fifth, they desire to bring about the fullest collaboration between all nations in the economic field with the object of securing for all improved labor standards, economic adjustment and social security."
 "Sixth, after the final destruction of the Nazi tyranny, they hope to see established a peace which will afford to all nations the means of dwelling in safety within their own boundaries, and which will afford assurance that
