Although farmers need no make their declaration until December 15, Mr. Hepburn said there might be an advantage in submitting it earlier. if the farmer waits until the last quarter of the cal endar year he must pay the entire amount of the tax at one time. By filing his declaration before, the April 15th date, however, the tax can be paid 'immediately or in installments if he so chooses. If his 1944 income changes considerably from his present estimate he can file an amendet declaration 'later the year.

Any farmer who overpaid his 1943 tax can credit the overpayment against his 1944 declaration, Mr. Hepburn said, provided he inlicated that option on his 1943 tax

Farmers who filed a declaration ast December should have receivi the necessary forms for the declaration, said Mr. Hep burn. The form in No, 1040ES, and s accompanied by a work shee which can be used for estimating the tax. If the form has not been received, Mr. Hepburn said it can be secured from any post office or rom the nearest office of the Co lector of Internal Revenue.
