Italian King Will Give Son Power When Rome Won

Vittorio Emanuele Proclaims to People and World He Will Retire From Public Affairs Entirely on Day Allied Troops Enter Capital.

Naples, April 12.—(AP)—Tired and bereft of empire, King Vittorio Emanuele III proclaimed to his people and the world today that he would turn over the power of the throne to his six-foot son Umberto, 39, of Pinerolo, Piedmont on the day that Allied troops enter Rome.

The 74-year-old king would appoint his son "lieutenant-general of the realm," would retire entirely from public affairs and that his decision was "final and irrevocable."

Yields Provisionally to Pressure This Vittorio Emanuele, whose 67th year is the longest since he was crowned king, yielded provisionally to the pressure of his people and his army.

He has refused to form a democratic government in Italy while he remained on the throne.

The king's action, said the king, "when our deep wounds will be healed and we will take once more our place as a free people among free nations."

Other representatives, who had called on the king, said that the only part the king had in this development was to sign the document.

"The king's action opened the way for a new government," said the king's spokesman.

He said that the king's action was a "great step" toward the realization of a democratic government in Italy.

London, April 12.—(AP)—More than 500 U. S. heavy bombers flying from Italy, attacked aircraft factories in the Vienna area today while British-based air fleets were sweeping toward Europe, carrying through the fifth day of the current campaign to cripple the German Air Force ahead of the German Army.

The 15th Air Force bombers from Italy conducted a heavy attack on a Messerschmitt factory at Wiener Neustadt, 30 miles south of Vienna, dropping many tons of bombs.

Returning crewmen report good coverage of this target, which was heavily damaged last November.

Liberal forces escorted by Thunderbolt fighters attacked the target.

Another heavy force attacked an aircraft and railroad yards at Zagreb, the capital of the puppet government of Croatia.

Portresses bombed a cement factory at Zadar, an important Yugoslav port.

Targets in the Vienna area, besides the Messerschmitt plant at Wiener Neustadt, were the Messerschmitt factory at Vienna, the Messerschmitt plant at Graz, and the Messerschmitt plant at Innsbruck.

The back-to-work move resulted from pleas by officials of the AFL-Rubber Workers union local, who said the walkout was unauthorized and a U. S. Labor department conciliator.

Neither company nor union officials have revealed the issues involved.

decrees issued by the government, among them one calling for public elections in the month of May for all political groups.

Other official source declared, "all of these things have been done in good faith with the United Nations. If we can say that Bolivia no longer offers a threat to a democratic victory, if we represent the will of the people and that the will of the government is with us, then of course we can establish normal relations with the United States."

The subject of recognition has not yet reached the point of diplomatic consultations between the governments of the Americas. But conversations between the department officials and Washington representatives of the Bolivian government have become more frequent.

It is known, too, that at least one Latin American envoy has openly brought up the subject of recognition in talks with officials of the State department.

Further, official sources said that study of the entire Bolivian problem in the light of recent Latin developments is on the official agenda of the State department this week.

It was learned that President Villarroel has prepared a decree calling for an extensive celebration at La Paz of Pan American Day, this Friday, and that he has prepared a message pleading for cooperation with and understanding of his country.

apparently in preparation for an offensive in force. Tito reported. The Yugoslav 7th brigade could not be seen at the base. The 8th division at Bugojno, killing 73 men, capturing a large store of arms and destroying the nearby power station at Vrsalje, which supplied power to Bugojno, the bulletin added.

Partisan troops joining up with Macedonian patriots have embarked on a widespread drive against Axis garrisons in Macedonia and have inflicted heavy losses on enemy forces, the bulletin said. Storing the big Zvetov mines the two groups completely destroyed the power station and mine machinery, destroyed the area, killed more than 140 Germans "and a great number of Bulgarians and policemen" took 50 Bulgarian prisoners and seized another large arms depot nearby, Tito declared.

Not one plane was lost in these prolonged operations yesterday. The American casualties covered these operations as the Dec. 18 landing at Arava, the Dec. 26 invasion at Cape Gloucester and the March 5 landing near Taloasak. At Bougainville, where American troops have expanded their bridgehead two miles on the Yorokina side, the total count of enemy dead for one month ending April 8 was announced as 5,370. Most of these Japanese died in a series of suicidal frontal assaults during March.

Other operations Monday included a 79-ton bombing of Rabaul by 300 South Pacific planes and a new assault on the Caroline islands, where installations at Wotani Island were hit and a Catalina bomber dropped a 1,000-ton steam cargo ship. A smaller freighter also was damaged there.

### No Farmer Tax Estimate Now

Declaration Not to Be Made Until Dec. 15  
Confusion Over Date  
Storrs, April 12.—Farmers who secure at least 50 percent of their gross income from farming are not required to make a declaration of their estimated 1944 tax on or before April 15th, Robert C. Johnson, assistant extension economist of the University of Connecticut, said today. Stating that there is considerable confusion among Connecticut farmers about the date, he added that those farmers whose taxable year is the calendar year are allowed until December 15, 1944 to make their declaration.

Named to State Labor Post  
Hartford, April 12.—Herbert S. Johnson, probate judge of the Haddam district, has been appointed director of the Minimum Wage Division of the State Department of Labor by Commissioner Cornelius J. Danaher. Judge Johnson, who began his new duties Monday, succeeds Mrs. Christine G. Beck with resigned in July of last year.

Although farmers need not make their declaration until December 15, Mr. Johnson said, they might be an advantage in submitting it earlier, if the farmer waits until the last quarter of the calendar year he must pay the entire amount of the tax at one time. By filing his declaration before, the April 15th date, however, the tax can be paid immediately or in installments if he so chooses. If his 1944 income changes considerably from his present estimate, he can file an amended declaration later in the year.

Any farmer who overpaid his 1943 tax can credit the overpayment against 1944 tax. Mr. Johnson said, provided he indicated that option on his 1943 tax return.

Farmers who filed a declaration in December should file the necessary forms for the 1944 declaration, said Mr. Johnson. The forms, No. 10428, and are accompanied by a work sheet which can be used for estimating the tax. The forms also can be secured from the nearest office of the Collector of Internal Revenue.

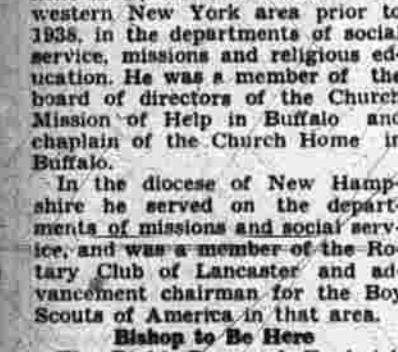

The Homemaker's Information Center, sponsored by the Manchester War Council and the Red Cross Nutrition Council, will be under the supervision of Miss Hannah Jensen who will be aided by volunteer workers. Miss Jensen cordially invites the people of Manchester to visit the center Thursday, between the hours of 2 and 4 and hopes that they will make full use of its facilities.

**Clearing House**  
Broadly speaking, the Homemaker's Information Center serves as a clearing house for consumer activities and a distributing point for information to housewives. It is designed to show people how they, as consumers, can adjust to the war and post-war needs of their country, maintaining at the same time as good a standard of living as possible. This includes the best use of civilian goods and services and cooperation with consumer regulations and programs of defense agencies.

Information services that may be undertaken by a center are: advice and information on subjects of consumer concern such as price control and rationing, labeling, weights and measures, consumer health protection, wise buying and use of food, clothing and household equipment, upkeep and repair, food production and preservation, local market supplies, household help, use of new products, wartime recipes, family health and welfare services, etc.

London, April 12.—(AP)—The German-controlled Vichy radio declared today that Italian Premier Marshal Pietro Badoglio had recognized the government of Marshal Josp Broz (Tito), leader of the Yugoslav Army of National Liberation.
