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**Denies Change To Come Soon**

'Slow-Downs' in Plants Manufacturing Small Arms Expected.

Hartford, May 8.—(AP)—Changing emphasis in the war production effort is expected to cause "slow-downs" in Connecticut plants manufacturing small arms. War Production Board District Manager Harold Bates has said in a statement that some war plants in the state may be converted to the production of civilian goods in the near future.

He said that plants affected by the change program would probably be in Bridgeport and New Haven. Bates said that the national war production program for 1944 calls for an increase of 25 per cent over the 1943 production of small arms. However, it is expected that the increase in tanks, trucks and airplanes but a decrease in the number of small arms produced.

**Can Expect Inactive Period**—Firms concentrating on small arms production, he said, could expect short periods of comparative inactivity until they convert to the production of munitions in demand. He stated that, where production of civilian goods, such production will probably be resumed in areas not well equipped for war production as New England despite the fact that the civilian production program will not get under way.

"Until we are certain we have the goods we need to issue a factory," he stated, "the civilian production program will not get under way."

"It is of course public knowledge," Lewis declared, "that certain members of the Executive Council have been given imitative instructions to refuse admission to the United Miners Workers of America to the American Federation of Labor by the New Deal politicians who are opposed for political reasons, to unity in the ranks of labor."

"Every well informed person in Washington knows the identity of the New Deal executives and members of its palace guard, as well as the identity of the individual members of the Executive Council, who from time to time during the past year have clandestinely conspired together to insure the consummation of their shameful plans to betray the interests of the men and women of labor."

Green declared in Philadelphia, where the AFL Executive Council was in session, that the "unintentional" inability to settle "jurisdictional differences" will be returned, as requested, but he added that the Executive Council expressed its wish that further conferences be held for the purpose of finding a basis of accommodation if possible.

Lewis' challenge of the War Labor Board authority in the coal wage dispute last year provided a problem that was resolved after the government had taken over the mines and eventually made pay concessions that far surpassed those Lewis demanded originally.

**Portugal Soon To Cut Supply**

Allied Efforts to Shut Off Wolfarm to Germany May Succeed.

Lisbon, May 8.—(AP)—Efforts of the United States and Britain to throttle the flow of strategic materials from Portugal to Germany appear likely to result soon in an agreement whereby Portugal will curtail, not suspend entirely, her wolfarm shipments to the Reich.

American Ambassador R. Henry Wood and British Ambassador Sir Donald High Campbell are collaborating on the matter and it is understood their instructions have been to press for a complete embargo on shipments of the steel-making pig-iron.

"Fit and Ready For Fight" — "And despite the malicious whisper, to the contrary," he said, "I can assure you that I am fit and ready to go for the eighth grade."

Hannegan said that Dewey criticized in 1940 the administration's recognition of Soviet Russia, but only recently for close cooperation between the United States, Great Britain, Russia and China.

He said also that Dewey had attempted to show four years ago that this nation could not produce 50,000 airplanes. Now, Hannegan said, America has produced for the armed forces 154,000 planes, and we have an air force of 2,385,000 men and 225,000 aircraft.

Barkley referred to Dewey as a "coy, demure, unannounced, but palpitating candidate for president." He said Dewey had been in the White House for only 100 days, and he had not yet been elected.

"The petty implications in this observation are too obvious to need photographic exhibition or blueprint delineation," Barkley said. (In Washington, Republican National Chairman Harrison E. Spangler said in a statement that Hannegan's speech brought into the open the "fourth term ambition which has, under the direction of Candidate Roosevelt, been under way for a year.")

**Senate Approves Extension of Lend Lease For Another Year**

Washington, May 8.—(AP)—Prospect that Congress may impose restrictions on the use of lend lease funds approved today in the case of Senate ratification of legislation extending the war air program for another year beyond July 1.

Still awaiting action in the administration's request for an additional \$1,500,000,000 in lend lease appropriations, and some Senators are out to make certain the funds are used for war purposes and not for other uses.

Senator Langer (R-ND), who cast the only vote against continuing the program, said he was "vehemently opposed to the reckless, nonsensical and almost criminal squandering of our war materials."

He called for a declaration of policy as to what this nation expects to receive for the \$22,500,000,000 it has spent thus far.

Question British Loan to China — Langer and Senator Brewster (R-Me.) questioned how Great Britain, largest recipient of lend lease aid, was able to advance \$100,000,000 loan to China.
