Senator Wherry of Nebraska, the Republican whip, said that if Mr. Roosevelt didn't talk any more about a fourth term he was dead about a third term. "That'll be plenty."

"Want to Take on Champ?"

"Of course, he is a candidate," Wherry declared. "All the Democrats are having a convention for it to have him tell them who he wants for vice president. And that's all right with the Republicans, because they want to beat the champ. We want the issue drawn clearly on the New Deal."

Senator Thomas (D, Okla.) felt that, while the President was not a candidate, he would accept a nomination. In somewhat the same vein, Senator Tamm (D, Del.) declared he believed it to be the best interests of the country to elect the President.

"I'm not surprised that the President doesn't want to talk about a fourth term," Tamm said. "I don't think his comments are indicative of what he plans to do, but I don't believe that he is in any sense a candidate."

Hannegan said in his speech that despite "malicious rumors to the contrary," the President is "at and ready for the fight." Commentators had an opportunity to observe that Mr. Roosevelt had acquired a tan and seemed generally rested by his southern vacation.

Ringworm of Scalp Sweeping Nation

New York, May 10.—(AP)—A recommendation that children keep their hats on in movies, subways and other places as protection against a pandemic of ringworm of the scalp sweeping the United States was made by the Medical Society of the State of New York today.

A group of five New York physicians reported that New York city had an epidemic of this disease and that reports from other large cities indicate that it is approaching epidemic proportions elsewhere.

The American outbreak seems to be a wartime tribulation. The doctors said there are three explanations. One, so many mothers bring baby away in war factories or offices. Two, country-wide migrations of war workers. Three, crowding of children in institutions where it is difficult to get adequate help to care for them.

This scalp disease is not dangerous, but it is difficult to diagnose and its cure requires much patience.

Will Expand Use of Dogs

Hickey Announces Plans To Train Members of State Police.

Hartford, May 10.—(AP)—Taking note of the use of the armed forces made of dogs in combat and on guard duty, State Police Commissioner Edward J. Hickey has announced that his department will expand its use of police dogs.

In the future, Hickey said yesterday, dogs will be used for tracking fugitives, finding wounded, injured or lost persons, attacking and holding criminals until they are placed under arrest and guarding property.

In the past, Hickey said, dogs had been used only by state police in tracking criminals and finding lost persons.

State Police Commissioner Walter W. Foley of Bridgeport, who has been in charge of the department's bloodhounds at the Ridgefield barracks will serve as instructor in the new development, Hickey said.

The patrolman is attending a six-week training course in handling police dogs at the Royal Canadian Mounted Police school at Rockcliffe, near Ottawa, Canada.

A recently acquired German shepherd accompanied Foley to Canada and will take part in the training program.

On completion of his course in Canada, Foley will teach other members of the state police force how to become dogmasters.

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British Push Foe Back From Their Indian Invasion

Officially Estimated Japanese Have Lost 15,000 Dead Alone Since Feb. 1; Casualties Inflicted by Stilwell's Forces Not Included.

Southeast Asia Headquarters, Kandy, Ceylon, May 11.—The British continued to drive the Japanese back from their Indian invasion today and it was officialy estimated that the enemy had lost 15,000 dead alone since Feb. 1 on the Arakan front...

The figure excludes casualties inflicted on the Japanese by Gen. Joseph W. Stilwell's American-trained Chinese driving down from north Burma, where the latest figures showed 5,000 Japanese had been killed up to the end of the month...

The number of Japanese wounded during the fighting since Feb. 1 was not estimated, but Japan's total casualties were much greater than those suffered by the Allies, whose losses were not disclosed.

No major activity was reported yesterday in the Kohima neighborhood, the communique said, but fighting continued on the eastern base to the north, numbered 8,000 in the two months the enemy had been attempting to gain the Japanese bases of Moguing and Myittha.

Appearance of Japanese troops in the Iri valley northeast of Imphal was reported yesterday. Imphal was captured a position eight miles east of Kengtung, which lies between Imphal and Kohima.

The announcement, which accounts the Imphal-Kohima areas said at least 6,000 enemy troops had perished on the march.

Gen. Douglas MacArthur announced that 422 of the liberated Allied were Sikhs, Indian soldiers captured in Malaya by the Japanese early in the war. Japanese numbered 86, and the rest were American, Chinese, Poles and Czechs.

Not far from the largest number recaptured from the enemy in any other theater of the war was the only sizeable group yet liberated except for a detachment of 589 additional for re-nomination of the first ballot at the July Democratic convention in Chicago.

Washington Democrats may furnish 18 of these in a state convention Saturday. With action of 19 delegates at a state convention tomorrow, this will complete the party's party affiliation.

French Railyard Hit By Yankee Bombers; Air Fields Attacked

Allied Bombers Attack the Hague Building. British Mosquito bombers, attacking at low level with delayed action and incendiary bombs, destroyed a building in the Hague said to house documents vital to the Germans.

London, May 11.—The importance of France's transport system in the impending invasion of western Europe was emphasized by both the Allies and Germans today as the London radio urged the French to keep off the highway after the attack starts and Yichy repeated that passenger train service would be cut Monday to facilitate troop movements.

The night attack followed a day-long raid by medium forces of American heavy bombers against German aircraft factories at Wiener Neustadt, Austria, near Vienna, and against the Yugoslian railway center of Kzin, a communication hub.

Thirty-three Allied planes were reported missing from all the operations. The Allies were setting the remnants of the bomb-ridder railway system for westward movement in order to help maintain the Atlantic wall.

Some passenger trains apparently still will run. The announcement said service would be "seriously curtailed."

The daylight armadas followed up last night's fourth assault on Budapest by bombers, striking from bases in Italy. Last night's heavy and medium bomber attack on the Hungarian capital came close to the heels of daylight bombs yesterday.

Washington, May 11.—The Senate's approach was predicted today for President Roosevelt's nomination of Undersecretary James N. Forrestal to be secretary of the Navy.

At the Navy department where Forrestal had served with distinction for four years it was generally expected that the main line of administrative policies would continue unchanged.

Forrestal's chief task will be that of getting production and delivery of ships, guns and aircraft on line but to this he will have to add the responsibility of seeing the Navy principal agencies to the public, especially in advisory capacity, and to have shatter-proof windows in buildings across the street.

Washington, May 11.—The Marines today backed up the Navy's position that any congressional action based on administrative consideration of the armed forces should be taken only after very careful study.

Leut. Gen. A. A. Vandegrift, Marine commandant, told the House Post-War Military Policy committee, which earlier heard Navy leaders advocate continuation, that he could envision no gain to our country's readiness for war in any reorganization which would displace Vandegrift.

Workers Rap Germans Claim Soviet Bridgehead Destroyed

Assert Axis Troops Still Fighting in Crimea West of Sevastopol; Report Not Confirmed.

Philadelphia, May 11.—The workers delegates to the International Labor conference representing labor movements in 29 nations, issued a declaration today denouncing what they termed "the Fascist regime now in power in Argentina."

At the same time they withdrew their objection to admitting Luis "Lola, the Argentine workers' deliberative body in the conference after V. Lombardo Toledano, president of the Argentine workers' union, protested that the Russian army could not work with delegates from democratic nations.

The declaration went on to condemn the interference of the Argentine government with freedom of association, freedom of thought and expression.

The workers "pledged the individual support of all free trade unions and the Communist and Socialist parties to the workers of Argentina."

London, May 11.—(P)—Three thousand Allied planes dumped an estimated 5,000 tons of explosives on German airports and rail centers in western Europe today in the 27th day of the great, pre-invasion assault. In one of the strongest assaults of the war on Hitler's already-dilettante system of military railroads, Allied formations late last night and today singled out eight large rail centers serving the western defense wall on which to loose most of their explosives.

American Liberator bombers continued the systematic destruction of Hitler's western railway system today, bombing 27th straight day in France after Marauders and Havocs had thrown new blows at coastal fields near Paris and aerial attacks on the German coast.
