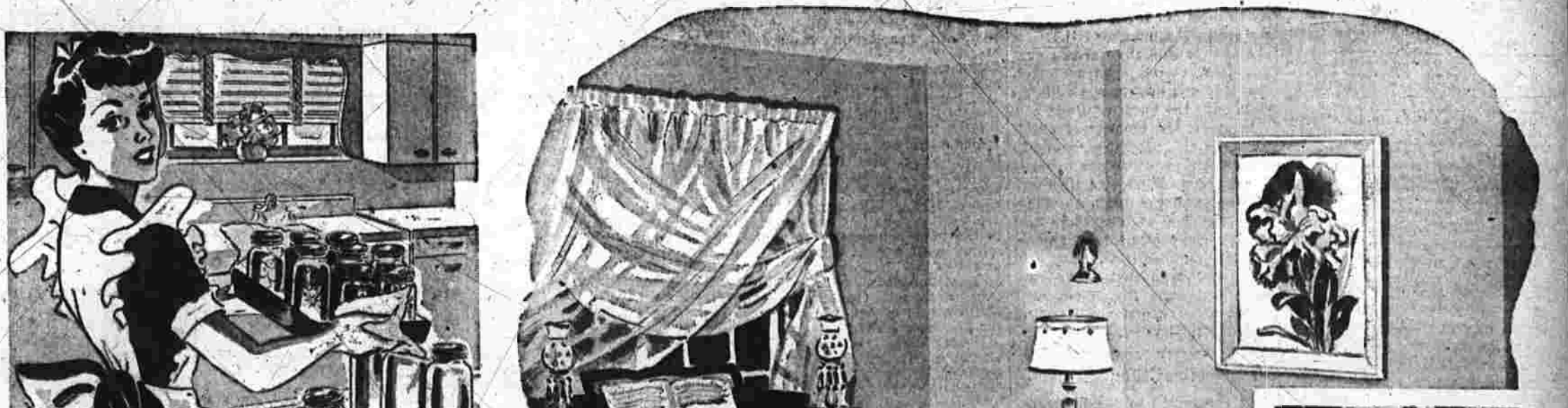

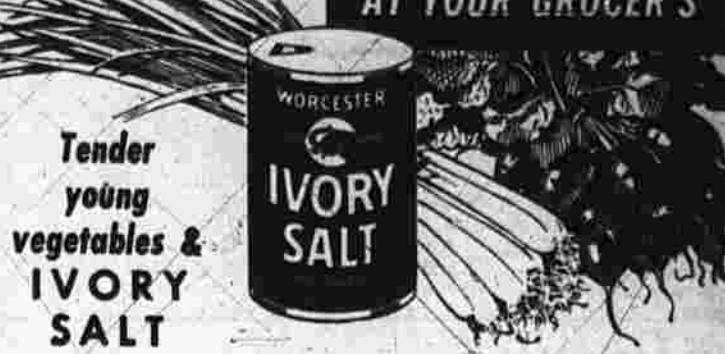

front from Casimo to the sea crunched forward at 11 p. m. last night under a record shattering artillery barrage, shattering the initial objectives at a number of points. Hundreds of planes, and big naval guns supported the brilliant flashes of the Allied battle tanks.

"Far behind the German lines the bursting shells seemed to be specially the Hitler line with electric signboard. The guns never ceased and after four hours there seemed no perceptible slackening. There was very little answering the way.

A special communiqué announcing the beginning of the offensive at the regrouping of the Allied armies had been "successfully completed without enemy interference," adding:

"Covered by Air Action and by continual air action and pressure on the enemy, the front moved forward at a rapid pace. Complicated and heavy road and rail movements of men and material were being smoothly carried out."

The announcement said that the German line had been broken in several places and that the Allies had advanced "made heavy calls on all administrative services."

"Despite bad weather and difficult terrain the regrouping has been accomplished on a wide front and communications continued."

The land gains were wedged driven into the German defenses, but these were merely part of a general offensive which was the line of the powerful German mountain positions.

Rail Lines Kept Seized

Allied air power in incessant pounding of Nazi communication lines has kept all north-south rail lines in Italy severely disrupted. The attack came as the world awaited a cross-channel invasion.

French troops went into action first, making a surprise opening up all across the peninsula, and especially in the Gargano and Casimo sectors where the Fifth and Eighth Armies attacked simultaneously with the start of the battle.

Initial objectives included high areas of strategic importance, and operations including reaching the Adriatic and Italian forces of the Eighth Army crossed the Rapido and Gar rivers early today, pressing on toward first objectives in the Casimo area. A front detachment from Canadian Forces was reported Douglas Amaron declared. The Gari is a small stream four to five miles south of Casimo, running between the Rapido and Gari rivers.

The Germans, who long have been controlling the rise and fall of the Rapido river, through a reservoir system, apparently opened the gates, sending surging waters down as the Allied attack opened.

It is a full Allied stroke — by American, British, Dominion, Polish, French and Italian troops — which is being reported. General Clark's Fifth Army struck on the westward flank remaining from the Tyrrhenian sea, and the British Eighth Army transferred from the Adriatic, plunged forward in the bloody Casimo sector. 25 miles inland on the curved battlefield, and attempting to drive up the Liri valley.

Fifth Army men fought into the rugged mountain pass rising from the Gargano valley, southwest of Casimo, in an effort to clear these heights.

No Offensives At Anzio

Latest reports indicated no big offensive action had yet been launched on the Anzio beachhead where Romo, some 50 miles west of Casimo.

"Hundreds of Allied warplanes blasted at the Germans in many north-south support of the ground troops."

The Navy supported the attack, turning its big guns on the German lines.

The Nazis were reported fighting desperately, throwing a curtain of mortar, artillery and machine-gun fire, and using flame-throwers on at least one Fifth Army sector.

The thundering Allied artillery barrage was described as the heaviest yet had down in this theater, surpassing even the great artillery displays that hampered the British in Africa.

### Local Draft Boards Hold Real Authority

Will Apply Policy in Deferment Field According to Conditions They Face.

By James Marlow and George Zelle

Washington, May 12.—(AP)—Draft age men up to 38 in connection with the latest Selective Service notice to draft boards to 34—should remember that the authority of the local draft board is not a guide. Not a mandate. If any men are ordered inducted by their board but think they are in the proper job category for deferment, they can appeal.

Guide, Not Mandate

Each board has a list of the 30 industries that was manpower commission considers essential. Most boards seem certain to follow that list. They don't have to. It's a guide. Not a mandate.

But what of the present 1-A classification of men 36-39 who are necessary under the new SS notices? And what of the 1-A classification of the men 30-37 engaged in the jobs outlined above?

The boards have been told to review their classifications and place them in 2-A or 2-B, as the individual case deserves. Should these men just leave it up to the boards to reclassify them? No. Check with your boards to see that it is done.

Job for Boss

SS particularly emphasize, in the 30-37 group engaged in the outlined activities that forms 42B may be used for making requests for their deferment to get them out of 1-A. This is a job for their boss.

This should be noted: SS has notified the boards that all men 18 through 37 who are physically disqualified for military service (1-F) or qualified only for limited service may now be classified 2-A or 2-B if they are regularly engaged in an activity in war production or in support of the national health, safety or interest. The deferment of such "necessary" men "for the time being" is not to be deferred.

All men 30 through 37, physically fit or otherwise, don't have to be "necessary." They are to be deferred if they are "regularly engaged in an activity in war production or in support of the national health, safety or interest."

But what is a "necessary" man? And what is an activity in war production? Each board will have to answer those questions for itself. One

### Basket Pinch New Problem

State War Council to Urge Containers Be Kept in Circulation

Hartford, May 12.—(AP)—The Connecticut War council, seeking to relieve an anticipated shortage in peach baskets which are used in the harvest of both peaches and tomatoes, has decided to circulate 6,000 Connecticut food retailers urging that containers of all sorts be kept in circulation rather than in storage in cellars and warehouses.

The move was decided upon yesterday at a meeting called by State War Administrator Henry B. Moore and attended by representatives of the War Production Board, the War Food Administration, the University of Connecticut Extension service, the State Department of Agriculture, the Connecticut Vegetable Growers' Association and the Connecticut Pomological Society.

Apple Growers Appreciative

While the peach basket is expected to be the number one short in the state, Moore said, apple growers are apprehensive that containers of apples will also be scarce in the event there is a large apple crop.

Benjamin P. Storrs, director of the Bureau of Markets, State Department of Agriculture, told the meeting that, with normal yields, two million bushel baskets would be needed this year to market fruits and vegetables, a million and a quarter peach baskets and a million one-bushel apple boxes.

The State Salvage committee will investigate the possibilities of salvaging crates and baskets from the home, it announced.

Death Takes News Writer

George R. Morris, Jr., Dies Following Second Heart Attack. Waterbury, May 12.—George R. Morris, Jr., 48, newspaper writer and cartoonist and for the past several years New London correspondent for The Norwich Bulletin, died unexpectedly tonight at his home in Bayside road, Mago Point, a few hours after being stricken by a second heart attack in three weeks.

He was staff correspondent at the governor's office for nine years, and was last year of John H. Trumbull's tenure of office and served as a reporter during the eight-year term of Gov. William L. Cross, for an International Press Association. He was a contributing editor of the Connecticut Press Association, and contributor to several other magazines.

Recently Mr. Morris completed a book which dealt with the life of the late Governor John H. Trumbull, and which was published by the Connecticut Press Association. The book will soon be published.

Mr. Morris was married to Mrs. J. W. Morris, his wife, his father and three children.

Cutworm Real Villain In Garden Sabotage

Storks, May 12.—The cutworm early evening before the sun goes to work. The man can be seen in the garden at night, but he is not to be touched. He is in no wise to be confused with the white grub which has only one front leg. The poison man can be made in quantities sufficient for the home garden by mixing two-thirds of a pound of white arsenic or lead arsenate with one quart of water. The dose should be repeated every three or four days.

The cutworm can be distinguished from the white grub by its long, thin body and its habit of crawling on its back. It is a pest of the garden, and it is a villain in garden sabotage.
