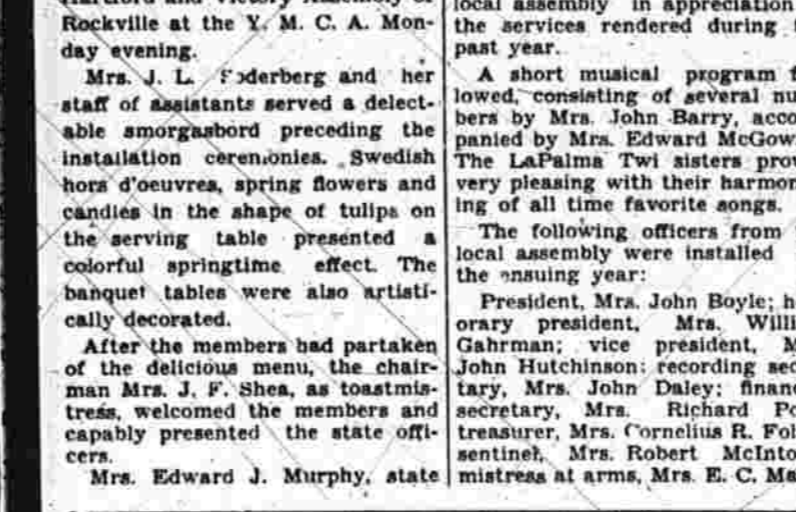

### Stamford Man Gains Freedom

#### Saxe Draft Evasion Case Stricken from Court Records

Hartford, May 17.—(AP)—A Stamford man, charged with violation of the Selective Service Act, has won his freedom in U. S. District court because his draft board failed to notify the government of failure of the registrant to receive his order to report for induction.

The case against Benjamin F. Saxe was stricken from the records yesterday on the recommendation of Thomas J. Dodd, Jr., special assistant to the attorney general, who said he had been informed by a clerk of Saxe's local draft board that the notice of induction mailed to Saxe had been returned to the draft board.

Dodd termed the situation "regrettable" and told the court he had taken steps to prevent another similar occurrence.

**May Face Another Charge**

He indicated, however, that Saxe, who had been kept at the Hartford county jail pending trial, might be presented before another grand jury on another charge, failure to keep his draft board advised of his correct address.

Saxe has a criminal record.

### Colt Hour Cut Probe Sought

#### Union Officials Seek Investigation of Alleged Drastic Slash

Hartford, May 17.—(AP)—An "immediate investigation" of the Colt's Patent Firearms Manufacturing Company has been asked by officials of the United Electrical and Machine Workers' Local (UEMW) following the disclosure of an alleged drastic slash in the plant's work week, which, they charge, the company has announced to go into effect today.

A telegram demanding the investigation was sent to War Production Board Chairman Donald M. Nelson yesterday by President James J. Connors of the UEMW. Copies were also sent to the National War Manpower Commission, and Brig. Gen. Guy Drewery of the Springfield Ordnance district.

The telegram stated that the union leaders appear protesting the alleged impending reduction, declared that "at the moment our forces are bent in preparing an all-out offensive against the enemy, it is not the time to reduce production of vital military equipment."

The temperature of the plant, it is claimed, has been "viciously" lowered.

Connors declared he would bring the situation "before every agency interested in the successful prosecution of the war."

He said the proposed work week hourly reduction would reduce the wages of Colt's workers even below the protected level of the Brown award which precipitated two walkouts recently and led up to production at the plant.

He declared it would bring the hourly rate in the plant from 42.3 hours to 33 hours per week.

"It certainly seems peculiar," Connors said, "that in an era where even non-essential industries are expected to operate on a 48-hour week that a company manufacturing vital war materiel can arbitrarily reduce its work week to 33 hours."

**Formal Notice Friday**

Connors and Patrick J. Ward, local business agent, said they had been notified of the change "informally" yesterday afternoon by company officials.

Although company officials denied having any such plan in view, they said that it is possible that some such arrangement can come about as the result of unbalanced production which has been the outcome of the strike.

Waterbury, May 17.—(AP)—Will the declaration that he was not passing on the innocence or the guilt of the accused, Judge Nathan Rebek of New Haven has charged that former City Selectman Michael Stoff had voted fraudulently and had ordered him bound over to the Superior Court in bonds of \$500.

The state's charge, originally filed by Albert O. Fuller, Republican registrar of voters, held that Stoff had been sworn in as a voter in 1937 although he had not become a citizen until 1939.

Another Michael Stoff, who identified himself as a cousin of the former selectman, took the stand at yesterday's hearing and testified that he was the Michael Stoff who had been made a voter in 1937. He said he had voted only once after that.

### Senate Sits Stolidly On Treaties Power

#### Bloom Waits House to Share and Ratification by Majority Vote of Both Houses

By James Marlow and George Zelik

Washington, May 17.—(AP)—Representative Bloom (D-N.Y.), chairman of the House Foreign Affairs committee, has tried to start a fire under the Senate house.

Like a chicken jealously monopolizing an egg because it's the only one of its kind, the Senate has been sitting stolidly on its gigantic power over treaties. No amount of criticism or nudges has been able to budge it.

Under the constitution the president approves treaties with foreign nations but those treaties must be submitted to the Senate for ratification which can come only by a vote of two-thirds of the members present.

**Two Changes Urged**

Forecasting the vast complications and responsibilities in and for the future in this nation's foreign affairs, Bloom wants two things:

1. He wants the House to share the Senate's treaty power.

2. He wants ratification to be made possible by a majority vote of both houses instead of a two-thirds vote which is far harder to attain.

At his own expense he has published 2,000 pamphlets explaining why he believes this step should be taken. Requests have tumbled in on him for copies so fast, Bloom says, that he is having another 5,000 printed.

These are some of the points he makes:

Under the Senate's present exclusive power, partisan and political cliques are able to sacrifice the public interest and "Senate minorities have repeatedly abused this power."

Only a majority vote is needed to pass the nation's laws, so why not a majority vote on treaty ratification since under the constitution a treaty considers the nation's future?

### Town Future in the Balance

Mayor and Building Inspector David Chambers has been optimistic enough to predict that the next era of residential building in Manchester will feature homes and developments of decent aspect, in harmony with the best of the city's heritage.

It is to be hoped that the city's future will be bright, but it must be pointed out that only certain conditions can give him the chance of being right.

The plain, inescapable fact is that no one in his right senses is going to build homes of high medium valuation anywhere in Manchester if it continues Manchester's policy to allow low-cost housing of the war emergency type to be located indiscriminately throughout the town.

Manchester hopes to have developments of the type Mr. Chambers predicts really happen in Manchester. It must first be prepared to guarantee them a town policy which protects values.

If the builders of low-cost housing are going to continue to run the town as they please, if they are going to be permitted to ignore those areas of values which have been the pride of Manchester, the prediction of the future is only a pleasant dream.
