5th Army Merges Italian Fronts; Retreat Hasty

(Continued From Page One) The start of the offensive has mounted to 10,000, headquarters said.

Destroy 233 More Vehicles

Following up yesterday's dawn to dusk air assault on long columns of German convoys when more than 600 vehicles were destroyed or damaged, Allied Air Forces again raised havoc with enemy transport and by late afternoon reported the destruction of 233 more.

Warhawks Caught Two Streams of Vehicles

A special headquarters communique announced the contact by patrols a few miles southeast of the beachhead on the coastal highway between Terracina and Anzio.

Units of the 5th Army

Units of the 5th Army are being pushed on the borders of Montenegro and Sandjak in violent battles, and in all other sectors, notably Croatia, the German offensive has been checked.

Cisterna Flanked Deeply

Already the beachhead 20 miles behind Rome was breaking out to the east with German armor and deep on both sides and attacked the outskirts in a frontal assault.

The German Communique

The German communique hinted at a new thrust along the beachhead, declaring Allied troops had landed behind the German lines on the western wing of the beachhead but had been annihilated.

Earlier, the Germans had announced withdrawal from the coastal strip between the beachhead and the Allies were employing "monstrous tank formations in a series of crushing attacks."

German Fleet Northward

German troops who fought to hold Terracina, 22 miles behind the beachhead, reported strong resistance through the night of the northward advance.

Troops of the Main Front

"Troops of the main front, were winning powerful enemy resistance, have fought their way forward in a series of attacks since May 11 over some of the most difficult terrain of the whole Italian campaign," said the special communique.

Official communique added that the beachhead, established by surprise landings Jan. 22, had played an important role in the current offensive, as its threat to the German rear had prevented the Germans from massing full strength against the drive forward through Cassino and Formia.

No Mention of Appian Way

While the first land contact with the beachhead was established since last January, the communique made no mention of the condition of the Appian way across the Pontine marshes.

At another point

"At another point," the bulletin said, "Chinese attacked an abandoned Japanese company position. At the same time other elements of this force 'occupied an additional enemy position before surrounding a second Japanese stronghold, where 30 enemy dead were found."

On the Salween river front

On the Salween river front in China's Yunnan province, Chinese troops were reported to have captured Kailuo, 28 miles northeast of the Japanese base at Tengchong, in a local advance.

Attacks against surrounding Japanese forces

Attacks against surrounding Japanese forces on the northern sector of the Salween front continued, and their situation now is considered desperate," the communique added.

Two Jap Air Fields Prime Objective

Advanced Allied Headquarters, New Guinea, May 25.—"Two Jap air fields and a month-long reinforced American Sixth Army troops pressing west today against the main enemy stronghold which had ringed the beachhead west of New Guinea.

One partially-completed air field

One partially-completed air field was three and one-half miles ahead of the Yanks, who crossed the river after a five-day attack. An equal distance beyond is the serviceable Savan airstrip.

Enemy To Fight For Sector

The Americans met resistance strong enough to indicate that the enemy is going to make a fight for the Maffin bay sector, some 120 miles northwest of captured Hollandia. An indication of the severity of the fighting was given in an official spokesman's words:
