Civil Service Commission, Washington, D. C., through the state beginning at 9 a. m. Saturday, July 29, 1944.

Bol Drinking Water

Evaporated and dried milk have the same food value as fresh milk. Evaporated milk requires no boiling after it is mixed. If kept in the refrigerator after the can is opened, both evaporated and dried milk will keep fresh for two or three days. After the holes have been punched in the top of the evaporated milk can, a cap should be turned over it to keep the milk from drying, and to protect it from dust.

Danbury Concerns Facing Charges

Danbury, June 9.—Hearing charges that the New England Air Company, Inc., and the Aero-Wear Company, Inc., of Danbury, violated the minimum wage overtime provisions of the Walsh-Healey public contracts act, will begin Tuesday, June 13, at 10 o'clock in the civil service room of the Danbury post office building.

It will be the second hearing of its kind in Connecticut since the law was enacted in 1936. It became law on June 30, 1936. Attorney James A. Albert of the U. S. Department of Labor will represent the government's case. The public contracts act, No. 306, which concerns all employees who enter into a contract with the government in excess of 10,000, was violated by the corporations, according to the secretary of labor during the period when the contracts were produced on contract for the Army.

New Haven, June 9.—Mrs. Charles E. Rolfe of Hamden, will head the speakers' bureau for the 1944 Connecticut War Fund campaign. It was announced today by Mrs. Bigelow, state campaign chairman.

Representing 19 national agencies, including USO, War Reliance, the United Seaman's Service, Allied relief agencies and other welfare services, the War fund's autumn campaign is combined with that of community needs throughout the state.

Nylon Priority Clubs Rapped

Washington, June 9.—(AP) Nylon priority clubs were condemned by the Office of Price Administration today.

OPA says some stores are offering such schemes as a pair of hosiery for the purchase of a pair of nylon, late or cotton bought now. A typical set-up gives a customer nylon priority credit to be purchased for each purchase of wartime goods. Such schemes are not only a violation of the future publicly until the priority purchasers get their chance at them.

OPA says consumers don't have to join nylon clubs to get nylon when they become available and labels the priority clubs illegal.
