Speaking for the 6,000 people who represent the telephone company in Connecticut, I want to tell you briefly about the home telephone situation, particularly as it affects—

- 1. Those of you who want a home telephone installed. 2. Those of you present home subscribers who may now, or later on, plan to move and want your service transferred to a new address.

FIRST, a word to you who want a home telephone. As of today, there are about 20,000 of you on the waiting lists of our business offices throughout our state.

The reason is a shortage of telephone equipment, manufacture of which for normal civilian needs was practically suspended late in 1942.

To all of you we must say frankly that our chances of filling your order depend upon three factors. They are: (1) the extent to which present subscribers may decide to give up service, thus releasing certain equipment, instruments, outside wires, etc.

Now may I take a moment to say something on behalf of us telephone people? It concerns you too. We don't like to use the words "No" and "We don't know when" any more than you like to hear them.

We have a pretty good idea how you feel when you've been accustomed to telephone service when and where you want it—and can't get it. We think we know how "Sorry" sounds when you, as an applicant for new service, move into a new place and find that the previous tenant's instrument must be put back into the "pool" to fill an order ahead of yours.

While we expect to be able to fill during 1944 a considerable number of the earlier orders now on file, we cannot predict when our installers will reach your home. From present indications, the waiting period will be a year or longer for those of you who are currently placing orders.

But we do promise you this: Your application will not be forgotten, and it will be filled strictly in order of receipt.

SECOND, to present home telephone subscribers who plan to move. So far, we have been able to transfer home service for many of our present subscribers who have moved from one location to another.

Meanwhile, we are finding an attitude of cooperation and understanding on your part that is genuinely appreciated by all of us.

They Make The Good News

Factors which motivate our high command to declare that conditions on the beachhead "could not be better" are many and of varying importance.

First, the beachheads have been enlarged and joined until they cover over 600 square miles of territory. Into that area we have, on our own unofficial estimates, poured some 200,000 men with their equipment. The Germans place this figure much higher—300,000 or 400,000.

We have landing strips established in this beachhead, meaning that a portion of our air force can now be on the scene ready for instant action.

All this adds up to the fact that, even without our capture of the port of Cherbourg, our landing operation "despite" it is considered a success. It is our power enough now to begin negotiating tough offensives in a big way.

For proof of this optimism in specific action, there comes this morning the German admission of the loss of Carment, second in importance only to Caen as a "stopper" for the bottle we are trying to make of the Cherbourg peninsula.

The news only yesterday described Carment as a "Casino-like" battle. This beachhead battle has had its relatively soft spots and its very tough spots.

But when Rome did fall, the forces of Italian liberalism were still strong, perhaps stronger than we expected them to be. And we, game of blustering the people who had followed Mussolini and fought against us.

Out of 22 years of exile came Signor Ivanoe Bonomi as a candidate for premier acceptable to the varied liberal and democratic elements to the area of hard fighting around Caen. Evrux is 570 miles east of Caen.

The loss of Carment was delivered by twin-engined Mosquitoes which pounded the German capital with 4,000-pound bombs. Nearly 7,000 Allied planes, flying in support of the Normandy offensive yesterday, gave the Germans the heaviest bombardment in light bombers since the invasion began.

No one can predict that this new government is going to be one of going to last, or going to give the eventual election support of the Italian people. But one happy point is clear. We have finally, in Italy, given up the sort of opposition of democracy. We are finally beginning to act as if our cause were really liberation.

The Russians have repeatedly given us what seemed to be extravagant statistics on the "Nazi casualties they have inflicted, and the even more redoubtable task of taking Caen, where German resistance has consistently been stronger. British troops are moving past the city on both sides for encirclement preceding a final attack.

Such developments are still all in the realm of hard fighting. Even the general optimism of our own headquarters recognizes what still lies ahead. But there is one thing emerging one fairly consistent and encouraging, even if mystifying fact. It is that the enemy has not yet been all we thought him to be.

The Atlantic Wall itself wavered, for all its occasional hard spots, as difficult as we thought it was going to be. And, once the original landings were accomplished, German counter-action hasn't been as well organized as might have been expected. That isn't to say that it may not develop organization and plan. But it hasn't done so to date.

The Luftwaffe, whatever it is, is still being hoarded, although the most effective days for its use may have passed. How German troops like fighting without it we don't know, but we can guess. We, the invaders, with the odds against us, have been taking more prisoners than would seem logical by the rules of war. Four hundred Germans have surrendered to 100 Americans.

The Allied pilots said enemy flak still was the biggest hazard. The Germans also claimed to have sunk one small troop transport in the Seine bay last night. American Marauders and Havocs bombed bridges and highway bridges targets at Aunay sur Odon, southwest of Caen, La Haye du Puits, west of Carment, and Conde without loss, and panicked concentration of troops at Falaise, southwest of Caen, flying so low a sergeant gunner reported, "You could pick out German lieutenants from sergeants and about the lieutenants."

Nonetheless, by our policy in Italy itself and by various oratory and diplomatic emphasis, we still seemed to be doing our best to bolster King Victor Emmanuel and Badoglio, two men who were in much the same relationship to Mussolini that Goering or some Prussian general holds to Hitler.

Finally, before the fall of Rome, we gave up on Victor Emmanuel, who promised to retire and to retire to the island of Brindisi. It was assumed, then, that the fall of Rome would proceed merely an inconsequential ceremony of some military in which Prince Umberto would take over, Badoglio would formally resign and immediately form a new cabinet, and then carry on as before.

Growers in This Vicinity Refuse to Sell; Does Not Pay to Harvest.

Strawberry growers in this vicinity refused to sell at ceiling prices when the Manchester Auction Market opened for the season yesterday. They took their berries home.

Only 30 crates were offered. According to the auction officials the grower got \$7.80, the auctioneer 15 cents and carting added 20 cents which made the cost of the crate \$8.20.

On Saturday the Hartford office of the State OPA moved to correct what it said was an erroneous impression on the part of growers that the commodity is not under price control. It announced that top retail price in any market is 56 cents a quart. Top price that can be legally asked by a wholesaler is \$9.25 for a crate of 24 quarts. It was announced.

The Growers' Complaint Growers who took home their berries yesterday said that it was impossible to sell berries at these prices. They were allowed, under the OPA ruling, but 32-1-2 cents a quart. They said berry plants prices went up 300 per cent. Per- tiller cost more, baskets and crates nearly doubled in price over last year and picking cost five to six cents a basket.


