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Role of Small Nations Point To Be Cleared

Republicans Ask Roosevelt to Define Place in Proposed International Security Council

Washington, June 16—(AP)—Republicans called on President Roosevelt today to define the role of small nations in a proposed international security council some legislators said could operate militarily only by unanimous consent of the United States, Great Britain, Russia and China.

Overnight study of the President's statement of plans for a post-war peace-preserving organization produced mixed reactions in Congress, with these developments indicating there is stormy weather ahead for the administration.

Disclosure that the rough draft of the American plan places the emphasis on military action to suppress aggression primarily in the hands of the "Big Four," with any one of them permitted to veto the use of force.

Demand by Senator Bridges (R., N. H.), who has bridged the President's foreign policies in the past, for Mr. Roosevelt to say whether Mr. Roosevelt will have representative votes on a proposed international council or will be "subordinated to the Big Four."

Criticism of the language used in the "Big Four" declaration against "aggression" and "other paraphernalia of coercive power."

An assertion by Senator La Follette (Prog., Wis.), who holds strong nationalist views, that the President's outline of security aims "fails to mention the most important question: Namely, whether this proposed organization should be established and the United States committed to it prior or after the time when the broad, general terms of the peace are known to Congress and the country."

General approval of the objectives of the plan by most Democrats and cautious endorsement of its principles by Republicans.

Must Be Joint Task

The President said in a statement yesterday after a conference with State department officials and others that the maintenance of future peace and security must be the joint task of all peace-loving nations and that plans are being drawn for establishment of a "fully representative" world organization and an international court of justice.

"It is our further thought," the statement continued, "that the organization would provide, for a council, elected annually by the fully representative body of all nations, which would include the four major nations and a suitable number of other nations."

The understanding is general in the Senate that the proposed council could order the use of military force against a potential or actual aggressor only by a "special majority" of its members. This would mean, it was said, that the "Big Four" would have to vote unanimously on this question. Similarly, if the "Big Four" voted to employ

force, the other nations could not over-ride the decision.

Ball says that under such a system, the proposed organization would be doomed to failure.

"All an aggressor would have to do would be to get one of the Big Four to sympathize with his viewpoint and there would be no military action," he said.

Administration leaders said the "special majority" provision had been inserted to eliminate, if possible, the controversy which they expect would greet any proposal to bind the United States to use its military power when it did not wish to do so.

Need Surgical Dressings Fast

Red Cross Units Asked To Ship 100 Million Of Them Monthly

A letter has just been received from Red Cross area headquarters, urging every surgical dressing unit to turn out its quota of dressings as fast as possible, for, in order to fulfill its contract with the Army, the Red Cross must be prepared to ship each month the amazing total of one hundred million surgical dressings. The success or failure of this monthly program depends entirely upon the volunteer workers in every chapter in the country.

The Manchester chapter has just received the quota for a quota of 66,000 dressings. It is the duty of every Red Cross chapter to complete, pack, and ready for shipment by the end of July, or in six weeks time. That is an ambitious, but far from impossible, program. It will take the cooperation of every worker to accomplish it, but, because it is one of the important ways in which women can directly aid in the battle for Europe, the committee feels that every worker can be depended upon for her share.

my Doolittle said in a radio interview that she has found, in talks with returned service men, that one of the things that makes the most to them is the feeling that the women folk at home are working along with them. So, in addition to being a direct help to the men who are wounded, the work of folding surgical dressings is also a real morale booster for all the men.

Next week the regular Monday evening and Wednesday meetings of surgical dressings workers will be resumed, and it is earnestly hoped that every woman who has ever worked on dressings, and who can possibly do so now, will attend one of the sessions to help in this important job.

The Monday evening group will meet in the kindergarten room at Center church, and will continue to meet there despite the closing of the Production center for sewing and knitting units. The Wednesday workers will, of course, meet as usual from 10 a. m. to 1:30 p. m. in the American Legion Home. A clean wash dress or cotton apron and a scarf to completely cover the hair are the only requirements as to uniform. It is requested by National Headquarters, also, that little or no powder and lipstick be worn by the workers and that nail polish be omitted. These are, of course, all precautionary measures against any kind of foreign matter being folded into a dressing, where they might some day work into a wound and cause untold suffering and infection.

Congressman Could Turn on Charm in Five Different Places at One Time Under Plan

Washington, June 16—(AP)—One congressman, facing election, ponder: Should I become an entertainer?

For \$3 congressmen can make 5 or 10 minute talks which are recorded and sent back to their home radio stations for broadcast.

Make Recordings Regularly

About 135 congressmen have been making these recordings regularly every week. With elections approaching, recordings have climbed to about 200 weekly and will go several hundred higher.

Some congressmen, chatly-like, just tell what they have been doing for the folks back home. Some bring a government official along and go through a question-and-answer recording with him on some current problem.

The main difficulty with congressmen making their first recordings is to get them to speak in a conversational tone.

This is because they are used to trying to make themselves heard on the floor of the House or Senate.

Usually Broadcast Free

When there is no campaign, the home stations usually broadcast the recordings free so long as they are on a straightaway, non-partisan, fact-and-figure basis. But a congressman must first after he has filed notice, he will run for office again.

Most of the congressmen who regularly make recordings to build voter confidence are younger men.

Princess' Kin Held in Rome

Arrested for Interrogation Concerning Activities of Family

Rome, June 16—(AP)—Bona de Seta, daughter of a princess, whose whereabouts have been a mystery since her arrest at the home of an American-born baroness, is in an apartment in Rome and being treated well, a high Allied source said today.

She is being held for interrogation in connection with the activities of members of her family in southern Italy. She is the daughter of Princess Pignatelli, and a step-daughter of Prince Pignatelli, both of whom are being detained in Naples.

Arrest Mervyn Routine

"With the mother and step-father under detention," the source said, "it was only natural that the daughter be taken into custody for questioning, but since she was in Rome it was impossible to make the arrest until Rome was occupied by Allied troops. The arrest was merely routine."

The girl was arrested at the home of Baroness Josephine Pomeroy Marconia of Hopewell, N. J., Washington, D. C., with whom she had lived for several months. The baroness said the girl was being held in her efforts to serve the Allied cause and had given unlimited assistance to British and American prisoners who escaped the Nazis and hid in Rome.

The baroness' brother, Sergt. Robert L. Pomeroy, of Hopewell, who is serving as an interpreter with an American infantry division in Washington, D. C., with whom she has lived for several months, gave this account of the girl's disappearance:

"Two Italians in civilian clothes came to the baroness' home Tuesday night and demanded that the

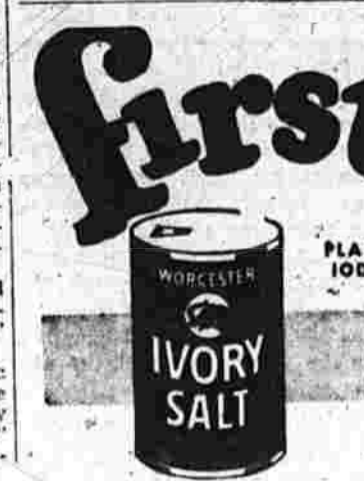

They are understood to have given general approval to a tentative draft of a foreign policy plank and to have made known their stand on other issues.
Tratt Liberty to Be Chairman
Bricker's views will be represented on the committee by Senator Robert Taft (R., Ohio), who is in line to become chairman of the group.
Laramie, Wyo., June 16.—(AP)—Washington today that he plans to appear before the committee June 24 to urge it to take a strong stand for international peace cooperation.

cluded attacks by an armada of 1,500 U. S. heavy bombers.
In addition to the American heavy bomber blow, Supreme headquarters announced that 3,000 sorties (individual plane flights) were made by Allied planes yesterday in direct support of the ground operations in Normandy. Many of these "were" from "planes based in France."
The use by the Germans of pilotless aircraft against Britain was disclosed in the House of Commons by Herbert Morrison, home secretary.
During yesterday afternoon medium bombers hit fuel and supply dumps, bridges and other communications targets from Valognes in the Cherbourg peninsula to La Val about 75 miles behind the enemy lines.
The R.A.F. heavy bombers also sought out the ammunition dump in the Benes forest, officially den-

South England Hit By Pilotless Planes

German who will not receive this news with greatest satisfaction.
The feelings of hatred and a burning wish for retaliation which dominate the German people have been kindled by our success in their terror crimes.
The British Ministry of Home Security ordered civilians to stay away from the pilotless aircraft, which explode five to 15 seconds after landing.
One correspondent telephoned this word picture of the pilotless craft:
"Have distinctive Note
"The planes have a distinctive rhythmic note, giving the effect of a pulsating low buzz. They are much smaller than a Spitfire and their appearance is like that of a glider.
"They really are midge planes. At night they show a distinct glow at the rear and in the light of searchlights streamers of thick smoke can be seen being ejected from them.
"Many of them have been observed in daylight and on several occasions R. A. F. fighters, with total disregard of danger, have dove into the ack ack fire around them in attempts to make a kill."
As the day wore on alesia and all doors alternated over southern England and guns cracked intermittently, but the nation's business went on without interruption.
