Noxon Found Son's Slayer

Jury Deliberates Less Than Five Hours Before Giving Verdict.

Pittsfield, Mass., July 7.—(AP) — The jury in the slaying of John Noxon, Jr., 41, was sentenced to death in the electric chair for the electrocution slaying last Sept. 23 of his six-month-old infant daughter, Lawrence. Sentence was imposed by Judge Abraham E. Pinnack after Noxon, availing himself of the privilege of "want to repeat again, what I said during the trial, that I did not kill my son. I'm innocent of this terrible charge."

Pittsfield, Mass., July 7.—(AP) — The jury in the slaying of John Noxon, Jr., 41, was expected today to ask for a sentence of death in the electric chair for John P. Noxon, Jr., 41-year-old corporation lawyer, who was convicted last night of murder in the first degree in the electrocution of the six-month-old mentally deficient son.

A Berkshire county jury, which had sat through five weeks of trial, deliberated less than five hours before deciding that the prominent attorney had taken his child's life in the library of the Noxon home last Sept. 23, "with deliberate premeditation and malice aforethought."

The jury came into the courtroom at 6:25 p. m. (local time) within three minutes delivered its verdict and walked out again at 7:15 p. m. In Massachusetts, the death penalty is mandatory for first-degree murder, but it was not known whether Judge Abraham E. Pinnack would pass sentence immediately.

It was expected that defense counsel would enter an appeal against the verdict. The "Sunday" newspaper reported that the defense would enter an appeal based upon the numerous exceptions taken during the trial.

In such an event the court could impose sentence and at the same time stay its execution pending the outcome of the appeal before the Supreme Court.

Noxon came to verdict from all outward appearances the calmest person in the hot courtroom when the verdict was announced was Noxon himself. His expression changed not the slightest.

Ely held his head in his hands momentarily, and District Attorney Charles E. Alberti also seemed ill at ease in his low voice, he addressed the court.

"I believe it becomes my duty to move for sentence," he said. When Judge Pinnack inquired if that was what the prisoner wanted to do, Alberti, his head bowed, replied in nearly a whisper: "I am not certain just what my suggestion is."

At that point, Judge Pinnack and counsel repaired to the judge's chambers and conferred for nearly 40 minutes.

Noxon moved to the quiet in the steel prisoner's cage, one of the few movements being to wipe his forehead with his handkerchief.

The tall, blond, middle-aged man, a victim of infantile paralysis which has crippled him to use heavy canes for the past 20 years, stated that he was in the library, Lawrence, met death accidentally by becoming entangled in a trouble light cord which Noxon said he was using to put tubes in the family radio.

The baby met death a few weeks after child specialists had informed the Noxon that the baby was a "mongoloid type" and never would be economically independent.
