

Hitler Says Move To Assume Power Has Been Crushed

Expresses Confidence in Order of Day to German Troops Army Will Fight With Exemplary Obedience and Loyalty—100 High Officers Die

London, July 22.—(AP)—Adolf Hitler asserted in an order of the day to German troops today that an attempted coup d'etat by "a small circle of unscrupulous officers" had been crushed, and expressed confidence the Army "will fight with exemplary obedience and loyalty until victory is ours in spite of all."

Wiped Out or Arrested By immediate and vigorous action by loyal officers and men of the Army at home, the traitor clique was wiped out or arrested in the matter of a few hours, Hitler said. A small circle of unscrupulous officers had made an attempt to murder me and the general staff and to seize power in the state, but Providence caused the attempt to miscarry. His order, an obvious attempt to reassure his own followers in Army ranks and to discourage any further revolt, came as press and eye-witness accounts indicated that nowhere had the enemies of Hitler succeeded in seizing power or taking over key positions.

Purge Lulls Rebellion A rapid, bloody and ruthless purge apparently had stamped out the rebellion. Reports reaching Stockholm said that perhaps 100 generals or high officers had been executed. Travelers to Sweden said more than 1,000 persons had been arrested through Friday. (An NBC broadcast from London declared Field Marshal Rommel had been forced to change his armor division commander in Normandy for "political reasons." The two divisional commanders were replaced, before the Thursday attempt on Hitler's life, by "two juvenile political officers, both under 33, who have a record of fanatical Nazi loyalty," the broadcast said.)

A dispatch, clearing through Berlin censorship to De Rund at Bern, Switzerland, today said any effort at revolt could be considered to have collapsed. Government quarters in the German capital were blocked off Friday "by troops of the army and the armed SS for many hours, presumably to carry out purge measures," the dispatch said. A writer of rumors concerning the attempted coup persisted, and people but a much weaker support from them.

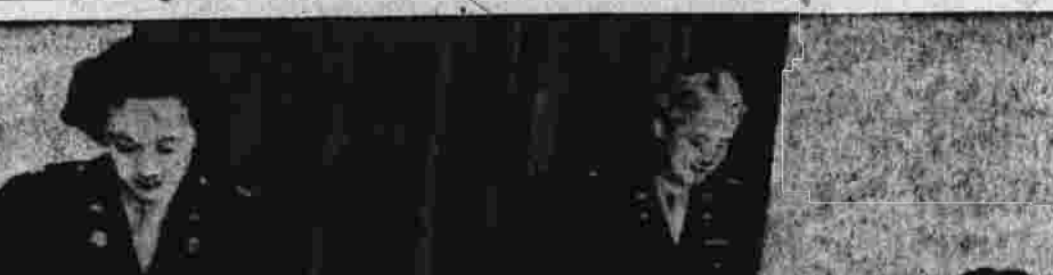
This support will weaken from here on, it is believed, reaching a fatal point when the people and soldiers realize that they are being expended in an utterly useless extension of the war. At that point, according to this estimate, there will be another more successful attempt to throw Hitler out of power and end the factional contention against him which will bring about the surrender of Germany.

In a speech broadcast directly from the scene by the German radio, the Nazi leader blathered Jews, plutocrats and foreigners as the instigators of the attempted assassination of Hitler, then said: "While German workers labor 12 to 16 hours without a Sunday or holiday, the nobility in Britain is doing nothing but to do than plot against our Führer."

British Fliers Pound Berlin; Refinery Hit

Mosquitos Attack German Capital as Italian Based Bombers Go Into Czechoslovakia

London, July 22.—(AP)—British Mosquitos kept the air assault on Germany rolling overnight by bombing Berlin while Italian-based bombers struck into Czechoslovakia for the second time in less than 24 hours and hammered an oil refinery at Pardubice, 60 miles east of Prague. A large explosion and fire was reported from the refinery, the first largest in Europe outside Rome.

Moscow, July 22.—(AP)—Red Army tank and infantry forces, making a surprise bid for Warsaw, rolled back German rearguards today on a jagged 200-mile battle line, and front dispatches said some Soviet forces were only 90 miles from the Polish capital. At the same time the German position in the Baltics grew weaker. Hitler once again ordered a Col. Gen. Ivan I. Maslennikov's troops captured Oostrow, cleared 17 miles of the Ostrow-Pskov railway, and left Pskov, 35 miles north of Ostrow, in an untenable salient. Tishina, seven miles from Latvia's northeastern boundary, was occupied.
