Service Costly For Aircraft

Pratt-Whitney Supervisor Is Speaker Before Rotarians Here.

A considerable part of the cost of operating aircraft is in its service and maintenance, according to Lionel Clark, supervisor of the Pratt & Whitney School of Service and Maintenance, who addressed the local Rotarians at the Country Club last evening.

Clark said that a pilot who expects to drive a car for its entire life without major servicing. When you realize that a thousand hours in the air is equivalent to the life of your car, Clark said, you can quickly realize why it is so important to give aircraft regular overhauls.

"The importance of ground crews has never been underestimated by the pilots," he continued, "and they are high in their regard for the work accomplished under the most trying conditions by these servicemen. Mechanics are required to service all types of planes and are sometimes called on to make replacements with parts from wrecked aircraft. Every used part so salvaged must undergo the most rigid inspection in order that there can be no failing of overhauled motors under maximum speed and distance.

For every plane in the air there must be a ground crew of at least a half dozen skilled mechanics. These men give their ships daily checks which include fueling, oiling and visible checks for loose braces, bolts and the like. Planes are given a periodic overhaul, and an overall job on aircraft engines is a real overhaul," according to Clark. "Every single part is removed, cleaned, laid out on a table and carefully checked for wear. Often few replacement parts are needed, but when an aircraft is subjected to severe duty greater wear in parts is inevitable.

Higher altitudes have added to service and maintenance problems for aircraft designed for night flying require more equipment which in turn means more weight to be carried. Clark said that combat planes naturally have more instruments to service than commercial carriers.

Aviation in the post-war period will continue to carry on, Clark believes, as plans being used to reconstruct today will be out of use when improvements now in use by the Army and Navy are made available. The cost of plane travel will compare favorably with that of Pullman travel and will save irremediable time. The use of aircraft for freight might be somewhat limited due to the increased cost over railroad, but will undoubtedly be used for certain merchandise that requires speed in delivery.

Town Meeting Business
Two of the propositions before the special town meeting next Monday night should find general support from the voters of Manchester. These are the approval of the pension plan for town employees, and the appropriation of \$5,000 so that Manchester may create a town plan for itself.
The town pension plan is the result of long study and careful drafting. It has already been thoroughly explained at one town meeting, held for purposes of discussion only. It was approved at that meeting; it had subsequently been approved by the town employees themselves. It will, over the years, represent an expense to the taxpayers, but that expense should more than be repaid through the better calibre of town employes, standing as a pension system should attract.

The proposal for a town plan has likewise been aired extensively. It is an important proposal because Manchester, standing on the threshold of the post-war era, needs to make a choice as to its own future. It can head up or down. It can head toward its "City of Village Chances" opportunity, or it can make itself the shining star center of Connecticut. A town plan is the logical next step toward protection, preservation, and future increase of Manchester values.

The proposal to appropriate \$5,000 for a town honor roll is the first tangible proposal for Manchester honor to Manchester people in the service. As such, it represents good intent. There is only one possible difference of opinion over such action at the present time. It is unthinkable and entirely improbable that Manchester intends to make an honor roll itself the only memorial which recognizes the sacrifice of Manchester men and women. Plans for a greater and more tangible and more useful war memorial should be taking shape any time now. When and where is such a war memorial, the most desirable site for the honor roll, and that is where every one would want the honor roll to be. For such reasons, an appropriation of an honor roll is entirely in order at any time, but the final location and location of the honor roll should, in all reasonable circumstances, be determined and formulated and discussed.

It is the last proposal in the town meeting call for the appropriation of \$25,000 to be devoted to the purchase of the Harlan H. White property for development as a water pool—such a project is likely to provoke the most controversy at Monday night's meeting. Beyond the fact that the appropriation is large, and the benefits of the site in question small and uncertain, this proposition must be viewed in relation to other proposals. Manchester needs for the future, even if it would not desire approval or appropriation at this time. When and if this town ever gets down to business providing for its own recreational future, the first item of accomplishment should be the acquisition of the old golf hole. The latter proposition is one which would be of benefit to all Manchester, not just one particular section.

There is general and enthusiastic agreement on the wisdom of having the town own it. There is no argument as to its practical value. The only argument is one as to the price to be paid for it, and a reasonable compromise should be possible on that.

To appropriate \$25,000 for the purchase of another less desirable site, and thus, by expenditure of

money and the acceptance of an inferior benefit, run the risk of losing the golf hole altogether, would be municipal folly.
