

Urges Passing Food Program

Speedy ratification of proposed world organization is sought.

Washington, Aug. 23.—(AP)—Speedy ratification by the United States and associated nations was sought today for a proposed international food and agriculture organization to solve the problems of hungry peoples and of unstable agricultural conditions.

The constitution for such an organization has been submitted to 44 nations eligible for membership by the interim commission of the United Nations Food and Agriculture Conference held at Hot Springs, Va., last year.

Largely Fact-Finding

The FAO—the alphabetical designation given the proposed agency—will be largely fact-finding and advisory in character, rather than a powerful super-AAA agency with authority to control the world's agricultural production and to direct its distribution.

As outlined by its constitution, the FAO would be something like this country's Department of Agriculture before the advent of the AAA crop control program. Some agricultural leaders had urged that the international organization be given broad powers to regulate world production, marketing, and prices.

The commission decided it would be better to have any future international collaboration involving actual changes in production and distribution as well as pre-establishing measures to decisions of the individual nations and to commodity agreements reached in the normal manner.

Peace-time Food Problems

The world food problems facing the world after the war, as envisioned by the Hot Springs conference, are expansion of production to levels which would lift millions to satisfactory nutritional standards, and stabilization of producer prices and markets at levels which provide them a better living standard.

The interim commission's chairman—L. B. Pearson, Canadian minister in Washington—urged eligible nations to ratify the constitution in time for the FAO to hold its first meeting here next January.

Decision Revis With Congress

President Roosevelt is expected to submit the proposed constitution to Congress soon for approval. Paul Appleby, American member of the commission, said the decision on the country's membership in the FAO will be made by Congress. The country's share of the FAO's first year's expenses was fixed at \$60,000 or 25 per cent of the total.

The FAO's chief executive officer will be a director-general. Henry A. Wallace, whose term as vice president expires in January, has been suggested in American quarters for this post. Some friends doubt, however, that Wallace would be interested.

Hungary Replaces Envoy

New York, Aug. 23.—(AP)—Hungary has replaced its minister to Romania, the Hungarian radio said today in a broadcast recorded by U. S. government radio.

Andras von Hertelny, minister to Bucharest, had been "relieved of his post" and replaced by a man appointed to succeed him, the broadcast said.

Eating Places To List Prices

Must Post Charges On 40 Basic Food Items Beginning Today.

A price list of 40 basic food items must be on display today at all Connecticut eating places, the State O. P. A. announced Monday. The agencies pointed out that the list basic foods will differ in each eating place, depending on the type of food served.

By August 30 each proprietor must file triplicate copies of his list with the local War Price and Control Board. When approved by a board, it will be returned to the person who filed it to be kept on the premises of his establishment for inspection at any time by customers and OPA agents.

The purpose of this OPA regulation is to stabilize the price of checking the items on the basic price chart with the approved list by the local boards. The double check technique is not new to price control in restaurants, an agency spokesman explained, since complete menus of all eating places in the base period of April 10, 1943 have always been available in triplicate to OPA agents. However, this amendment to the regulation makes the check on the current list possible right on the premises, at least insofar as the most popular items are concerned, it was pointed out.

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Flying Plasma To War Areas

Manchester Asked to Help in Extra Demand Made for Blood.

To supply the plasma required for the treatment of the wounded fighting men, it has been necessary for the Red Cross to collect 100,000 pints of blood each week. Now, in response to an urgent request from the Army and Navy, the Red Cross has agreed to provide, in addition to the former quota, 1,000 pints of whole blood each week to be shipped by air to Europe to supplement the use of plasma.

The Hartford Blood Donor Center has responded to the request to supply the part of this new amount, and started on Monday of this week to collect whole blood for air shipment, in addition to the quota of 1,000 pints of plasma each week expected from the Hartford Center.

Therefore, it is up to Manchester to help toward this new goal when the Mobile Unit is here Friday. No far, the request for donors for the day has been rather large, but the Blood Donor Service is hopeful that, on previous occasions, the telephone calls for service will be answered in rapidly increasing numbers tonight and tomorrow, and that we will not fall down on our quest because the battle is so great, some donors may be tempted to feel that there is no need for blood. But the fighting hasn't let down, the casualties haven't let down, either. There is still as great a need for their contributions as ever, and there is a desperate need right now for more donors to sign up. School Superintendents To Name Those to Take Charge.

Storrs, Aug. 23.—The campaign in which Connecticut boys and girls will collect milkweed pods for military use, expected to start today, is being planned by the direction of a supervisor in each town who will be appointed by the superintendent of schools or some other designated person, according to Dr. Frank Trask, state campaign supervisor at the University of Connecticut. Local supervisors will be responsible for supplying the open mesh bags in which to collect the pods, and to see that they are properly dried. Leaflets explaining the purpose of the campaign have been sent to all superintendents of rural schools, and a supply of bags will also be collected to the schools.

Twenty-eight other states are also collecting milkweed pods, when dry, for use in the manufacture of aviator suits in place of kapok which was imported from Java until the Japanese seized control of that island. 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
