Thomas Sees No Strike Promise Big Issue At National Convention of Auto Workers.

Russian Army Offensive Coupled with Combined Operations of Partisans and Allied Commando Units Expected to Bring Result.

Moscow, Sept. 8.—(AP)—A Red Army offensive through Bulgaria, coupled with the combined operations of Marshal Tito's partisans and Allied Commando units in Yugoslavia, appeared likely today to free the Balkan peninsula entirely of Germans in less than a week. At the same time, a Russian armored force driving "downhill" from the east toward the Carpathians pushed within 128 miles of the main frontiers of Transylvania.

Green Bulgars as Brothers

Germany's declaration of war on the Soviet Union to accept Sofia's request for an armistice and Russian veterans who moved into Bulgaria from Romania on a "brotherly" mission to greet the Bulgars as brothers in arms.

Front dispatches said no hostile forces were in the area. The Russian advance across Bulgaria, which included the capture of two big ports, Ruse and (Buz) on the Danube and Varna on the Black Sea, was reported by the Bulgarian Army, now a co-belligerent, with an active role in the Balkan clean-up.

The Kremlin, through the press and radio, continued to call on the Balkan states to join the anti-Hitler coalition and save their nations from the clutches of the Hitlerite clique and save their nations from the clutches of the Hitlerite clique.

Bulgaria's outright participation in the war turned out approximately to the satisfaction of the Balkan states.

It transformed the German withdrawal from southern Yugoslavia, Albania, Greece, and the Aegean islands into desperate attempts to escape from the west.

Small blockade runners slipping up the Adriatic sea under the cover of darkness were the only hope of escape for Germans on the west side of the peninsula. On the Aegean side, the Athens-Salonika-Nis-Beograd railway was under severe attack and was being raided ceaselessly by Yugoslav and Greek fighters.

The Bulgarian divisions could not be seen in the vicinity of Nis within a matter of hours.

The possibility was seen that the German high command might leave some troops in the Balkans.

The Air Force now dominates the southern Philippines. Gen. Douglas MacArthur announced one day that he had opened the air offensive there on a Mindanao attack last August. He backed up his announcement by reporting a B-24 bomber attack on Mindanao which was not far from the Japanese planes, pulled out of the area to bases further north.

He continues a favorite of ours in spite of the fact that, two years ago, he used a testimonial composed of the fact that legislative correspondents banded together as the Laurel Club, had voted him a very likely to succeed member of the House, in spite of the fact that he subsequently failed to pay off in the dinner which he assuredly owed correspondents when their praise of him won him deserved victory in his reelection campaign. Those Terrible Russians

It was one noteworthy last flicker of German propaganda talent the other day that German news sources should suddenly become so generous in conceding Russian advances "through the Balkans. The Russians were, the Nazis announced in a great flurry of information, heading into Yugoslavia, into Greece, approaching the border of Turkey. Admission of such Russian advances, if they have perhaps actually taken place, would mean that some 200,000 German troops in the Balkans may have been cut off from all hope of escape back to the German homeland. But even such a military admission is worth while, in Nazi views, if the spectre of Russian conquest of too much of Europe can be raised and made to seem terrifying. The Russians in Greece? What a threat to Britain's traditional Mediterranean policy! The Russians near the Turkish border? What a vengeance upon Turkey for not continuing to play the Nazi game! The Russians devouring all Europe? What terrible proof of the truth of the old Goebbels warning that Russia, not Germany, was the true enemy of the civilized world!
