Interest Lags On Dressings

Attendance at Red Cross Sessions This Week Is Very Poor.

The attendance at this week's Red Cross surgical dressings meetings, both Monday evening and Wednesday morning and afternoon, was very poor. It does seem as though, in a place as large as Manchester, with over 3,000 men in the afternoon, there should be more than 150 women actively engaged in producing the dressings that may be needed by any number of those men, and yet that is a large estimate of the number of regular workers. For instance, last Monday evening the attendance was only 21 workers on hand, with only a few more in the afternoon.

While the folding of the dressings is not difficult, it does take care and time to do them correctly, so that no one worker can accomplish any reasonable amount of them. There is a quota of several thousand (and word has just been received of an increase in the present quota), it is going to take much longer than it should to get the dressings finished and on their way unless there are more workers.

It is natural to thrill over the encouraging news from various sectors of the advances being made, but we must not lose sight of the fact that a heavy price is being paid for every forward yard. A picture like the one on the front page of Wednesday's Herald, showing the front rows of American dead on Pheasant illustrates part of that tremendous price. Just think how many times greater is the number of wounded! It is for them, whose numbers are ever increasing as the fighting grows more furious, that the surgical dressings are needed.

The committee is very anxious to see that the dressings are completed and shipped at the earliest possible date, and it is earnestly hoped that more of the workers will return to this important task, either Monday evening at Center church, or the Legion Hall on Wednesday.

Government Pays Two Kinds of Vet Pensions

Those Dying in Line of Duty and Die of Other Causes Benefit.

Washington, Oct. 6.—(AP)—The government pays two kinds of pensions to survivors of servicemen and veterans.

Group One: Pensions are paid for death in the service in line of duty or for a veteran's death—any time after his military discharge—caused by disability connected with his military service.

Group Two: Pensions are paid to the widow and children in Group Two get no pension if their private income exceeds a certain amount specified above. But widows and children in Group One get the pension no matter how much their income.

The pension rates in Group Two are: Widow, \$35 monthly; widow with one child, \$45 and \$5 for each additional child; for one orphan (no widow), \$15; two orphans, \$27; three orphans, \$36, with additional orphans \$4 each.

This is a minimum amount but is not necessarily the amount received by the survivor in any case not due to his own misconduct.

The payment is an amount equal to six months' pay at the rate received by the serviceman at the time of his death. It is not necessary that his death occurred in line of duty. This is paid by the War and Navy departments.


