The Teen-Age Problem

Club Kasha at Greenwich in Basement of Y. M. C. A. Patronized by Young People from 15 To 30; Seen Successful Answer for Rendezvous.

By Luke D. Phillips and Earl Yost

An extremely detailed description of Club Kasha at the Greenwich Y. M. C. A. forms the material for today's article on the "teen-age problem." We are indebted to Nathaniel Marks of the staff of the Greenwich Y. M. C. A. for the information concerning activities in that city in the southwestern portion of the state. Greenwich, by the way, is often referred to as the richest city per capita in the state of Connecticut. Mr. Marks' letter and other source material follow:

"River Beaman, our editor, has asked me to answer your request of Sept. 29 for information on teen-age canteen activities here. The Y. M. C. A. has established the Club Kasha, a most successful answer to the question of what to do with the bobby socked youth by way of rendezvous for the date. The date enclosed should explain what has been accomplished in this direction. A note about the setup itself may be of some interest, too.

"The motif of decoration is an outdoor atmosphere (excepting an unusually crowded room on a hot night). There is an awning of red and blue stripes over the entrance. One wall purports to enclose the "terrace" from the outside. A deep blue sky is painted about the wall and on the ceiling. Along one side of the dining room there is a space for dancing. The other half is used for tables and chairs.

"At one end of the room there is a bar for soft drinks, hot dogs, hamburgers and cake. Opposite, at the other end of the hall, is a room for records and juke box machinery. Alongside is a band stand where four or five musicians knock themselves out during the season.

"To the best of our knowledge, there never has been anything but good behavior at the club. The youngsters really enjoy themselves. Football rallies are a feature during the season.

"Any attempt by outside groups to disrupt the club has been promptly dealt with by the members themselves. It is their club and they mean to make the most of it.

"Should there be need of any information additional to that described in the paper, enclosed please let us know.

"The papers enclosed to which Mr. Marks refers consist of two sheets, one of which is indefinitely addressed to "Dear Sir": It follows:

"We have a teen-age canteen in Greenwich organized and sponsored by our Y. M. C. A. The club has been operating since July, 1943, and has had a very good experience.

"The general secretary of the Y. M. C. A. had operated such a canteen in the city from which he came and presented the need for such an activity to various groups within the community. After studying the project, the Community Chest appropriated \$1,500 to the Y. M. C. A. and the association secured from its own budget another \$3,500 which made it possible to transform a basement area in the Y. M. C. A. building into a beautiful recreation room.

"From the inception of the plan young people have worked on a board of directors of the club. They helped to plan the decorations, established the rules and supervised its operation.

"The club has a membership of approximately 500 and Mr. Pugh advises me that the average night attendance on each Friday and Saturday evening since its opening August the first year was 120.

"The Y. M. C. A. furnishes heat and janitor service but the young people finance its operation. Membership is \$1 per year and the evening when an orchestra is provided the young people pay a special admission fee.

"We have a cosmopolitan population, generally speaking,

Young Boy Drowns In Own Back Yard

Norwalk, Oct. 11—(AP)—A few moments after Mrs. Alfred Hodge had let her two-year-old son, Paul, into the back yard of their home to play, she looked from a window and saw him floating face down in a five-foot-deep fish pool which is set off from the rest of the yard by a fence.

Mrs. Hodge, plunging into the pool, rushed the child into the house and called the fire department, but attempts at artificial respiration were unavailing, and he was pronounced dead, a drowning victim.

Authorities who investigated the accident, which occurred shortly before noon yesterday, said the boy apparently had managed to open the gate in the fence surrounding the pool.

Besides his parents, the boy leaves a brother and a sister.

Defense to Seek Acquittal Verdict

Salinas, Calif., Oct. 11—(AP)—Defense attorneys expected to use the greater part of today in final arguments asking an acquittal verdict for 27-year-old Mrs. Frances Andrews, wealthy Carmel valley woman on trial for the murder of Jay Lovett, her young farm boy neighbor.

Attorney Leo Friedman talked for five hours yesterday in Mrs. Andrews' defense. He attacked what he called bungling law enforcement officers in investigating the case and argued that Lovett could have died by suicide, accident, or murder by someone other than the defendant.

"Membership age limit is 15 to 30.

"The membership to date is already over the 300 mark, and growing constantly. Naturally, each evening the club is open, the number attending varies somewhat, but many evenings, especially when the orchestra is on hand, the club is "bottle-necked" or "overcrowded."

"Other evenings might find a very small crowd in attendance, but an overall picture shows an enthusiastic interest on the part of the young people.

"Membership committee, "recreation committee, "social committee, "each has its chairman, plus an adult advisor, and additional committees. Of course, all committees are co-ed."

"From the fact that one enclosure sets the membership at 500 and the other at 200 it is apparent that whoever compiled the second enclosure did not bother to make corrections to bring up to date the information on 20 date. This enclosure also cleans up the identity of Mr. Pugh.

"There is one point, however, that raises a grave suspicion of doubt as to conditions in Greenwich which led up to the formation of Club Kasha. That is the fact that the information on 20 date, that the young people go into bars in order to get any kind of soft drink. Are the candy and ice cream stores in Greenwich all closed during the evening?

"We know that this condition does not obtain in Manchester. There are plenty of places other than taverns and grills that have soft drinks for sale.

"Another point that we note is that in the rules of the club there is no mention of closing time. We will inquire about these points under his guidance, at Springfield, Ill. It seemed logical that if it "took" in Springfield, it certainly would "take" in Greenwich.

"Prior to the opening of the Club Kasha, in the basement of the Y. M. C. A., it was impossible for the young people to purchase a soft drink anywhere in town at least it was bought over one of the many liquor bars. Naturally, this threw many innocent youthful good-time seekers into an un-wholesome atmosphere. Naturally, these youngsters liked the lure and excitement of these bars.

"A partial solution to this was not the preparing of curfew laws, but instead of the development of a place offering a wholesome environment so attractively done that it actually outdid any of the local taverns and inns. With the help of a special appropriation from the Community Chest and an additional appropriation from the Board of Directors of the Y. M. C. A., a wasted basement room in the Y was converted into an attractive night club. These club quarters offer an ideal place for young people to spend many hours in social recreation.

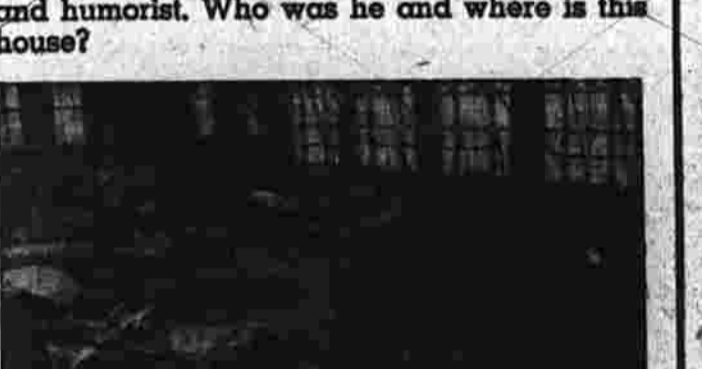

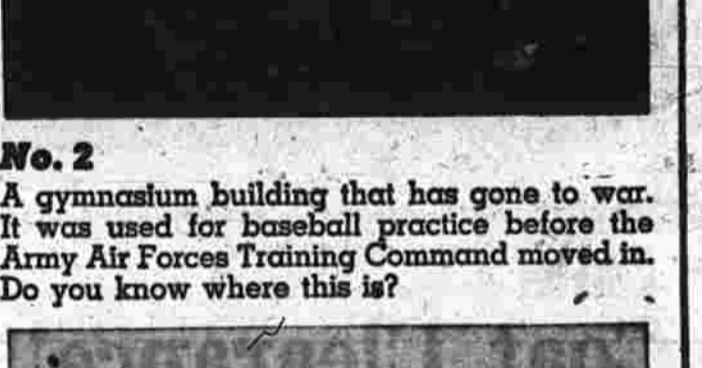

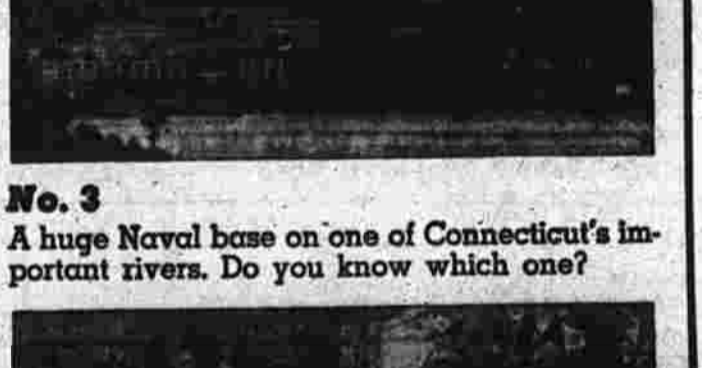
