Urges Mercy After Peace

'Sneaks and Gangsters' In Europe Must Be Brought to Justice.

Middleton, Oct. 20.—Prof. Lane Cooper of Cornell, principal speaker at the Wesleyan university conference today, said that while "the sneaks and gangsters" must be brought to justice when the peace is made, there must be mercy too for the countless numbers of central Europeans who had no little to do with putting that "S.N.C." into power.

Will the Prince of Peace be sitting at the table where the peace of Europe, of the world, is to be decided? Professor Cooper, president of the Wesleyan conference, said: "If he is not sitting there, look out for another war in the future as the boiling over of this war."

Slocver of the hospital to buy a new machine costing approximately \$225. Supt. Slocver said that such prompt action on doing such a fine job was a great credit to the Paper Salvage committee and he expressed his most hearty thanks.

Blackpool, Eng., Oct. 20.—(AP)—The defeat of Germany and Japan must be followed by the payment of reparations, the Trades Union Congress declared in a resolution today.

The countries which have been plundered and exploited to serve Germany's aim of conquest and domination have a just claim to reparations which must be paid to the full and cannot be paid in money alone, the resolution said.

The resolution, adopted unanimously, urged complete disarmament of Germany, control of German industries which could be converted to war purposes, and creation by the Allies of an organization armed with power to enforce peace.

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Smith Located In India Now

Former Resident Was Decorated for Work in the Libyan Desert.

LaCaire, Smith of the Sheridan Apartments, formerly employed in the Pratt & Whitney Engine Company, East Hartford, is now serving in India with the American Red Cross as an assistant field director. It was revealed today that Smith served with the 5th Marines in World War I and was wounded in the Meuse-Argonne battle in 1918.

While a resident of Manchester Smith made many friends here among ex-servicemen.

Mr. Smith is serving in India with his wife living in Millbrook, N. Y. While living here she was a member of the nursing staff of the St. Francis hospital.

Besides his World War I service, Mr. Smith served with the 5th Marines in World War I and was wounded in the Meuse-Argonne battle in 1918.

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Will Get Street Fighting Training

London, Oct. 20.—(AP)—Allied troops are going to be trained in street fighting apparently at preparation for battling Hitler's new guerrilla army.

The training program will be carried out in the Battersea district of southeast London, a congested district of workers' homes and factories.

The whole area has been badly blitzed and looks like a German city of town might look after an Allied shelling and bombing.

Victory Currency New Filipino Issue

Allied Headquarters, New Guinea, Oct. 20.—(AP)—Currency issued by the commonwealth government of the Philippines for use by the invasion forces of General MacArthur has been named "victory currency" by Brig. Gen. Carlos F. Romulo, the resident commissioner.

One peso bills carry the serial number "68," the age of President Osmeña. The value of the peso, which has the backing of the gold standard, has been fixed at the pre-war valuation of 50 cents.

Negro Executed In Gas Chamber

Jefferson City, Mo., Oct. 20.—(AP)—James Thomas, 20-year-old Negro, died in Missouri's lethal gas chamber at 12:10 a. m. today for raping a 22-year-old white woman in a Louis suburb a year ago last January.

Thomas was the sixteenth victim of the lethal gas chamber since its opening in 1938 as Missouri's method of executing the death penalty.

Thomas was converted to the Catholic faith a few hours before his execution and died clasping a rosary.

Readjustment Problem Serious for Veterans

Real Difficulty Rests in Putting Returned Service Men in Jobs for Which They Are Fitted

The best of Major Robert B. Cate's address to the Women's Club members at Center church this noon followed:

"I am sure that you will all readily agree that the returning veteran and the displaced worker will be faced by many varied individual adjustment problems. I am sure that you all expect that any miracle will occur that will permit some twelve or thirteen million veterans and like number of displaced workers to slip into normal life with neither personal nor community adjustment problems. I believe that we can pass over incidents such as the farmer's son, the man who has farming and who expected to return to his father's farm and carry on, and probably inherit the property. Unfortunately, this led to a man who was unable to do the work of the farm. Nevertheless, until this had happened, the inhabitants of that particular community had thought that they would have no adjustment problems.

Family Adjustment

"I am sure that it isn't necessary to mention the case of the lad who had a leg at Camp Pendleton. I am going to mention it because it has a peculiar ring connected with the necessity for family adjustment, rather than adjusting to the veteran. This lad survived both the wound itself and the attending shock and was properly prepared in his mind, and in fact quite eager, to take over his father's business. He was a fine young man who would enable him to overcome his physical handicap. However, when he returned home for a rest period before undertaking this vocation, something happened. His loving mother sold the farm on the idea that he should sit down under the apple tree and relax for the rest of his life. "Surely there is no need for me to mention the fact that a great many boys went into the service directly from school, they never had a job. Many of them haven't the faintest idea of what they would like to do for a living. And then I am sure I could pass over the case of the young fellow who worked as a pool boy in the Bigelow-Sanford plant at six an hour. He is now a fighter pilot in the Southwest Pacific, and this Captain's commission with flight pay and overseas pay brings his earnings to more than five thousand dollars a year. I don't believe any of you think that this young man will be content to return to work as a pool boy. However, his employer realizes that this fellow has evidently developed qualities of leadership that had never been suspected and that Bigelow-Sanford can make good use out of these qualities of leadership.

Commission Plans

"Since there can be no doubt in your mind that there will be individual and community problems of adjustment, I would like to tell you a little about the plans of the Connecticut Reemployment Commission for finding solutions to those problems.

"First, however, I would like to explain the background and the formation of the Commission, headed by its chairman, Carl Gray, a successful Connecticut manufacturer. Some years ago Mr. Gray made extensive studies of unemployment conditions which then existed in the State. He found at that time that there was a considerable prejudice against hiring men over 40 years of age, particularly in the factories. In trying to find the reason for this prejudice, Mr. Gray discovered that after the last war, a very great number of people—particularly veterans, accepted purely temporary employment. Then over a period of years during the twenties and thirties, when good times were good, these men drifted from one temporary job to another never acquiring any skill, trade or profession. Thus, when times became hard and jobs were scarce, these were the men who were out of luck—not because of their age, but because they had no particular ability to offer a prospective employer. Furthermore, even during the period of good business, these unskilled people had not commanded high wages and consequently were most ill prepared to meet the period of unemployment. Chaos Without Jobs.

"We absolutely cannot afford to let such a condition develop amongst the returning veterans and displaced war workers after this war. There will be such a vasty greater number of them than mid-grade unemployment amongst them in the years to come would surely bring about chaos in this country.

"If we take steps now to facilitate the training and education of large numbers of these veterans and displaced war workers, they will be in a position during good times to command high wages which means increased spending power, which, in the long run, means less likelihood of another depression. That is the thought that is the background of the Commission's Plan.

State Commission

"About a year ago Governor Baldwin asked Carl Gray to form a Reemployment Commission. In considering the makeup of this commission, Mr. Gray had it in mind that there are numerous and very important Federal and State agencies which have definite responsibilities toward various aspects of these adjustment and reemployment problems. Most of these agencies have ample finances and facilities available with which to carry out their particular responsibilities. Mr. Gray also had in mind that there are various

Lord knows we will always have plenty of men who won't take the trouble to learn a trade or skill. We must build up any backlog of unskilled labor by pushing every last man on any temporary road job. Researcher

of us come to any help whatsoever in putting men to work, we should study the philosophy of our Plan and the definition of philosophy—practically. If we do this, I think that we will all be of the opinion that now is the time for us to square pegs in square holes.

Not Expensive.

"There is another philosophy which I think is also worthy of that designation. That is the idea that this Plan can be put into operation without the creation of an expensive agency. It is a part of the second philosophy to have coordinating committees in every city and town in the State. 146 such committees have already been formed in the State and most of the towns that have no committees. I do not see one such reaction like to quote General Hines in his Number One Order as head of the Re-Training and Reemployment Administration. General Hines has been for many years in the field of friendly, neighborly spirit, so that every individual in the nation, and benefits to which he is entitled, and which he may need to solve his own kind of problem.

"Speaking of 'Rights and Benefits' as Chairman of the Council on a Committee Chairman, although maybe not so odd at that time, it is a right and a benefit, though are fine, but doesn't anyone ever think of the rights and benefits? That is not a bad thought either, and it sounds more of my recent talk with Brig. Gen. Cramer. He is an Assistant Division Commander of a combat division that has already seen two years' service in the Southwest Pacific area, so that he knows where he is speaking.

"I want to settle down. I think that the men all the men, over there are concerned with just one thing: Get home, get married, settle down to raise a family in peace and comfort. Some will want jobs at once, some will want to go into business for themselves, others will want to farm, and still others will want to further their training or education. They don't want anything handed to them on a silver platter, but they will expect the old home town to have some tangible opportunities to offer.

"These men will know what their rights and benefits are, but they will also have a very real problem as to how to get them. All that they will want from the home town will be reasonable opportunities to get, fulfill these duties and responsibilities, but if the community does not come through with something very tangible, then some of them may start looking for things on a silver platter. Some may even fall for all the wild schemes, and there are always demagogues ready to rise up and offer some.

"It is the duty of each community Committee to be sure that the duties and responsibilities are fulfilled and that all these men will be only too happy to assume and carry out their duties and responsibilities.

"No two community committees work exactly alike. However, they all have one common goal, which is to fit square pegs into square holes.

"How about the lad who would put every returned veteran to work on the roads. When suggested that maybe some of them would not be suited for such work, he said that if they were going to be very handy in some cases, but we must never again fall into the error of letting great numbers drift from one temporary job to

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The Public May Fool Them

So much of the campaigning in this all-important election of 1944 has been devoted to the lowest level of intelligence that it is almost a foregone conclusion that the election is over, for political strategists responsible for the campaign have already publicly their estimate of the American public.

Are the great majority of the American voters morons? Must a candidate presenting a line or a point of view, always restrain himself from making the intelligent argument and deliberately allow, instead, the argument which will best appeal to primitive surface emotions and leave the intelligence peacefully mired in a slumber of stupidity and ignorance? Is it gauging the mentality and discernment of the American public and correctly to judge that its vote can be influenced by the same kind of music, radio, sugar which seems to sell cigarettes and body deodorants? Does a half-truth, persistently and laboriously repeated, eventually win acceptance by the American public as a whole and final truth? Does a candidate's smooth radio technique establish a right to be elected? Does the employment of radio sub-sisters, male or female, pay off in votes? Does it make a difference whether or not some crooner votes one way or another? Would it be a fatal error for a party and its candidates to rest their chances solely on the seductive power of the microphone to place that the straight forward truth of their case?

The appeal to the emotions, the marketing of clever artificialities, the use of any unadorned reliance upon the intelligence of the average American voter himself is so common to both sides of the aisle that it will be difficult to find either justification or refutation of such theories in the election result itself.

It is not possible, however, to observe that both campaigns are in the hands of experts who make it their professional business to know what kind of argument, what kind of appeal succeeds best with this American public of ours. They make their living by not being wrong, and their lives are being paid now not to be wrong.

But through it all we have a hope. It is in the fact that the American flag back to the Philippines, and it is as who issues the first official American announcement of the invasion.

Only a year ago, the whole string of Jap front line Pacific defenses was still in existence between us and the Philippines. American tank forces, marines and infantry units blasted those defenses out of existence, one by one, until today we have a clear sweep from Hawaii to the Philippines, to Formosa, almost to the coast of Japan itself.

The grandeur and greatness of this whole Pacific campaign make it a matter for all-American pride. As we now enter the Philippines it is at a point calculated roughly in two. The full conquest of all the islands promises to be a long and arduous campaign. The neutralization of the Jap position in the Philippines may be something else again.

That we have, in some measure, already achieved, merely through the use of carrier-borne planes and remotely based bombers. Now the establishment of land-based plane operations in the Philippines promises to place a destructive cloud over all Japanese operations in the area, and it may soon extend an arm to the west, severing Jap sea communications with the Jap conquests in the Indies.

General MacArthur returned to the Philippines on the day the Jap home front authorities had set for "liberation" of the great naval "victory" Jap propaganda won over our fleet last week. One of the heralded fruits of that "victory" was that it "boosted" the invasion of the Philippines by "two months." It should now prove a costly victory for Jap propaganda to have won Japan, but obviously cannot stand very many more such "victories."

Seven Violent State Deaths

Seven violent deaths, two each from drowning and hanging, one from a traffic accident, and two from an airplane crash, were reported yesterday by Connecticut health officials.

Two unidentified Navy pilots died when their planes collided last night and crashed in woods near Norwich.

Two New Haven men were found dead yesterday by what Medical Examiner Marvin M. Scarborough reported.

Samuel Pentland, 64, of 25 Lywood street, subject of a police search since Tuesday when his son, Robert, of Madison, reported him missing, was found by workers of the United Advertising com-

pany who discovered his body hanging from a rope that had been tied to trusses of a Kimberly avenue billboard.

Young Pentland said his father had been dependent since the death of his wife a year ago and had several times threatened to take his life.

The medical examiner also reported that the body of Augustus Giletti, 51, had been found hanging from a rope in a doorway of his home by his son, Virgilio, 18, when the latter returned from work about 8:30 o'clock last night.

Dr. Scarborough said the young man had been hanging from the hospital of St. Raphael after being treated for injuries received during the September hurricane when he was struck by a hit-and-run driver.

He quoted the boy as saying his father was the dependant because "he thought he might become a burden to his family."

He was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Leonard Alexander, a neighbor and trained nurse, saw the child's body and rushed into the river to recover it, making an unsuccessful attempt to revive the child by artificial respiration.
