Donet, Japanese news agency described a Naval engagement in waters east of the Philippines where it said the American fleet was "surrounded." Official Japanese communiques did not say precisely where fighting occurred, nor whether Naval guns, torpedoes or bombs accounted for the sinkings.

Tokyo radio said Japanese planes opened the attack Tuesday morning (Manila time), damaging five ships. "On Oct. 25," the broadcast continued, "the Japanese Naval surface units made contact with the enemy task force."

From Volos the retreating Germans are confronted with a 120-mile track north before they reach the Yugoslav frontier.

Headquarters announced that additional Allied troops have been landed at Piraeus, port of Athens.

 San Francisco, Oct. 25.—(AP)—Radio Tokyo claimed last night in a broadcast monitored by the National Broadcasting Company that the American invaders of Leyte island in the Philippines have been halted and thrown back.

Churchill Reiterates No Bargaining with Enemy Still British Policy.
 London, Oct. 25.—(AP)—Prime Minister Churchill reiterated in the House of Commons today that "unconditional surrender in the sense of no bargaining with the enemy is still the policy of the government."

He suggested the House should bear in mind also the three-power declaration of May 12 to Axis satellites, in which they were warned to engage in a debate.

The prime minister declined to engage in a foreign affairs debate, declaring it would be unwise to go into details on such international matters "at the spur of the moment." There will be an opportunity for debate after his report Friday on his Moscow mission, he said, but added he hoped it would be short.

He left unanswered questions as to how long the government was reconciled with former enemies becoming "apparent allies" and as to whether Nazis who surrendered unconditionally would be given government posts in Germany.

No Deal on Balkans
 Earlier, Richard Law, minister of State, told the House British and Russian heads made no decision during the recent Moscow talks on respective zones of influence in the Balkans.

Although Bulgaria has declared war on Germany, he said, the country is still technically at war with the Allies and could not be recognized as a co-belligerent.

Churchill turned aside a question as to whether a decision would be made to pay for the "worthless marks" with which she flooded occupied countries.

 Leyte valley. Elements of the 9th division advanced to a point nine miles north of Catmon, enveloped Catmon hill and pushed on to the approaches of Tabontan.

Substantial gains west of Palo and Tacloban were made by units of the 10th corps now pushing ahead from a line of hills seized in the last week of September.

In this sector the Philippine Air Force employed its fighters and bombers in the early days of the war. The tactics were bloody but the tiny plane was easily smashed by the more powerful Japanese fighters.

Intermittent attacks by few enemy planes continued. An American fighter patrol beat them off. At least five Japanese planes were shot down.

Carrier planes from the 7th fleet are giving the ground forces continued close support, attacking enemy ground installations, communications lines and lines of communication.

84 American Planes Lost
 Destruction or damaging of 84 enemy planes on Oct. 22 and 23 was disclosed by MacArthur. The damage was done by American planes striking Japanese air fields in the western Visayas and north of Mindanao.

Japanese planes were lost, but all pilots except one were rescued.

"Successful raids from all sources on the enemy's installations, including his air bases, are continuing his attempts at staging air operations from his bases in Borneo and have greatly restricted the scale of his counter-offensive at Leyte."

The towns and barrios liberated include Nalibitan, Calabugan, Labiraman, Kugod, Gitaban, Malacandayan, Utap, Liliwa, Malacandayan, Cabasaran, Julita and Tangnan.

Chinese Troops Recapture Sinning
 Chungking, Oct. 25.—(AP)—Chinese troops have recaptured Sinning, a Hunan-Kwangsi railway 90 miles north of Kweilin, the Chinese high command announced today.

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He asserted that the Communists took the initiative in the clashes.

Chang said that toward the end of August the Communists attacked the government's 61st Army about 18 miles east of Lanchow on the Tungpu railway in southern Szechwan province.

The Communists then concentrated more than 14 regiments and on Sept. 8 again attacked the Army while mobile units attacked the 72nd government division.

Urges Return For Soldiers
 Compton Deserves 76 From New Haven as 'Forgotten Men'

Washington, Oct. 25.—(AP)—Representative Compton (R-N.H.) in a letter to Secretary of War Stimson, today urged a return for the 76 men of the South Pacific whom he described as the "forgotten men" of the Army because they had been home for nearly three years.

These boys, Compton told Stimson, "have had nothing more than seven or ten days furlough in a foreign country in the 30 or more months they have been stationed in the South Pacific." They complete the original 100th Airborne Central Postal Directory and 12 of them now are attached to Battery D, 74th A.A. gun battalion, the letter stated.

"They have braved Jap fire, the jungles, heat, insect-borne diseases, food, loneliness, anxiety, and worry, for nearly three years without complaining," Compton said. "They have seen their buddies in arms leave and go home, they have watched and wondered while Australian soldiers came into their lonely outposts, stayed a maximum 15 to 18 months, and then were sent back to the mainland for that quickly necessary sight of family and friends and 'home sweet home.'"

"Even if one or more bombers were detached from service and used to bring these men home for Christmas, the war effort would gain more than it lost by giving these boys, their parents and their friends, renewed confidence in the justice of Uncle Sam. Bombers or transport planes have been used for far less worthy purposes during this war."

Compton said he was informed approximately 30,000 men are being sent home each month, and that he was aware of the problems involved in sending them home from the far Pacific.

He concluded that any of these problems could be solved.

 neotans who stood in the aisles and filled every one of the 10,000 seats in the House. The principal anathema, that only Congress has the constitutional power to declare war, was made available to an international organization "and what discretion it will give our representative to use that force."

In a state where the result may be affected by the bolt of Senator Joseph Ball, Republican, to the fourth term cap, the New York governor thus gave his answer to a major campaign question posed last Saturday when President Roosevelt told the Foreign Policy organization in New York city: "It is clear that if the world organization is to have any reality at all, our representative must be endorsed in advance by the people themselves, by constitutional means through their representative in Congress, with authority to act."

Told by George C. Jones, G. O. P. state chairman, that Minnesota, led in its electoral vote would go "two to one" for him, Dewey headed into Wisconsin and stops at Milwaukee, Racine and Kenosha before proceeding in mid-afternoon to Chicago. Dewey has scheduled another campaign address at 9 p. m. c. w. tonight.

In a three-hour pause at Milwaukee, Dewey "warmed with Congress with future Congressmen. Dewey told his Minneapolis listeners: "I have not the slightest doubt that a Congress which is working in partnership with the president will achieve the result we all consider essential and grand adequate power for swift action to the American representative to an international organization."

"But those who attempt to ride rough-shod over Congress and to dictate the course it should follow before it has ever been acquainted with the facts are trifling with the hope of the world," he declared.

"They are deliberately, in my judgment, seeking to prevent the hardening of minds. If this stubborn course is pursued, it can only result once again, as in 1918, in a disastrous conflict between the President and the Congress. To that I will never be a party."

It was his belief, Dewey said, that his country could not "build an understanding and a purpose for our future if we are to continue to have abuse from the President of members of Congress."

This nation, he said, must not and must not until January 20 "fall on dead center as a result of this series of recommitments between my opponent and the Congress."

"Cannot Work With Congress"
 "He has already demonstrated that he cannot work with the Congress of his own party," the New York governor declared. "It is unmistakably clear that our future demands that we have a chief executive who can and will work with the new Republican Congress beginning next Jan. 20."

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Rotary Club Hears Address

Principal Edson M. Bailey gave a splendid talk on "Our High School" to the members of the Rotary Club Tuesday evening.

Because of the fine supervision it has had during the past 50 years in the hands of Fred Verplanck and Arthur Willing, with the cooperation of Boards of Education which have been free of politics and teaching staffs which have given their best, Mancheater High School has been able to overcome inadequate facilities and produce outstanding results, according to Principal Edson M. Bailey who addressed the Rotary Club last evening at the Y. M. C. A.

Mancheater High school is unique in that the town and the Board of Education had no part in the building of the school nor in the selection of their staff.

The high school system as it is today was built by school districts, or by County Boards. Today the high school is a public institution, the 1,500 pupils who are enrolled in it are necessary to use three and one-half buildings to accommodate the enrollment.

Twelve Years of Education Briefly outlining the history of Education in America, Principal Bailey stated the fact that the United States is the only country in the world which offers 12 years of free public schooling beyond kindergarten and primary school, extending it to 13 or 14 years. Twenty-five per cent of eligible pupils attend high school, the old days whereas 67 to 75 per cent are enrolled today.

Other Activities In addition to the scholastic courses presented, the local high school offers varied other activities including sports, music, drama, and guidance. In the latter part of the year, the school offers in Army cadet and many other activities, and offers a good opportunity to participate in physical education and sports.

As an instance of the fine record of Mancheater High pupils Principal Bailey mentioned the results of Army Air Corps tests given to eligible boys. Out of 64 who took the test, 67 per cent passed.
