

Compton Describes 76 From New Haven as 'Forgotten Men'.

Washington, Oct. 25—(P)—Representative Compton (R., Conn.), in a letter to Secretary of War Stimson, today urgently appealed for the return home of 76 New Haven soldiers in the South Pacific whom he described as the "forgotten men" of the Army because they hadn't been nome for nearly

they hadn't been nome for nearly three years.

These boys, Compton told Stimson, 'have had nothing more than seven or ten days furiough in a foreign country in the 30 or more months they have been stationed in the South Pacific.' They comprise the original 208th anti-aircraft battery, and 12 of them now are attached to Battery D, 745th A.A.A. gun battalion, the letter stated. stated. They have braved Jap fire, the jungles, heat, incessant rain, de-hydrated food, loneliness, ennui, and worry, for nearly three years without complaining," Compton said, "They have seen their bud-

dies in arms leave and go home, they have watched and wondered while Australian soldiers came into their lonely outposts, stayed a maximum of 15 or 18 months, and then were sent back to the main-land, for that awfully necessary sight of family and friends and 'home sweet home.' "War Effort Would Gain"

"Even if one or more bombers were detached from service and used to bring these men home for Christmas, the war effort would gain more than it lost by giving these boys, their parents and their friends, renewed confidence in the justice of Uncle Sam. Bombers or transport planes have been used transport planes have been used for far less worthy purposes dur-ing this war."
