Garden Grove Seen Popular

Over 19,000 Persons Served There During Past 18 Months.

Arnold Pagan, who conducts the Garden Grove, off Keeney street, has furnished meals to 19,000 since he opened the grove 18 months ago. The largest number served at one time was late in August when the employees of Pratt and Whitney had a Sunday

outing that lasted from early in the morning until well along in the evening and which was attended by nearly 1,100 persons. So great has been the demand for the use of the grove for gatherings of this kind that Mr. Pagan has had a new road built into the grove from Keeney street and has arranged a parking place for 700 cars. He has installed a heating system in the building and has the entire building winterized.

His Democratic opponent's promises of post-war jobs, aid to small business and help for farmers were characterized by Dewey as "no good" and "worthless."

"When a man promises, in trying to win an election, that he will do this or that, and then that promise, long as the record is so good, even though it is repeated again and again," Dewey shouted.

Greets By Rehearsed Chant

The "again and again" chant was taken from Mr. Roosevelt's 1940 speeches when the president told of his desire to keep America out of foreign wars, was caught up by Republican partisans in the "honor and respect with whom of delight. Dewey shouted, when he first appeared by a rehearsed chant from the crowd: "It's time for a change."

The audience had been incited by Bill Keaton of Buffalo, master of ceremonies at the rally, to chant the phrase upon the appearance of the nominee.

Dewey declared that Mr. Roosevelt had undertaken to insult the new leadership, "said the country could not afford to have 'four more years of stalemate and hostility between the president and the United States and Congress."

"We can and we will restore to the White House a willingness to work out problems with the Congress as equals in the American fashion, over the conference table," he declared. "We must bring aid to government by abuse and by snare."

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Says Romanian Cabinet Quits

Details Given in Rome Radio Report; Resignations Accepted.

London, Nov. 1.—(AP)—The Rome radio reported today that the Romanian cabinet had resigned. The broadcast, heard by The Associated Press, gave no details but said King Mihai had accepted the resignations.

Earlier, the Moscow radio made a detailed report of demonstrations in Bucharest. The broadcast said the demonstrators demanded replacement of the government of Gen. Konstantin Sănătescu by a "national democratic front regime."

Quoting a Tass dispatch, the broadcast said that not less than 70,000 persons massed before the royal palace Monday and demanded a new government capable of carrying out the people's wishes.

A delayed Associated Press dispatch direct from Bucharest reported that the nation's strongest party, the national peasants led by Iiu Maniu, held a mass meeting Monday and outlined its program, which includes nationalization of industry, conversion of the country into a democratic workers state and complete redistribution of large land holdings.

Open Forum

Reply to "A Church Member" To the Editor: If through the courtesy of The Herald I might be permitted to answer your questions about Communism, would that Communism be Communism as a whole or the philosophy of which is that the interests of the individual or even groups of individuals.

First, through seven long years of war, during which much of China fought entirely alone, Chiang Kai-shek and his associates have refused to accept the overlordship of Japan. That basic element, all important factors kept Japan from consolidation of power. Japan's conquest makes Japan still vulnerable to our attack, and makes any eventual victory possible.

Second, whatever we have known of China's faults and weaknesses, we should be appraising China's future, after victory, as one of development. Out of China's long torture there will rise a great and, eventually, a unified nation, entitled to front rank place in the new world order.

These two basic reasons for our loyalty to China are not changed by these current disclosures of Chinese imperfections. We owe a debt to the Chinese people which can only be repaid by giving them a free chance to become the nation they deserve to be.

There is, however, always room for a live hope that there may be swift changes for the better. James L. McManamy, just returned from China, hailed the recent expansion of democratic privilege there, and stated conspicuously his opinion that China will be fighting strongly with us to the victorious end.

Russia Is Right It is another sample of Soviet Russia's classic, suspicious isolationism which is provided by that country's refusal to send its delegates to the international conference on civil aviation opening at Chicago today.

Why Re-Elect Baldwin? In the first editorial of this year we considered Baldwin as a man as a background for consideration of his record and his policies and his state leadership. We proposed, later, to discuss the record of those policies. Meanwhile, let us take a look at the alternative to the re-election of Governor Baldwin.

We have no heart, at a time when all American democracy is united in the signing of a great war, for the ordinary brand of vicious vilification and mud-slinging. We doubt that, at any time, such campaigning produces votes.

Our opposition to the election of Robert A. Hurley, then, begins with the admission that he has previously served two years as Connecticut's governor, that he accepted his responsibility with manly vigor, and that the resulting administration had both good points and its weak points.
