Roosevelt Visit Climax Of Campaign in State

No Formal Speeches on Schedule; Indication Given on Theme of Hartford Talk.

The 1944 political campaign comes to a climax in Connecticut today with a visit from President Roosevelt, the only major party presidential candidate to come in to the state.

En route to Boston for his final campaign address, the president had no formal speeches scheduled for Connecticut but promised to make talks in Bridgeport at 10 a. m. and in Hartford at noon.

Crowds in Naugatuck valley towns and in Waterbury, through which the presidential train will pass en route from Bridgeport to Hartford, were expected to try to get a glimpse of the chief executive.

Even before coming here, the president had given an indication of what he might say, announcing in Washington that while at Hartford "the insurance capital of the world" he probably would take occasion to recall that in 1838 and 1940 his opponents had predicted that insurance policies would be no good if he were re-elected.

Hannegan to Board Train

Robert E. Hannegan, Democratic national chairman, announced yesterday he would board the presidential train in Norwalk and would be accompanied through Connecticut by Democratic leaders including former Gov. Robert A. Hurley, Democratic national committee chairman, and gubernatorial nominee, Homer S. Cummings, former attorney general.

Plea of Wife Of No Avail Used Car Dealer Is Given Jail Sentence In Ration Case.

New Haven, Nov. 4.—(AP)—Federal Judge Carroll C. Hincks, remarking that "a wife's, a mother's, or a child's plea is a factor which tempts a judge in every case," sentenced Harry Kent, Bridgeport used car dealer, to ten days in jail for misbranding gasoline rationing coupons.

The judge's remark, made in passing sentence yesterday, was inspired by the plea of Mrs. Kent, who asked that her husband be let off with no more than a fine because, she said, if he went to jail it would end her career as a school teacher.

Kent admitted acquiring and transferring rationing and rationing coupons worth 7,650 gallons, but his wife said he had no guilty knowledge; that they were counterfeit or stolen.

Claim Seen Far-Fetched

"In this case the claim of non-premeditation is a little far-fetched," the judge said. "It is usually claim made by every criminal." He also imposed a \$100 fine, but suspended execution of judgment until Nov. 16.

Angelo Lupinacci, 30, of Stamford, accused of acquiring and transferring counterfeit and invalid rationing coupons worth 10,000 gallons, was sentenced to the Danbury correctional institute for 90 days and fined \$1,000.

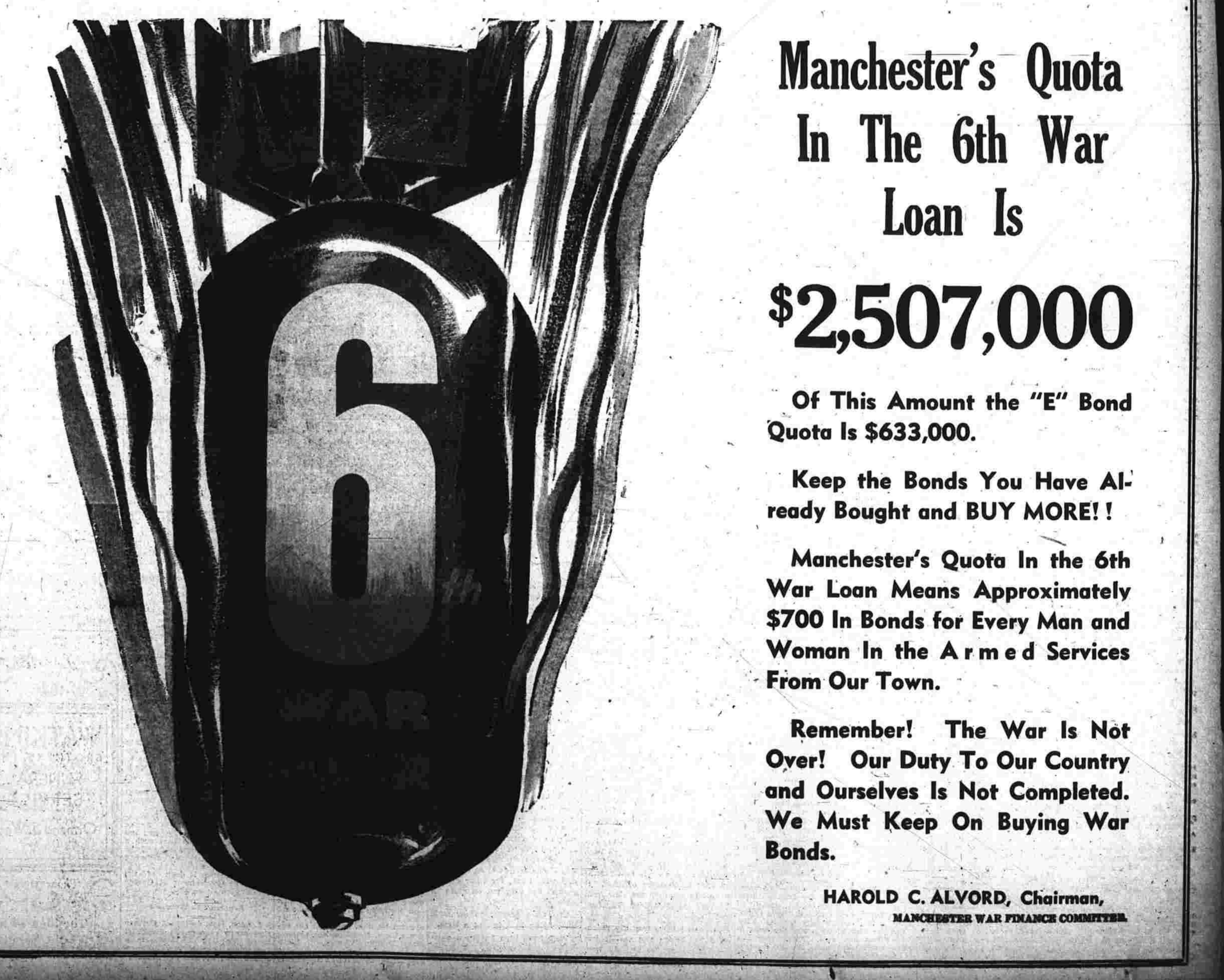
