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Your GI Rights "Where Can I Buy a Jeep?" Is Typical Soldier Question

Q. Where can I buy a jeep?
A. You can't buy one right now, soldier, but they may be for sale later.

Q. My wife is having a baby with free medical care while I'm in the Army. Can she get free care now that I'm out?
A. Yes, if she's already in or out of the regular way, after you've figured out definitely what you want to do.

Q. Can you sue for the fact that GI Bill of Rights money for me fast? I want to set up a shop and be my own boss.
A. Take your time, soldier. That's a long, long way. You get it in the regular way, after you've figured out definitely what you want to do.

These questions are samples of the many problems answered for veterans now being mustered out of the Army. At the Post Discharge Center, near Trenton, N.J., 200 to 300 soldiers check out of the Army daily. The questions serve as a guide to the main concerns of returning soldiers.

In most cases, returning soldiers worry about getting a job and financing a home so the family can get together. Army counselors help them, too, in straightening out taxes, insurance and other financial matters. Many are interested in loans for farms or small businesses, or in arrangements for their return to school.

Soldiers on their way out of the Army are given routine information concerning the GI Bill of

Paths to Victory Paved By Construction Giants

Wherever our troops go, they fight mud, sand and silt as well as the enemy. There are roads to be built and repaired, airstrips to be constructed, and rubble to be removed. Ever before the shelling stops, engineers move in with their earth-moving equipment, paving the way for advancing armies and their motorized weapons and supplies.

In the assault on the Marianne, the first pieces of equipment to be run off our army landing barges were not guns or trucks, but ordinary construction bulldozers—the kind of machine used back home to level roads and push the earth back into trenches dug for laying of water lines and sewer pipes.

The bulldozer is only one of the trinity of army engineers' wonder-weapons, but it is the most important because of its versatility. Assisted by the grader and the self-loading scraper, the other two in this trinity, the bulldozer is our "secret weapon."

The grader levels the ground as it runs up and down the road or landing strip; the scraper digs, loads and dumps the earth; but it is the bulldozer which pushes the earth and rocks to make way for the grading machine, can dig up trees, knock down trees and move logs out of the way. It can pull stalled vehicles out of mud, pull loaded sleds or "pallets" of supplies along the beach, and it can be used to clear across hazy, swampy and streamy areas.

Stories come back regularly of the common place performance of this common piece of construction equipment. It has even been used to bank in a machine gun nest in the South-west when one G. I. just drove his bulldozer over the rocks, earth and broken concrete. Self-loading scrapers combine the power shovel and the truck. Discharging its load at a predetermined angle, this machine can level the ground. Mounted on large pneumatic tires, it can navigate the softest terrain and speed over it almost as fast as an automobile. 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Front-line Air Schools Teach Plane Crews New Tricks of Their Trade

Front Line Air School—Here, only a few miles behind the front, a mobile unit of the Army Technical Training Command is holding classes for the crews of the earth.

The idea for these mobile training units came to Maj. Gen. John F. Curry, a couple of years ago when he was commanding the A.A.F.'s Western Technical Training Command at Denver, Colo. Under his direction, the first mobile unit was built over two years ago. Today there are 110 of these units scattered in the United States.

More than 25 of them are in the European Theater of Operations. Each mobile classroom consists of one five-ton trailer, into which are stored maps, charts, and other teaching material. The trailer is towed by a truck or a jeep.

The mobile school, for example, is now being used by the 1st Army in the Cherbourg Peninsula in mid-August. Lt. Fickel took no time getting to the front with his trailer. He packed the mobile school in a jeep, headed by 7-Sgt. Joseph H. Bowdler, who holds his rank as a clerk in Chicago, Ill.
