Lights and Phones Out As Storm Strikes Town

Wet Snow Breaks the Wires in Different Sections; Cars Stalled by Slippery Highways.

The unexpected wet snowstorm that swept through Manchester today caused widespread trouble in the city and vicinity, interrupted electric and phone service and made motor travel hazardous.

One of the worst traffic jams caused by slippery highways occurred in Bolton on Nigger Hill where upwards of 100 cars were marooned at the foot of the hill for more than two hours about 5 o'clock, blocking all progress east. Included in the group of cars stalled at the foot of the hill were trucks carrying goods, mail, and just plain cars carrying afternoon war workers to their homes.

Bus for Telephone
Gowdy's filling station at the foot of Nigger Hill was like a scene from Union Station during a storm, with drivers flocking to the score trying to call their homes to notify the traveling conditions. Trucks and cars were scattered all over Nigger Hill, unable to get to the top in the slippery traveling. Gowdy's stock of gasoline was sold out in a few minutes.

The Herald suburban delivery truck was unable to complete the route to the homes of traveling and backcountry driving.

Shattered Old Road
In town, several cars were reported to have skidded off the road against fences and onto lawns with little damage to the cars. There was very little traction in the wet slippery highways.

The Connecticut Company doubled up on the cutting lines and even failed to make a connection in time. In some instances buses had difficulty starting up the steep hillsides and the drivers were forced to stop at intervals to retrace the steeper slopes on the hillsides.

One car on Roosevelt avenue missed the driveway into a garage and slid off into the edge of the storm of Arthur Boulevard. It was removed this morning without damage.

Back in Operation
Although the transmission lines of the Connecticut Power Company were considerably affected by the snowstorm last night, officials of the company reported this morning that all lines are again in operation after temporary power shorts in the North End section, Middle Turnpike, Birch Street and other sections of town.

Officials of the company stated today that they consider that they were fortunate in escaping from the sudden storm as well as they did with the heavy, wet snow forcing large limbs and branches across high tension wires in so many areas of the company's transmission circuits.

Great Flashes of Light
In many sections lights were blown with sharp reports and brilliant flashes of light when high-powered lines snapped by the snow and weight of limbs on the wires. Later in the evening most of the power on the limbs of the trees was blown off when a light breeze came up. Had the weight of snow increased as it began early in the evening, more serious damage would have resulted.

The sudden storm, coming after a long period of good weather, caught the town highway department unprepared for plowing out streets and forced extra work during the late evening plowing out the principal streets.

Clearing Cross Walks
Gangs of men were at work this morning shoveling out the cross walks and hydrants and opening up the storm water drains.

For a time last night a dozen or more cars were stranded on Center street hill, unable to reach the Center. Buses which stopped at regular stops had difficulty in getting traction enough to start up again on the steep incline.

The park department employees were on the job early today shoveling out the park sidewalks.

90 Phone Lines Out
The Southern New England Telephone Company reported scattered line and station trouble resulting from the storm over the local area. Manager D. Lloyd Hobron reported today that 20 lines were out of commission temporarily, with 90 stations affected.

In general the damage to the communications was due to snow on wires and tree branches weighing down and breaking or otherwise cutting off communications for the time being. It is expected Mr. Hobron stated that all of the affected lines and stations will be placed in operation today or early tomorrow.

Ordered to Disband And Join Regular Army

London, Nov. 17.—(AP)—Premier Hubert Pierlot of Belgium has ordered members of his country's resistance movement to disband and join the regular Belgian Army by tomorrow or "be prosecuted as traitors," he said.

The proclamation was broadcast at the close of a four-hour cabinet meeting. Later the Brussels radio said Mr. Gen. W. E. J. Franklin, head of the Allied supreme command's military mission in Belgium, had informed the government that "Allied troops are at its disposal to maintain peace and to assist in the disarmament of the white army."

The government also prohibited the sale of arms to the "white" army.
