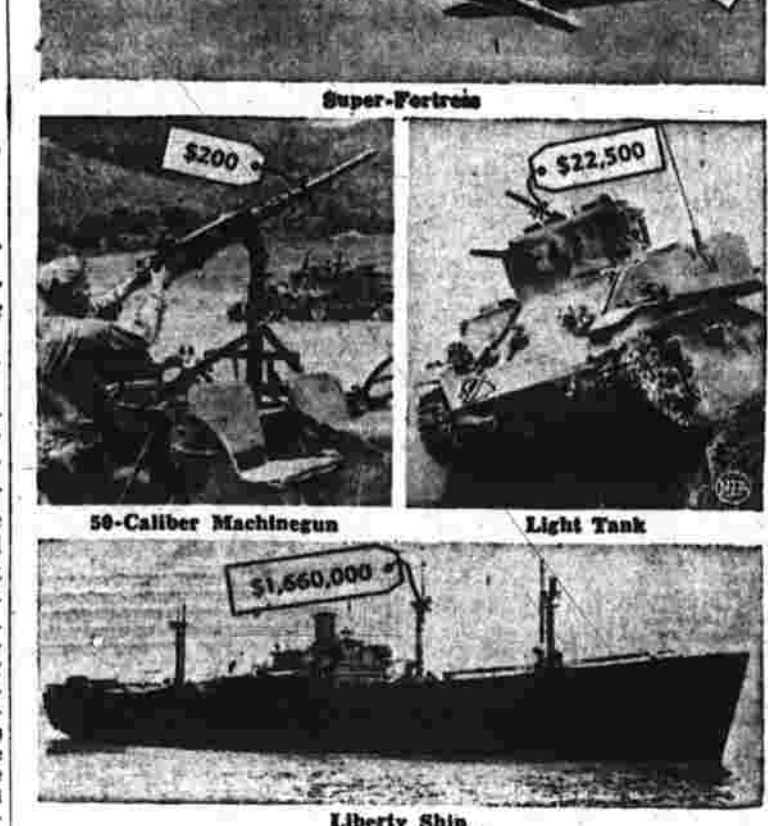

Rockville Budget Voted For Rockville

Two Changes Made in Total as Suggested by the City Council

Rockville, Dec. 5 (Special) At the annual city meeting held Tuesday evening, appropriations totaling \$1,118,824.20 were voted by the citizens with two changes made in the total as recommended by the Council.

The matter of \$2,300 for a police pension fund which was to be a premium for a police insurance pension plan was withdrawn following a discussion. Alderman Kiefer explained the reason for the new pension plan, and Alderman Ross spoke on the Police Pension plan which is now in effect in the city. Corporation Counsel E. J. Ackerman stated that the present police pension plan was created about 1936 by a special act of the General Assembly and this was later ratified by the citizens of the city by ballot. In his opinion, the present Police Pension plan would conflict with the one now in effect, which is really a Retirement fund available for members of the police force when they reach the age of 65.

Harper, John W. Bacon and Henry E. Pitteloom all remain in the building. A formal statement by the warden said the exact cause of the trouble had not been learned but that "some objection has been made to the quarantining of German saboteurs and spies in the same building." Then, too, he added, the rebellious convicts are "naturally protesting their own segregation."

A number of recently arrived inmates are in the seized building he said, but they did not join in the revolt.

All but a small group of subordinates were locked in their cells in the building, Sanford said. The guards when they were overpowered Monday night, were unarmed.

Prison activities, outside the segregation building, were proceeding normally, officials said.

Skeptical About Intentions of Those Supporting Move to Alter Congress Setup.

Washington, Dec. 6.—(AP)—Congress is on the verge of creating a committee of its own members to explore ways of improving Congress. In some ways Congress is out of date. Its machinery creaks and it doesn't have all the help it needs to do a job.

Proposed Committee First Step. Newspapers, political scientists and particularly younger congressmen have urged improvement. The proposed committee is the first step.

The work of that committee, which seems sure to be set up, will be to study the committee's work. It doesn't expect too much or anything too radical.

Already some of the older congressmen are skeptical about the intentions of the younger congressmen who want the committee.

"This is just a dodge of these young fellows to try to get around an old fellow," one old-time congressman said.

Another oldtimer said: "These young fellows just want to get ahead in a hurry without staying around long enough to take their turn."

The two oldtimers—both powerful—were talking about this: The committee rights and privileges which a congressional representative or senator acquires by staying around a long time.

Chairmanship Big Prize. And a committee chairmanship is the big prize, powerful. You get it automatically as someone ahead in the line.

Maloney Senate Backer. The proposed committee to find ways of streamlining Congress was suggested in a resolution by Senator Maloney (D. Conn.), who has only a minor committee chairmanship, and Representative Monroney (D. Okla.), who has no chairmanship.

The Senate approved the resolution. It is now being considered by the very powerful House Rules committee, full of oldtimers. They will probably pass it out to the House floor. It is expected to get an okay there, too.

Hopes to Break Zebra. Chicago—(AP)—Victor Kleinert, Jr., who owns a riding stable and also has a pet dog, two cats, two parrots and a monkey, got another animal on his 28th birthday—a baby zebra.

Boston, Dec. 6.—(AP)—War contracts for artillery shells, fuses and other vital materials amounting to \$20,000,000 are to be awarded New England manufacturing firms, according to Arthur C. Gerns, regional director of the War Relocation Commission.

The Fight For Principle
 The future success of the relationship of the United Nations, the hope for a post-war world in which some collective security against war will be possible, are not based on any futile and foolish assumption that the United Nations are to be free from controversy.

The hope lies in the possibility that such controversy, when it must occur, will be openly and honestly stated, and brought to an honest solution.

The open and honest statement of difference is what has now occurred with the State Department's move in the Italian situation. That statement makes it much plainer than diplomatic language usually does that we oppose the British policy of voting Count Carlo Sforza as a member of any Italian government. It also makes it plain that we oppose having any one of the allies use its force of arms to bring strength to one political side of a controversy in any liberated nation.

In such a statement, American foreign policy goes back to the Atlantic Charter, a document signed by all the United Nations, a document which still ought to be observed, no matter how much some people would like to forget it.

The Atlantic Charter has already been violated by Soviet Russia in the case of the three Baltic Republics, and it is being violated by Russia in the case of Poland.

On such precedents there is, in a hard-boiled, disinterested sense, no reason why it shouldn't also be violated in the case of Italy and Greece, where Britain has interests quite as keen as Russia's interests in the Baltic states and in Poland. On such precedents, there is no reason why the United States shouldn't start violating it, too, in directions our American imperialists are always ready to suggest.

But such policies are not peace-making policies. They can lead only to another war.

The community of nations which is the United Nations was not organized to permit mutual tolerance of individual violations of the principles upon which the United Nations stand. It was not to condone one another's old-fashioned imperialism, these nations must, if there is to be a world in which new war will not be a certainty, hand together in a common renunciation of imperialistic aims and practices.

The United States, at least, has only one real price on its participation in this war, and the aid it has provided. It is a price not in cash, but in principle.

The victory of principles which will have a chance of saving this world from new war is the only thing we really care about after elementary military victory itself. It is the one thing we must fight for, above all else, if we are true to ourselves.

It is good and healthy, therefore, to have the new State Department regime begin with renewed affirmation of our unaltered stand on principles. There are unpleasant signs that unless we do fight for these principles, our allies will forget them and violate them easily enough, and head blindly down the road to another war which would inevitably involve us. If we are to avoid the task of fighting that war, we must fight for principle now.

never will be heard of again. It is important only because it occupies its special, temporary role as a military objective. When its special role is over, it itself is most probably destroyed, a few hundred Germans have become battle casualties. And then the tide of battle rolls forward, to another town, just like the first.

There are minor variations in the battle for such a town, but the main outlines are deadly repetition. Approaching American troops make it their next objective. They call on their artillery and their bombers, and the town is blasted until it seems that very little of the nature of a prepared defense could still exist there. Then a unit of infantry or tanks will make an advance, seeking to enter the town. Unchecked fire may drive them back. Then, sometimes under cover of darkness, they will seek a side entry. One way or another, an American group will get a foothold inside the town. More often than not, it will find itself immediately isolated, with the desperate task of holding out, if it can, until some other unit also makes an entry. It takes what cover and advantage it can find and fights for time.

When the German counter attack comes, and it always does come, this first occupying unit is always outnumbered. Frequently, it will have to call on our own artillery to shell the very area in which it itself is fighting. When our shells come, they hope they get more Germans than Americans. They hold on in their isolated desperation, waiting for the help which alone can make their own advance good and permanent. All too frequently, these advance units lose their commanding officer. Some one else steps up, and takes command. They have not, pass long hours in darkness, not knowing where their own men are, where the enemy is, or when help will come.

Eventually, after a night, or twenty-four hours, another American unit comes boring in from another side of town, or American tanks come blasting down the main street, and the American attack has arrived in force. The Germans are blasted through to the edges of the town. An American command post is set up in the center of town. The town becomes a base instead of an objective. The new objective is another such town, a few miles further along the road to Berlin. In its turn, must be battled for in

 Washington, Dec. 6.—(AP)—Republicans maneuvered today to keep Congress on hand if the Senate passes and the President vetoes legislation to freeze social security taxes.

The bill would keep the payroll tax at 1 percent each on employer and employee for another year, forestalling an otherwise automatic increase to 2 percent on Jan. 1.

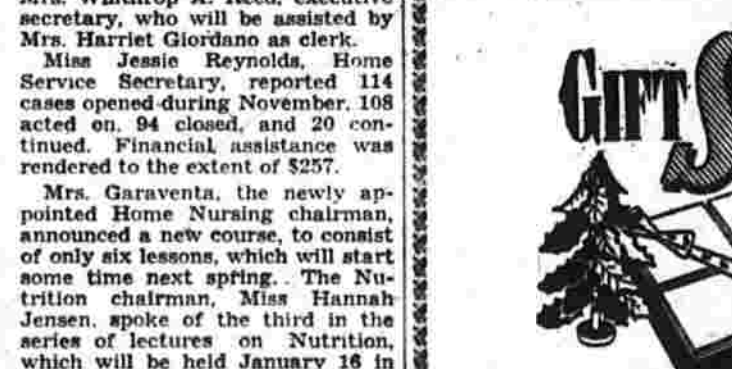

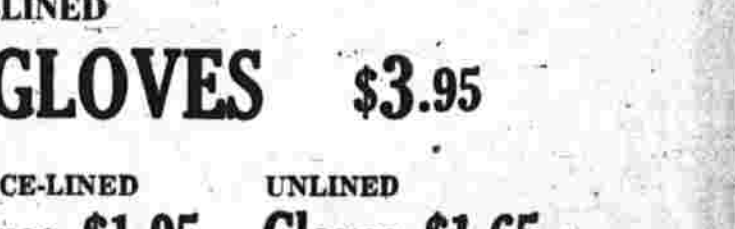
