Third Army Bores Mile and One Half Into German Line

Long Toms and Heavy Howitzers Steadily Reducing Saarbrücken; Seventh Army Rolls Nazi Toward Saar On 35-Mile Front.

Paris, Dec. 8.—(P)—The Third Army bores a mile and a half into the Siegfried line at points eight miles inside the Saarland under intense German fire today and steadily reduced Saarbrücken and its steel mills with Long Toms and heavy howitzers firing three miles or so from that point.

Reports Forth Captured (The Paris radio broadcast that the Third Army had captured Forth, rail city of 11,500, three and a half miles southwest of Saarbrücken.

On the Third Army's right, the Seventh Army of Lieut. Gen. Alexander M. Patch rolled the Germans toward the Saar and Palatine on a 35-mile front and advanced within four and a half miles of the frontier.

Saarlautzen, capital of the Saarland and center of its industry, was being ripped to pieces by artillery within sight of the burning city of 135,000 for the ninth consecutive day. The Germans themselves were wrecking their own power plants, and their own artillery, trying to hamper the American buildup of assault forces in the area.

The Ninth Army to the north reported no signs of enemy movement in little villages east of the Roer, east and southeast of Jülich.

Seventh Seizes Mauthouse The Seventh Army captured Mauthouse, four miles south of the Maginot stronghold of Bittene, which was attacked by 75 planes. Which moved his center into Gambeth, a mile from the Rhine and eight northeast of Strasbourg.

Infantry of Lieut. Gen. Courtney H. Hodges' First Army set a high ground between Inden and Pter, five miles northeast of the Rhine citadel of Düren. They advanced onto a ridge commanding the town and German forces were driven back for several hundred yards.

Tokyo Shaken During Quake Japs Admit Tidal Wave, Landslide and Damaged Buildings Result.

By The Associated Press Radio Tokyo admitted today that the earthquake yesterday caused a tidal wave which covered houses with water, started a landslide and damaged buildings.

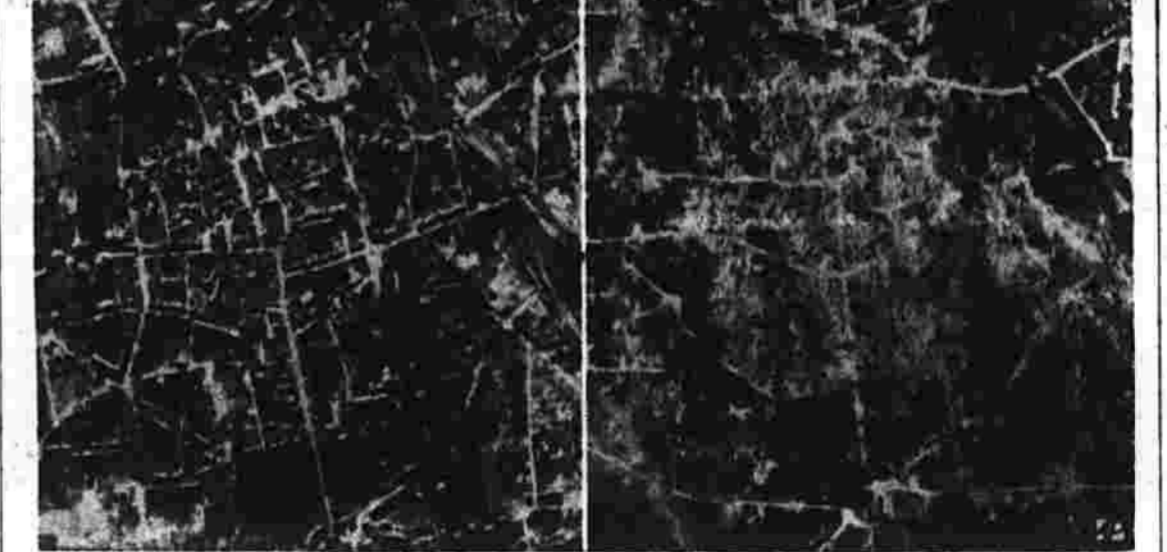
After almost a day of denials of major damage, the Japanese news agency Domei admitted that Tokyo was shaken and that a tidal wave inundated houses.

The Domei dispatch, intercepted by the Federal Communications Commission, said: "Center to Sea of Eushu. The seismic center of the earthquake which hit the Tokyo district yesterday afternoon was in the Sea of Eushu.

"The districts affected by the earthquake include Hamanata, Shinooka, Nagano and their vicinity, where some damage was caused to dwellings.

"The quake caused some houses to be inundated, while in Nagano damage was slight, with only window panes being broken.

Japs Retreat On Ledo Road Link to China

Withdrawals in Burma On Such Large Scale Likely Route Will Be Cleared Within Week.

New Delhi, India, Dec. 8.—(P)—Japanese withdrawals in Burma are on such a large scale that it appeared today the Ledo route to China would be cleared possibly within a week or ten days, but it was increasingly likely that it would be too late.

Already the Japanese in China are in positions to threaten Kunning, which is a huge airbase hub and the only really effective landing field for the Burma road.

Short Supply Route Sought United States, Britain and Russia Want to Ship Into Black Sea.

Washington, Dec. 8.—(P)—The United States, Britain and Russia are working at top speed to get a short-cut route for lend-lease supplies to the Red Army through Turkish waters.

They want to shift from the long way around through Iran to the direct passage of the Dardanelles.

When this change is accomplished, any responsible estimates here, it will mark the greatest improvement in supply shipping since the Mediterranean was reopened from Gibraltar to Suez the summer of 1943.

10 Airlines Get Planes For Fleets

20 Transports Allocated For Civilian Use by Clayton; More Will Be Available Shortly.

Washington, Dec. 8.—(P)—The nation's airlines, pinched for planes since the Army dipped deeply into their fleets, may not have to wait for the war's end to get all they want.

W. L. Clayton, surplus war property administrator, announced today that he has allocated 20 2-engine DC-3 transports to ten airlines, and that additional planes would be available.

This boosted to 317 the number of planes available to the domestic airlines, and sent their fleets to war-pre-war levels.

Before the war the domestic airlines owned a total of about 350 planes, but many of them were military aircraft, reducing the domestic fleet to 166. Since then planes have been taken in dribbles from the Air Transport Command.

Decisive Vote Favoring King

Canada Endorses Action Conscriping Troops For Replacements.

Ottawa, Dec. 8.—(P)—The Canadian Parliament gave Prime Minister W. L. Mackenzie King a decisive vote of confidence today in a move endorsing his decision to conscript troops for replacements in Europe and apparently burying the nation-splitting conscription issue for the duration of the war.

The vote was 143 to 70, with nationalist French Canada, traditionally opposed to conscription for fighting overseas, dividing to give the government a measure of support regarded as a personal triumph for the veteran prime minister.

Abandon Historic Position After an eloquent plea for unity by King, 21 members from the French-speaking province of Quebec and from other French-speaking constituencies abandoned the historic French-Canadian position and voted with the majority.

The 21 members included the three-voice Quebec cabinet ministers. Thirty-six Quebec and other French-speaking members voted against the government.

The vote, announced at 1:23 p. m., ended a special session of Parliament which had run into its 12th day. It climaxed a 35-day crisis over the conscription issue during which the ancient rivalry between English and French Canada had burst emotionally into one of the most bitter and divisive political campaigns in the nation's history.

General MacArthur's Headquarters, Philippines, Dec. 8.—(P)—Veteran, 77th division Yankees from Guam, landed today by the Navy to the rear of more than 25,000 trapped Japanese, rolled back the Japanese and the only really effective landing field for the Burma road.

Nearly 1,000 Greeks Lay Down Arms Heavy Loss In Purchase Of 10 Ships

Fighting on Much Reduced Scale Today in Others as Resistance By Leftists Decreases.

Bulletin! Athens, Dec. 8.—(P)—British patrols in tanks and armored cars pushed out from Athens today to meet 300 insurgent Elass militiamen advancing from the northeast on the Greek capital, where general firing was resumed. Greek tank sides broke the overnight lull in the civil strife.

Athens, Dec. 8.—(P)—Fighting continued on a much reduced scale in Athens today as Greek leftist resistance faded before British patrols spreading out from the center of the city in a steady line. Snipers were reported giving considerable trouble in some residential quarters, however, and occasional bullets still whirped over the crowded streets in the Constitution square, where Greek civil police were holding rooftop positions.

British Prime Minister Wins Resounding Vote Of Confidence; Opposition to Sforza Also Supported; Vote Is Demanded as Justification For Continuation Of His Foreign Policy.

London, Dec. 8.—(P)—In a fighting mood today, Prime Minister Churchill defended Britain's intervention in Greece and Italy—and won a resounding 279-30 vote of confidence from the House of Commons. The 70-year-old leader received his ninth vote of confidence after declaring that Britain acted in Greece only to avert gangster rule.

Support Stand on Sforza He stood by the British government's opposition to Count Carlo Sforza, whom the United States has supported in the Italian government crisis.

His ire aroused by bitter, left-wing denunciations of his stand, Churchill himself demanded the vote of confidence as justification for the continuation of his policy.

Commons gave him that support. He said such action would show that Britain "will persist in this policy of clearing Athens and the Athens regions of all those who are rebels to the constituted authority in Greece.

Not Designed for Greece Alone "But he made it abundantly clear that the policy was not designed for Greece alone; that Britain stood committed to the right of a people to choose their own form of free election, but that it would not tolerate a "gang of men from the mountains" overthrowing constitutional authority by violence.

Simultaneously with the vote of confidence, British Ambassador Halifax announced in Washington that the American and British governments had achieved an understanding on the Greek and Italian issues—without defining the "understanding" further.

Fighting between left-wing forces and British troops was continuing in Athens even as Churchill spoke.

Upholding the use of tanks and troops against left-wing forces in Greece, Churchill said Britain acted to ensure that gangsters did not descend from the mountains and attack themselves with all their bloody terror and vigor in power.

Does Not Trust Sforza "As for the American-supported Count Carlo Sforza, Churchill told Commons Britain simply did not trust him "nor would we put the slightest confidence in any government of which he is a dominant member."

Soviet Units Move Nearer To Budapest

Heavily Armored Right Wing of Russian Third Ukraine Army Little Over 15 Miles Away.

Moscow, Dec. 8.—(P)—The heavily armored right wing of the Russian Third Ukraine Army was reported little more than 15 miles from Budapest today in the fiercely sustained drive to cut off the Hungarians from the Danube.

### Pensions in Millions If Bill Not Vetoes

Benefits to Widows and Children of Veterans of World War I Now Awaiting Approval.

Washington, Dec. 8.—President Roosevelt has a bill on his desk. If he signs it into law it will affect many people and cost many millions of dollars, eventually perhaps billions.

The bill, passed this week by Congress, would do this if it became law: Give pensions to the widows and children of World War I veterans who died or will die from any cause not connected in any way with their war service.

If the bill is not vetoed, it would mean that the surviving widow of a World War I veteran who died of a disability connected with his war service, his widow gets \$50 a month. If she has dependent children, she gets an extra \$15 extra for each additional child.

The present bill—if it becomes law—would pay the same kind of pensions as No. 2 above. But the point is this: There doesn't have to be even a tiny disability due to World War I service for a pension, provided he has no other cause for any disability. His survivors, with certain exceptions, are entitled to a pension.

Two Main Provisions In Bill These are two main provisions in the bill: This World War I veteran must have served at least 90 days and not been discharged for reasons other than dishonorable.

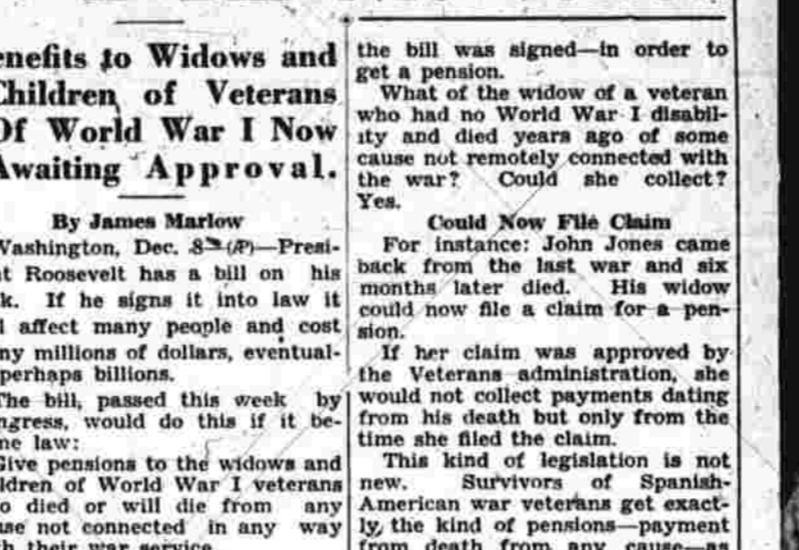

### Cheney Hospital Fund Contribution \$40,000

Drive's First Total of \$77,500 Also Reflects Large Pioneer, Ellis Gifts in Campaign.

The first subscriptions by corporations to the Manchester Memorial hospital's \$500,000 building fund as announced today by Sidney Ellis, chairman of the Corporation Committee, totaled \$77,500 and were called by fund leaders as an augury of success for the movement for the hospital's expansion.

Headed the list of initial corporation contributions made for the calendar year 1944 was an addition of \$40,000 by Cheney Brothers.

Other corporate subscriptions made for the present year by leading industries include: \$20,000 by the Pioneer Parachute Company and \$10,000 by the Ellis Coat Company and its affiliate, the Independent Cloth Company. All three concerns indicated that additional contributions would be considered next year.

The total of \$77,500 was a \$2,500 contribution by the Manchester Text Letter.

In a letter transmitting the corporation and membership, H. R. Mallory, Executive Vice President, said:

"The directors of Cheney Brothers at a meeting held on Nov. 30, 1943, to make a contribution to the Manchester Memorial hospital for the year 1944, the amount of \$40,000. Our check for this amount is enclosed. We cannot make any commitment for 1945, but we are ready to contribute to the hospital year after year. The directors' recommendation was approved and we have accepted it. It is our earnest hope that other corporations will be equally generous and prompt in their contribution to the hospital in the interests of their employees."

In commenting upon the first response to the contribution, Mr. Ellis said that "these generous and prompt contributions to the hospital are in hearty accord with the program for the enlargement of the hospital in the interests of their employees."

"The fact that the first three large subscribers to the hospital in the present calendar year is especially encouraging," Mr. Ellis said. "It shows that the concerns which are contributing to the hospital are interested in their full share of the cost of constructing and equipping facilities of the hospital which they will be operating and their families will be depending on."

Mr. Ellis said that it is expected that other corporations will be contributing for the next calendar year, and that these will be announced as soon as they have been authorized.

"I am very pleased to have seen organizations in which I have definite recognition," Mr. Watkins said, "and the thousands of men, women and children in this area who are dependent on the hospital for their health and their families will be grateful."


