Damage widespread. Traffic, land and air, and utility operations were closed, and at some areas, largely caused by hazardous conditions on the main streets and highways, mounted directly attributed to storm conditions were reported.

The bureau said still falling in New York city reported only a trace of rain last night but the weather bureau forecast a drop in temperatures and snow.

Snow Falls in South

The south did not escape the storm snow on Alabama and Georgia and on Tennessee, too, with central Alabama getting the heaviest amount. Baton Rouge, La., the farthest southern city reporting snow, had a trace of snow. The storm which started in Nebraska and Kansas.

New London, Dec. 12.—(AP)—A large foreign trade program is indispensable for our post-war economy," J. F. Red Cross Worker Describes His Experiences in Burma, India.

E. Gerry Tracy, field director of the American Red Cross in India for the last 20 months and now home on furlough was the speaker last evening at the Men's Fellowship Club of the South Methodist church. He described the men of our forces who have fought in the jungles of Burma and sweated out the seasons in India without firing a gun, yet doing an indispensable task, as heroes of this war no less than the men on the active front.

Long War in Japan
