**Churchill Defends Action in Belgium; Blocks War Data**

**Refers Repeatedly to Eisenhower in Hitting Back at Acid Criticism of Opposition; Temporary New Black-out Sand Supported.**

London, Dec. 19.—(P)—Prime Minister Churchill blocked today a full scale Commons review of the war and the strife in Greece, but in a region somewhat away from the hot-tempered defense of British troops' intervention in Belgium.

"We were acting un-aided," he said in upholding use of armed force in last month's riots in Belgium.

Says Eisenhower might refer repeatedly to General Eisenhower in hitting back at the acid criticism of opposition members Churchill said last night in a speech. He declined to give a review of the situation in Greece, but he said that Eisenhower was right in imposing a temporary new black-out on western front developments.

Churchill made it clear that if the House of Commons wanted an immediate review of the Greek situation it would have to come on a vote of censure, rather than a vote of confidence, which would mean his government would stand or fall on the outcome.

The opposition did not appear disposed to accept the challenge on those terms.

**Jap Balloon Could Start Forest Fire**

Announcement of the Bureau of Investigation said last night that the balloon, which was found after Owen Hill and his father, O. H. Hill, found it while on a wood-cutting trip.

More than 500 residents saw the balloon, which landed in a region somewhat away from forest fire, they heeded a warning to refrain from talking of it.

L. D. Spafford, Kalispell police, said "everybody" who was in the building at the time of the discovery was notified. The Federal Bureau of Investigation wanted to discuss it, the whole town clamored.

**Yankees Push Ahead Easily On Mindoro**

No Ground Resistance As Staggering Toll of Jap Planes Put Out of Action Announced.

General MacArthur's Headquarters, Philippines, Dec. 19.—(P)—America's easiest invasion job of the Pacific war went ahead today as the U. S. forces pushed forward on Mindoro without the slightest ground resistance as J. P. C. MacArthur reported that 742 Japanese planes put out of action the night of Dec. 18.

The raid on Nagoya, on Japan's principal island of Honshu, was carried out simultaneously with a raid on the Japanese-occupied city of Hankow in China.

Today's attack was carried out by 60 Super-Fortresses, the main targets on Kyushu, one of the main islands of the Japanese home islands.

A Japanese imperial communiqué reported that between 30 and 40 Super-Fortresses bombed the city of Omura, on western Kyushu today. It was the fifth reported attack on the city since last July, industrial targets there include an aircraft factory.

Another of these purported disclosures tells how, at the Cambridge Conference, President Roosevelt was set upon suggesting that Churchill to announce that it would be "unconditional surrender" which would be exacted from Germany. Here, according to the story, it was Mr. Churchill who had his price. From this, if it took place, stemmed the present situation which finds America an outsider, not even being consulted, in these theaters.

In one of these reported deals, Mr. Churchill had to sacrifice a fellow ally and the principles of the Atlantic Charter in order to place, at the disposal of the Allies, a military partnership which is the right and natural thing.

In the other reported deal, Mr. Roosevelt had to give up the sphere of influence in order to win a victory for what he considered an essential principle.

There should be no price set on the cooperation necessary for the winning of this war. There should be no price set on the adoption of a principle, if the principle is a right one.

The practical results of such deals are better than the idealistic results. A military partnership based on that kind of price is not a very secure partnership. Only in one way could this German counter-offensive be turned into a definite victory for us. That would come in the form of a smash it beyond recognition and, through the gap of its destruction, proceed to sudden new gains, as yet, that we are capable of accomplishing this, although every story that comes through the newspaper tells of our under-estimation of the German, a master-stroke for the Germans, a somewhat shocking revelation of our under-estimation of the enemy we face. If the picture can be changed, it will be by the blood and guts of American soldiers.

Where It Began The present failure of Allied diplomacy has brought a series of apparently well informed disclosures as to the original decisions responsible for these present conditions. These disclosures are not authoritative; they cannot, at this stage of history at least, actually be proved, for they purport to be disclosures of decisions and deals made personally among the great Allied leaders. But they are not being denied, and events bear them out.

One such disclosure was the story of how, at Teheran, Churchill had to surrender Poland in order to get Stalin's agreement to coordinate military action against Germany. That, if true, explains the tortured course of the Polish question, and it may, in the contrary, it seems likely that the reason that may be responsible for the inactivity of Stalin's
