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### Veteran Held For Murder

#### Admits Striking Detroit Woman and Leaving Her in School Yard

Detroit, Jan. 7.—(AP)—Walter J. Blissett, 19-year-old discharged veteran, faces first degree murder charges in connection with the slaying last week of Mrs. Gladys Marston, 40, whose strangled body was found last Sunday morning in a school yard.

Detective Lieut. Charles Buchholdt of the Detroit homicide squad said Sunday a first degree murder warrant would be asked against the youth. He stated Blissett admitted striking the woman "because she wouldn't quit hollering" and leaving her in the yard.

Buchholdt said the veteran, who is a private in the Michigan state troops, admitted taking nine dollars and a wrist watch from the slayer.

Blissett voluntarily surrendered himself to police Saturday night and Buchholdt quoted him as saying he killed Mrs. Marston the same night they drank together in a Detroit tavern a week ago.

Buchholdt said Blissett told him that Mrs. Marston and he had several drinks together after they became noisy after they left the tavern, he struck her "to sober her up."

The boy told Buchholdt she struck him and he hit her back with a brick.

Wounded by Blissett

Blissett was with the late Gen. George Patton's Third Army when he was wounded by shrapnel in February. He received a medical discharge in September.

He appeared at police headquarters Saturday with his brother, Charles, who told officers this man has something to tell about the Marston case.

Young Blissett later told reporters he had followed his brother's suggestion that he give himself up because "I thought I might get a break and get less time."

### Former Dramatic Critic Is Dead

Norwalk, Jan. 7.—(AP)—Frank Vreeland, 45, of Westport, a former dramatic critic who once worked with the late Alexander Woollcott, died yesterday at Norwalk hospital after three hours after he was stricken ill at his home.

Vreeland, a Phi Beta Kappa graduate of Cornell, was Woodcott's assistant when the latter was dramatic critic of the New York Herald Tribune, and World Tribune of the New York World Telegram.

He left the newspaper business to work in the editorial department of Paramount Pictures, first in the New York office and then at Hollywood.

After the start of the war, Vreeland joined the Office of War Information and later wrote dramatic sketches and conducted fund raising campaigns for the Treasury Department's War Bond committee.

The son of a newspaperman, the late William C. Vreeland, racing expert for the old New York World, was survived by his widow, his mother and a brother.

### Will Not Strike In Connecticut

New Haven, Jan. 7.—(AP)—President Paul E. Boyce of the Connecticut Union of Telephone Workers, Inc., reporting on a recent executive meeting here, decided today that his union had decided not to support the striking Western Electric Company employees in Kearny, N. J., through strike action.

The Connecticut Union of Telephone Workers, which has a claimed membership of 8,000 employees of the Southern New England Telephone Co., is an affiliate of the National Federation of Telephone Workers. The Kearny, N. J., Western Electric workers also are members of the union of the national federation.

Meanwhile, some 75 employees of the Western Electric Co., West Haven, members of the New Haven local of the National Association of Telephone Equipment Workers have voted to support the Kearny strike "in any way" deemed necessary by their national union, an official said.

### Former Republican Leader Dies

Redding, Jan. 7.—(AP)—William E. Hansen, former Republican leader who was postmaster at Georgetown in this town, for 12 years and had served four terms as a representative in the General Assembly, died here Saturday at the home of his daughter.

### May Modify Truman Plan

Washington, Jan. 7.—(AP)—A compromise version of President Truman's proposal for fact-finding in major labor disputes is taking shape on Capitol Hill.

Mr. Truman suggested that inquiry boards be set up with authority to subpoena records he set up and that strikes be banned during 30-day fact-finding periods.

Under the compromise plan these provisions would be modified. As disclosed to a reporter by House Labor committee spokesmen who asked not to be identified:

1. Congress would declare it favors a 30-day cooling off period but would not make strikes illegal during that time.

2. The power of subpoena would be limited, with the extent of the limitation yet to be decided.

If a compromise can be agreed upon whereby the boards are established and given legal standing but are denied subpoena authority, the proposal will be accepted by management. One lawmaker said in an interview. "Likewise, if the 'no-strike' item is stricken, the plan will be acceptable to labor."

Like Johnston Suggestion

Legislation similar to the reported compromise plan was suggested in December by Eric Johnston, president of the United States Chamber of Commerce.

Johnston told the House Labor committee that the measure might specify congressional favor of a "cooling off" period but not specifically require one. Likewise, he said management would oppose broad subpoena power.

Belief that a compromise would be required in order to get action by Congress also has been expressed by several legislative leaders.

Minor Accepts Some Changes

House Democratic Chief Clerk McCormack of Massachusetts told a reporter yesterday that Mr. Truman realizes he must accept some changes in his plan.

Likewise, Robert Hamspeck, of Congress Jan. 1, Robert Hamspeck, who was party whip and acting chairman of the labor group, said he expected the "no strike" clause would have to be dropped in order to win committee approval for the proposal.

Prospect of speedy action on the fact-finding plan still seems unlikely, since both Houses and Senate Labor committee have not yet taken action on the measure.

Representative Randolph (D., W. Va.), who becomes acting chairman of the House group, said he was leaving for the holidays that he doubted if legislation could be completed before mid-February.

### Tornadoes Toll Mounts to 29

Nauvoo, Tex., Jan. 7.—(AP)—Red Cross and local relief agencies are caring for 500 homeless families and more than 300 injured persons today as the death toll mounted to 29 in tornadoes which swept across five east Texas counties.

Robert Edson, Red Cross director of the Midwest district, who arrived yesterday from St. Louis, estimated property damage at \$2,600,000 as four additional deaths were reported from the storm which struck Friday night. Edson said the estimate did not include damage to pine forests of the counties.

Helping Distress Families

Two Red Cross emergency dispensing stations have been set up here and another at Palestine to issue clothing, food and bedding to destitute families. Nine emergency shelters have been set up by local chapters in the five counties.

National headquarters of the Red Cross announced in Washington yesterday that it had obtained priorities for 1,700,000 board feet of lumber which would be sufficient for immediate emergency construction requirements.

### Noted Mystery Thriller Coming

Agatha Christie's mystery thriller, "Ten Little Indians," which enjoyed a smash run of more than fourteen months on Broadway, will be presented under the banner of Arthur W. Koepsel on the Bushnell Memorial stage in Hartford beginning Thursday, January 10.

This is the famous Albert de Courtville production for which Howard Gray designed the scenery.

It is a dramatization by Miss Christie of her popular novel "And Then There Were None" which ran several years ago in the Saturday Evening Post. It was first produced in London where it ran for almost two years, and was instantly hailed as a smash success.

Other speakers will include Dr. Erwin Jungherr of the University of Connecticut, 1945 Borden award winner for outstanding work in poultry science; Dr. H. M. Scott and Roy E. Jones, also of the university of Connecticut; and L. R. Herathatter of New Haven, vice president of the association.

The all-day meeting will be open to all turkey growers. A luncheon will be served at noon.

### Big 'Maybe' Disclosed in Price Ceiling Plan Announced by OPA

Washington, Jan. 7.—(AP)—Despite OPA's flat announcement that price ceiling will be stamped on new cotton to check mounting clothing costs, agency officials acknowledged today they hope to avoid such action.

"They disclosed a big 'maybe' in the plan as the government, in another move, tried to assure sufficient apparel for veterans. It appealed to retail dealers to set aside for servicemen up to 100 per cent of their stocks of scarce garments."

OPA officials who asked anonymously said they wanted to make it clear there was "no bluff" in the agency's statement over the week-end and that it plans to bring cotton under price control for the first time.

But, they added, these plans are conditioned on whether the announcement has the effect of checking speculation in cotton prices, which OPA Chief Chester Bowles said are being bid up by traders who are betting on inflation.

Bowles said OPA "plans to do everything in its power to avoid" raising prices for cotton.
