**How to take good care of your electric refrigerator**

1. Let foods cool. Steaming hot foods should not be placed in the refrigerator as this increases the temperature and forces the motor to work overtime. Give them sufficient time to cool.

2. Don't overload refrigerator. Jamming food into compartments prevents proper circulation of air. Every time you open the door the temperature is raised and the motor works longer.

3. Remove ice trays carefully. Using a sharp instrument to pry or force trays free may chip or puncture the freezing compartment and entail costly repairs. If trays get stuck, try defrosting.

4. Defrost regularly. When frost is more than one-fourth inch thick, it's time to defrost. Clean box with warm water and baking soda to remove odors. (One teaspoonful to three quarts.)

5. Maintain even temperature. Your refrigerator was designed to preserve food—not to freeze them. Running it on "HIGH" can damage the foods as well as overwork the motor.

6. Don't try to fix it yourself. If your motor runs more than one-third of the time, it probably needs repair. Call a reliable service man. Amateur bungling can wreck expensive parts.

I am only a little girl, an orphan, and with many other little girls aged three to fifteen years, we live in a boarding school where they provide for us with the help of the National Commission for aid to infancy. We, of course, have greatly suffered from the war especially when the Boches came back again in our little town smashed by the bombs, and shelled all over again when first we dared to come out.

What has long been impossible to find was clothing. So often our good mistresses have urged us to take care of our dresses, stockings, and shoes, saying: "If ever they get behind, we'll find others for you, children." And really they could not find anything. All that was available was what is called "ersatz," that means a German bad and nasty thing. So you can imagine what eyes we opened when your grand gift arrived. We have jumped and laughed and clapped our hands. We have danced round the parcels and admired one by one all those nice things, and now every one of us tries to be good, to work well, to have good places in class, so to obtain one of those precious and nice things which will be distributed by our mistresses at the end of this week.

Many thanks to you, our benefactors, many thanks, to all our little sisters of America. We have learned to love your country, to admire your soldiers, to highly respect your so deeply respected President. Many thanks for the precious gifts, of course, but to many thanks, too, for the kind idea of sending them. It makes us and our mistresses so happy to feel that we have friends over the seas. We pray God to reward you for us... and give you happiness for the joy you gave us.
