**Parking Rules Raise Problem**

**Federal Manager Asks For Ruling As to the Authority of Town**

The question of who owns the roads, or has legal supervision over them, in the Silver Lane Homes tract, part of the Federal subdivision off West Center street, and the right of the town to exercise its authority there in arresting a number of car owners for leaving their cars parked on the streets in this area overnight, was today presented to Town Council Judge William S. Hyde for a ruling.

For the 24 arrests made Tuesday morning for violation of the new overnight parking regulations, over half of the car owners were residents of the Silver Lane Homes development.

When the arrests of the residents of the Silver Lane Homes development were brought to the attention of Harold Symington, federal manager of the tract, and when the residents reported to him that they had been fined \$25 for this alleged violation, Manager Symington asked Judge Hyde for a ruling on the matter.






