Hartford, March 15 .- (AP) -The long-threatened strike at Pratt & Whitney division of Niles-Bement-Pond company came today. In a driz-zling rain, some 2,500 workers at 10 a. m. filed out the gates of the big, precisiontool manufacturing company.

Atom Control Stand Issue

Divergent Interpretations Spring Up Over Position of Truman

Washington, March 15-(P)-The congressional path of atomic energy legislation developed new cumpiness today as divergent interpretations sprang up over Presi-dent Truman's position in the civilian vs. military control fuss. Mr. Truman steered clear of the major point at issue—an amendment to a pending control bill. But he told his news conference yesterday that he still believes the military should be consulted, with primary control left to a civilian roup directly responsible to him That's the stand he has taken ne said, and he referred reporter back to a six-week old letter to clear up what he termed a lack of clear understanding on the matter.

The chief executive had been asked specifically about action of the Senate's Special Atomic committee which earlier in the week outvoted Chairman McMahon (D., Conn.), 10 to 1, to accept an amendment by Senator Vandenberg (R., Mich.). This would set up a military board to consult with and advise the civilian con-trol body McMahon favors. Any
