Washington by disclosing that the British scientist now being held in England for divulging atomic secrets had had opportunities at atomic bomb projects in this country to gain basic information. The Senate was "shocked" at this disclosure and presumably more votes were swung toward the idea of permanent military control of atomic energy.

It is the way the Washington press is going, and none of those who are accepting the logic involved have apparently passed the test, as did Walter Lippmann the other morning, that it was precisely what General Groves had the most complete kind of a military dictatorship over atomic energy that whatever leaks have taken place did take place. So actually General Groves and the military, while using the spy incidents as arguments for military control in the future, are at the same time, quite unwittingly, admitting that military control has already failed to "quarantine the secret."

What is the answer? It is that no system of control that could ever be devised will ever succeed in keeping the atomic secrets, if there really are any. It is, therefore, about time that we stopped pretending to ourselves that the secrets can be kept and stopped trying to base either our domestic or our international policy on the bomb on the theory that the secret of the world's peace-keeping organization would turn into the hardening and solidification of those international entities which would have to lead to war.

These extreme fears are now at least temporarily dispelled. The crisis has lightened away from us. The first breath of the situation came with Premier Stalin's statement last Friday, upholding the United Nations. That statement has been followed by a similar announcement that the Russians have promised that their evacuation of Manchuria would be completed by the end of April. ### Southington Plant Workers Strike

Southington, March 25.—A strike was called at the Alwater Manufacturing company plant this morning and approximately 120 CIO-organized steelworkers refused to enter the drop forging plant.

Harold Bernard, International representative of the United Steelworkers association, said the workers were on strike for 18 1/2 cents an hour and "other adjustments" which he declined to identify. Token picketing will be maintained at the plant, he said, as long as no attempt at production is made.

The workers did not go out in the general steel strike on Jan. 21, Bernard said, because the company promised to meet terms of the steel settlement. Instead, he said, the company had a 10 per cent wage increase which the union rejected last week.

### Half of Bandoeng Hidden by Smoke

Batavia, March 25.—The southern half of Bandoeng was hidden today by the smoke of fires apparently set by withdrawing Indonesian forces pursuing a policy of scorched earth.

Numerous explosions were reported in the demolition of utilities plants and communications facilities. British air reconnaissance reported the population fleeing.

It was understood that Premier Sultan Sjahrir of the unrecognized Indonesian republic had instructed the Republican Army commander to comply with a British demand to move out of the city by midnight last night.

### Open Forum
