From Pearl Harbor to V-J Day, our prime concern was to help in the winning of the war. All our efforts and facilities were devoted to that end. From here on we shall again turn our efforts no less diligently to the task of providing faster, more accurate, more dependable telephone service to the people of Connecticut.
